## NOTICE OF HIGHWAY CONSTRUCTION

The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation offered an opportunity for a public hearing to be requested by publication on April 22 and May 6, 1976, of a notice reporting the proposed construction of F.M. Road 3365, extending from State Highway 86 at a point 2.0 miles east of Silverton, North a distance of 4.8 miles, in Briscoe County.

No requests for a public hearing were received; therefore, the District Office of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, at Childress, Texas, has submitted all of the engineering data and information received in connection with the development of this project for approval of the proposed route and design by the Administration of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

The proposed project consists of construction of a 20-foot asphalt surface, with a minimum of 100 feet of right of way being required. There are no relocations or displaces involved.
