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Jack Sim Of Korea Speaks At Turkey Church of Christ

Bro. Jack Sim of Uijongbu, Korea, was a speaker at the Turkey Church of Christ Wednesday night of last week. He was accompanied by David Hutton and Randall Morton of Big Spring. Bro. Sim was speaking on behalf of an Orphan's Home in Korea of which he is in charge and told of the desperate situation there since the government had him imprisoned on false charges.

The following is an excerpt from the Jack D. Hutton Memorial Christian Relief Fund, Inc. newsletter:

"After 153 days of imprisonment and much suffering, Bro. Hyeon Sang (Jack) Sim was freed on April 19 after all charges against him and his family were proven false. Many things occurred while he was in prison that cannot be detailed here, but suffice it to say that your prayers and the diligent efforts of many in America made his release possible.

"During his imprisonment, the number of children at the Home dropped from 158 to 54. This decrease was due to the government-appointed directors sending 40 children back to the Leper's Colonies where many had living parents. Of the remaining 118 children, 66 were driven away from the Home without any place to go and are now begging from place to place. The officials said this action was necessary to reduce expenses.

"The present condition of the Home is in total disrepair. All windows and most of the doors are shattered. The water well and boiler system are broken due to pipes freezing and must be overhauled.

"However, on the brighter side, the government has fired two officials, including the mayor of Uijongbu for improper government policy regarding the action taken against the Home and has assured Bro. Sim that as soon as he returns from the U. S. (around June 1) they will restore the directorship and board of directors. Within the next several months, three board members from the U. S. will be added to the Korean board of directors.

"During the past six months while Bro. Sim was imprisoned, the board of the Jack D. Hutton Memorial Relief Fund, was not silent! As soon as word of Bro. Sim's arrest was known, letters were sent to many Korean officials, including His Excellency President Chun, Provincial officials, and the Judge who presided over Bro. Sim's case. Letters were sent to Sen. Tower and Sen. Bentsen of Texas and the board sent David Hutton and Bill Higgins to Washington, D. C. to confer with the Korean

Embassy and both Senators. Even with such extensive efforts as those just described, all those in Korea acknowledge that it was the prayers and the Grace of God that eventually freed Bro. Sim.

"Immediate emergency funds will soon be released to assist those children who are now begging and shortly funds will be sent to repair the home."

The elders of Turkey Church of Christ designated last Sunday as a special day for Contributions for the Orphan's Home in Korea, according to Brett Parsley, minister.

Sarpalius Spends Last Hours Of Session In Filibuster

State Senator Bill Sarpalius spent the last few remaining hours of the 68th Legislative Session fighting against a bill which would adversely affect Texas farmers.

"The farmers of this state are already plagued with serious financial difficulties. It would be extremely unfair to impose additional hardships on our farmers by passing a bill which would force them to pay a lot of money, which some of them do not have," Senator Sarpalius said.
Sarpalius successfully fought

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against a bill which would have brought most farmers and ranchers under the state's Worker's Compensation Law. The Senator filibustered against the legislation for more than two hours on the final night. Senator Sarpalius filibustered for more than nine hours Friday night, when the bill was first introduced in the Texas Senate by Senator Hector Uribe of South Texas.

Senator Sarpalius opposed the legislation despite strong lobbying efforts to pass the bill and despite Agricultural Commissioner Jim Hightower's support of the bill. Proponents of the

legislation said the bill would affect a small percentage of Texas farmers. However, a large number of Panhandle farmers, who would have been affected by the bill, disagreed. "The bill would have hurt at least 30 to 40% of all Texas farmers," Senator Sarpalius said.

The Senator's filibuster forced final defeat of the bill. "I'm happy the farmers of this state won an important victory Monday. If the bill had gained approval, it would have forced some Texas farmers out of business," Senator Sarpalius said.
