who mapped Briscoe County, was the first to discover this soil. He couldn't make it fit into any soil series classified at that time. So Wayburn carefully described the soil, took samples, and determined its extent. The information was sent to SCS soil correlators. After thorough study of the data, the new soil was approved by the

Washington Office. The Burson soil series has taken its place in the nationwide system of soil classification. Hereafter any soil found in the country that fits the Burson series classification Solis are named for a local com-munity, town, city, school, or land-mark. Burson loam was named af-

ter Burson Lake. The Burson soil is a very shal low, loamy, reddish brown soll over sandstone. It occurs through-out the rough broken country in Briscoe County. It is similar to the Other soils correlated in the




