Cold Winds, Enthusiasm Greet Bob Wills Day

In the hearts and minds of all of "Star Wars" and of "The cose who flocked to his home China Syndrome." those who flocked to his home town, Bob Wills still may be the King. But an unexpected invasion of frosty weather ran a close se Bob Wills Day celebration in

Temperatures in the low 50's, cooled by a relentless cloud cover and sharp north wind, kept the approximately 3,000 persons in attendance shivering from the opening of the morning parade through the final two-step at the

evening's western dance.

But, as always, 'the festivities were successful because of the hardiness and optimism of those who came from all over West Texas, New Mexico, Colorado, Kansas and Oklahoma. The crowd, kept small by the chill and a constant threat of rain that never materialized, came togethnot so much as funseekers looking for some convenient thrills but as people enjoying a leisurely day of activities in memory of Turkey's most famous

The highlight of the celebration came about mid-afternoon with the announcement of the filming of Wills' life story by producer-director Jim Guerico, the man who made the film, "Electraglide in Blue," just finished another movie starring Blake. The film, "The Hamster of Happiness," was filmed in El Paso. Guerico also produces records for such groups as Chicago, The Beach Boys, and Blood, Sweat

Jim Nelson, who will be associate producer of the motion pic-"San Antonio Rose." had about a year ago, although his father directed some of the 26 films Wills made for Columbia

Nelson and Guerico attended the eighth annual Bob Wills Day celebration, and announced to the crowd of western swing fans that all rights have been acquir ed to make the movie, which will be based, to a great extent, on the book, "San Antonio Rose: The Life and Music of Bob Wills," by Charles R. Townsend, professor of history at West Tex-

as State University.
"Where Wills came from what created the culture he e-volved from . . I think it's the most original American Art form," said the man who will be directing the movie. "People aren't really aware of the influ-ence he had in American music. I want to take the film all the way through his life: It's a story that should be told."

Parts of the movie will be filmed in Turkey, parts in Oklaho-ma and parts in Hollywood, Nel-son said. Bob Wills called Turkey his home and often told of picking cotton all day and playing the fiddle for nothing at night. He rose to professional prominence in the 1930's and 40's. He died in Fort Worth in

Guerico was here Saturday mainly to observe. What he learns about the people of this part of Texas will play a major in deciding how the film will be made.

But this is only a minor part of the director's research. still have about 500 recordings to listen to," he said.

Nelson will work with co-producers Dwight and Sandra Adair in making the film. He said the picture will be a theatrical release, rather than a made-fortelevision movie.

He said the budget for "Star Wars" was \$8.8 million, but producers wound up spending \$10 million. It cost about \$6.5 million to make "The China Syndrome." The estimated budget for "San Antonio Rose" is \$10 million

"We made the money back for 'Star Wars' in 10 days and on 'The China Syndrome' in 15 days," he said.

Nelson said his choice for the role of Wills is a television satirist, and the choice "has surpris-

"But this man is a good actor and he's a musician," he said. "We have had problems before trying to make musicians out of



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
