Caprock Public Library continues to grow, not only in volumes, which is now over 9,500; but also in patronage and circulation. Each day, a tally is kept as to patrons who visit and books that circulate. A monthly report is then made to the City Council.

During the month of December, there were 382 patrons and 512 books in circulation. This was an averagae of 22 patrons and 30 books in circulation daily. There were 7 audio, 31 large print, 25 videos, 3 interlibrary loans and 5 reference questions.

During the year of 1997, there were 5,094 patrons and 6,661 books in circulation. This is a substantial increase from 1996's 4,345 patrons and 4,604 books. It was a Great Year!

National leaders in the cotton industry will join research scientists and Texas Agricultural Extension Service specialists who work directly with local growers to present up-to-the minute information on production technology, best management practices and marketing

The Caprock Cotton Conference will be held January 20 at the Plains Baptist Assembly on U.S. Highway 62. The conference will address needs of cotton growers in Crosby, Floyd, and surrounding countires.

Childress Regional Cotton Conference Planned For January 22, 1998

by Pammy Millican, CEA-Ag Cotton Producers and those in Allied Industries across the Northern Rolling Plains will have an Opportunity to get the latest information on cotton Production and Marketing, the battle against the boll weevil. and new technology in the Cotton Industry at the North West Texas Cotton Conference at Childress, Texas, on Thursday, January 22, 1998.

Information tailored to the specific concerns of this area will be presented at the Conference, said Dr. Todd Baughman, Texas Agricultural Extension Service Agronomist at Vernon Texas. The program will begin with registration at 8:30 at the Childress City Autditorium. The registration fee of \$5.00 includes

The status and progress of new technology will be presented by Dr. James Supak, Associate Department Head and Extension Service Program Leader in the Soil and Crop Sciences Department at Texas A&M University. Baughman will discuss old and new techniques and materials for weed control.

Cotton Harvest Nears Completion

With about 16,500 bales out of an estimated 18,000 bales ginned it look's as if the end of cotton harvest is in sight. Gin Manager Ronnie Carpenter said they have had about a 20% average turn out, and are about 95% complete. Depending on what the weather does they should finish up very soon.

Marketing stategies will be explained by Stan Bevers, Extension Service Economist and Marketing Specialist at Vernon. Setting an early crop will be the topic of J. C. Banks, Extension Service Cotton Specialist at Oklahoma State University.

Insect management will be the focus of presention after lunch. Basics of boll weevil life cycle and development will be presented by Emory Boring, Extension Service Entomologist from Vernon. Noel Long, local producer, will give an update on the 1997 Boll Weevil Diapause rogarm in Childress and Hall Counties.

Experience with the Diapause Program in St. Lawrence area will be reported by Warren Multher, Extension Integrated Pest Management (IPM) agent serving Glasscock, Reagan and Upton Counties. An update on the Boll Weevil Eradication Program in Texas will be given by Dr. Tom Fuchs, Extension Entomologist and IPM coordinator, from San Angelo. Boring will discuss management of cotton insects.

Additional information on the conference is available at County Offices of the Extension Service in Childress, Collingsworth, Cottle, Hall, Briscoe and Motley Counties

Midge wanted something fancier. She made a hat box into a house by covering it with green crepe paper. She stuck a cigar in the middle of the roof for a stove pipe and added a cluster of grapes to create the elegance of a hanging vine

We carefully lifted the seat of my davenport and the roof from Midge's house and filled each box with two slices of light bread, which we could only buy for such an occasion as this; two pieces of fried chicken; two bananas and two pieces of chocolate

Getting a fancy box into the shoolhouse without a beau seeing it caused a bit of a flurry. Secrets leaked, and if a guy had eyes for certain gal, it was her box on which he'd bid. When the other bidders got wind of a guy bidding furiously for a box, they raised the bids and made the poor man pay a high price to eat with his sweetheart. A single man we called the old bachelor had more money than the young men. ometimes he bought as many as three boxes and ate with all three girls. I prayed he wouldn't buy my

Bidding began. Boxes sold. My ox sat by the auctioneer until only three boxes were left. And then the auctioneer picked up the davenport.

No one bid. There was silence.
"What am I bid?" he asked for the

It was James, an 18 year-old. He couldn't top the bid made for his girlfriend's box, so he bought mine.

James sat down beside me in a school desk. Midge had told me that as a girl, I was supposed to spread the small white cloth we'd brought on the desk top and put the food there to eat.



HEALTH CHECK UP **Routine Screening Test Covered By Medicare**

(NAPS)-Thousands of Americans die every year from colon cancer—believed by many experts to be the second most common cause of cancer-related deaths.

The good news is that early detection may help in treating and preventing the disease.

"Screening the colon is impor-

tant because polyps and cancers can be detected," said Dr. C. Daniel Johnson, professor of Radiology at the Mayo Medical School and con-

the Mayo Medical School and con-sultant at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minnesota.

Dr. Johnson, who also chairs the American College of Radiology (ACR) Colon Cancer Committee, said removing the abnormalities can bell prepart many cancers or

can help prevent many cancers or remove them at a curable stage. Beginning January 1, 1998, Medicare will cover the costs of the barium enema as one type of colon cancer screening test. The ACR supports the new policy.

"This is an important step in prevention of colon cancer," Dr. Johnson said.




