

The Great Plains Conservation Program (GPCP) which was enacted by Congress in 1957, has been used by over 200 land users in Hall County. David Seitz, of SCS, stated that ten local land users completed their GPCP contracts in 1972. Seitz stated that the Bridge Bit Grazing Association completed their GPCP contracts in four years. Some of the Association's accomplishments were drilling of five wells for improved distribution of grazing; installation of 17 large water storage facilities and 11 cattle drinking troughs. They installed three ponds and 11,215 feet of pipeline. Brush control was done on 1798 acres of the 15,522 acre ranch, which is owned by the 25 member association. According to Seitz, six of the completed contracts were primarily for parallel terraces. These six were Allen Dunbar, Mack Richards, Nell Davis, J. T. and I. D. Mullin, Hubert Price, Richards and Paymeyer and U. F. Coker. The three other completed contracts were with George Ray Colvin, Linton Gardenhire and James Fuston. Cost-shared practices such as grass seeding, brush control, parallel terraces and farm ponds were constructed on these three farms. According to Seitz there are still a few GPCP contracts being developed in Hall County even though GPCP funds have been very limited for the past few years.
