Classes for students at Valley School will begin Monday, August 15th. The first bell of the 1994-95 school year will ring at 8:07 a.m.

Elementary student registration will begin in each classroom at that time. Supply lists are still available at the school. Junior High and High School registration will be in designated classrooms during the first and second periods.

School will be dismissed at 3:30 p.m. Lunch prices are: (K-5th--70 cents, 6th-12--90 cents, Breakfast--50 cents) School will be dismissed Friday, August 19th at 1:00 p.m.

Valley School Board Meeting Set Thursday

A called meeting has been set for the Valley School Board on August 11, 1994 at 8 p.m.

The meeting has been called to amend the old budget and adopt the new budget for the coming year.

The Caprock Bicycle Club will sponsor a tour of the Trail. The bicycle ride is scheduled to be held on September 10, 1994. The event is targeting the Turkey, Quitaque, Flomot and Silverton areas but everyone is welcome to participate.

The riding event will cater to all individuals who would like to ride the Caprock Canyons Trail in a leisurely manner and experience the beauty they haven't seen before. The ride is not a race and will be available to anyone age 8 years and above.

Early registration is now available by contacting Barbara Mayfield at the Bank or Rhonda Cochran at the school. Registration will be conducted on September 10 from 7:30 'till 8:30 a.m. Participants and their bicycles will be transported to Woods Crossing near South Plains. Beginning at South Plains, riders will begin a 12 mile descent down the trail, stopping from time to time for refreshments, until the riding destination is reached at Truman Merrells. At Merrells, participants will enjoy hot dogs (furnished) and a tour of historical sites around the Merrell place.

Following the happenings at Merrells, the participants will again be loaded onto vehicles for the return to Quitaque. The arrival at Quitaque should be around 2:20 p.m. Those wishing to ride on into Quitaque will be welcome to do so.

Twelve miles may seem like a long distance, but would-be participants are reminded that the Trail is downhill and the riding pace will be slow. In addition, vehicles will be trailing the riders to pick-up anyone who has met his/her limit. Safety precautions will be maintained throughout the ride.

Immunization Fair At Plainview

On Friday, August 12, 1994 an immunization clinic will be held at Plainview from 9 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. at J.C. Penney's, 1001 North I-27.

The cost for the full days activity is \$10. For \$10, participants will receive transportation to the trail head, a delightful ride down the trail, a free hot dog meal, a tour of the Merrell place and transportation by vehicle into Quitaque.

Briscoe County Celebration

Happy Birthday Briscoe County, it's your 102nd. To celebrate this event, there will be many activities going on this weekend, including class reunions, parade, barbecue and even a rodeo. Make sure you get out this Saturday afternoon and come by the Courthouse Square. There will be a variety of things to do and see, including music by Caprock Jamboree and friends, food booths, arts and crafts and games.

In celebrating our county's birthday, we are also celebrating its history. Test your knowledge to see how much you know about Briscoe County History. Briscoe County was named in honor of Andrew Briscoe, who helped bring about the independence of Texas from Mexico. The territory of Briscoe County was one of the last strongholds of the Indian tribes. Settlement of the county was delayed because of its inaccessibility and Indian danger. The Land Act of 1887 opened the area to colonization by allowing settlers to take up to three sections of ranch land or one section of farm land on liberal terms with 40 years to pay at 5% interest. Surveying began in 1890, with settlers arriving almost daily. Briscoe County was organized on March 15, 1892.

The rich history of our county is one of our biggest marketing tools for attracting tourists to our area. Tourists aren't just the people who drive through town that we do not know. They are friends and relatives who come to visit us. When they leave after a visit, they go back and tell their friends about their trip. Their friends then become interested in coming to visit and that gets the tourism industry rolling.

Don't be afraid to share the secret of Briscoe County and its history. I'm sure there are people like me who will find it extremely interesting!

A week ago last Friday, Jerry King of Odessa spent the night with his mother, Mrs. Ruby King.

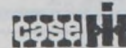
