Explain Delayed Projects In Dickens & **Motley Counties**

Related To Cash Crunch Childress - Local officials from the Texas Department of

Transportation (TxDOT) are alerting community leaders that the state's transportation spending will be cut by more than a billion dollars for the current fiscal year. Area transportation projects will be delayed as a result of the cut-

Statewide, TxDOT's con-Year 2008 is being reduced from approximately \$4.2 billion to \$3.1 billion. As a result 2 projects in TxDOT*s Childress District will be delayed for the rest of the fiscal year. Those projects include a \$2 million project on SH 208 in Dickens County to replace a bridge and widen and rehabilitate the roadway. Also, a \$4.8 million project on US 70 in Motley County, to mill and overlay the roadway.

With revenues declining and costs increasing, we are running out of money to pay for new construction," said Childress District Engineer, Terry Keener, P.E.. "To stay within our resources, we must shift our focus to maintaining the existing transportation system. We will protect the investment taxpavers have made in our existing highway and bridges.

Keener said that several factors contribute to the current cash flow situation.

*External factors outside TxDOT's control (1) The impact of inflation in the last five years, highway construction costs have increased 62 percent, and (2) The need to increase funding for maintenance, Texas highways are showing the wear and tear of more traffic and maintenance funding must rise to keep pavement conditions from deteriorating further

*State Issues (1) The move-ment of state transportation dollars to pay for other state priorities, more than \$1.5 billion was moved from the state highway fund to pay for other state priorities in the 2008-2009 state budget;

Motley County Commissioners Enacts County Wide Burn Ban For 90 Days

2008. Present for the meeting were County Judge Ed D. Smith, Commissioners Ronnie Davis-Pct 1, Donnie Turner-Pct2, Franklin Jameson-Pct 3, Russell Alexander-Pct 4, County Clerk Kate Hurt, Sheriff Michael Crutchley, Deputy Chris Spence, County Attorney Tom Edwards and assistant Carol Campbell and guests Mary Ellen Barton, Mary Sue Potts Powell, Waydetta Clay and Barbara Jameson. After attending to regular court business the following items were ad-

* Judge Smith presented two amendment/line item transfers for the courts approval. (1) \$52.50 from General Misc. to General Justice/Peace Autopsy to cover increased fees for this service. (2) \$300.00 from General Tax A/C Bond Program to General Tax A/C Tax Roll & Receipts to cover increased expenditures due to roll back election at Motley County ISD. Both transfers passed by unanimous vote.

TxDOT representatives Ben Kautz and Gary Mizer, Area Engineer, briefed the court on TxDOT's projects for 2008. Due to cutbacks many jobs have been delayed. Mr. Mizer said the State will continue to complete projects already in progress. Off-system bridges on County Roads 214, 404 and 110 will be let in October 2008. FM 2090, Pease River 2011 and Tom Ball Creek bridges repair will not be cut.

Tom Edwards informed the court there are three new meteorology towers west of town in the county. These towers gather data on wind energy in the area. Austin has not released any information on the route of a transmission line yet.

Sheriff Michael Crutchley introduced the new Deputy Sheriff, Christopher Spence. Mr. Spence

has 23 years of experience in law enforcement.

* Judge Smith informed the court the Emergency management Coordinator, Craig Turner has resigned. James Gillespie has volunteered to accept this position. Commissioner Davis made the motion to appoint Mr. Gillespie as the EMC for Motley County, the motion passed by unanimous vote.

Judge Smith informed the court he has accepted a bid of \$3,200.00 from Alexander Electrical Service of spur to replace the outdated Federal Pacific breaker boxes our insurance company has reported to the county to be unsafe. The court agreed to take the funds out of Courthouse

* The City of Flomot has been awarded \$330,220.00 to repair and replace the water system at Flomot. The Office of Rural community Affairs will present a check in about two weeks when the contract is finalized

*The court discussed enacting a burn ban for 90 days, to be reviewed every 30 days. This motion passed by unanimous vote. Dry conditions in the county have caused recent fires, de-

stroying more than 2,000 acres * Assistant Carol Campbell informed the court Judge Smith and County Attorney Tom Edwards ill meet January 25 with THC project representative Quana Childs of Austin, and Jail Architect Hugh Welch, to finalize the funding and easement agreement required to accept the \$30,000.00

* City of Matador Mayor, Pat Smith met with the court to discuss the Municipal Court Judge appointment. The city appointed the County JP as the Municipal Court Judge. Mayor Smith informed the court the city has not received any monies for citations written within the city limits. Mayor Smith believes if officers cite individuals within the city limits, and the case is uncontested, the fine should be collected by the City. After discussion, the matter was tabled until the Municipal Court Judge can be contacted.

* The county Clerk presented to the court for approval a joint resolution and statistical information for joint primary. A motion passed unanimously to approve the resolution.

With no further business the meeting was adjourned.

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

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Continued from page 1 and (2) Restrictions on access to private sector investment, recent legislation imposed a broad moratorium on certain financing tools while legislators consider the appropriate level of private sector participation in transportation

* The uncertainty of federal funds (1) the Highway Trust Fund is spending more money than it brings in, and the Office of Management and Budget predicts it will go \$4 billion in the negative in 2009; and (2) Rescissions in previouslypromised contract authority total \$666 million for Texas in the last two years, and Texas faces the possibility of nearly \$950 million in additional rescissions by 2009.

* Over-optimistic assumptions by TxDOT including (1) over-estimated growth in fu-ture federal transportation authorization bills. For planning purposes, we anticipated the future federal transportation bills would grow at a rate similar to other transportation funding bills in that past. Now, it does not appear that growth rate will occur; and (2) Projected Motor Fuel Tax collections did not anticipate higher gasoline costs which have slowed tax revenue over an extended period.

"Just like a family that reduces expenses to make ends meet, we will cut our costs,' said Keener. "TxDOT is scrubbing our budget, and every-thing is on the table from bulldozers to paperclips

The challenges to the state*s transportation cash flow are not expected to end in Fiscal Year 2008. Delayed projects from 2008 and planned projects for the following year will face tough scrutiny as transportation officials consider how to spend a projected construction budget of \$2.5 to \$2.9 billion for Fiscal Year

"These are challenging times," Keener said. "No one knows local needs better than local officials. As we determine available funding for 2009 and beyond, local leaders will determine which projects will best meet our community's

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

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Extension Workshops Will Help Producers Examine Cotton Profitability

LUBBOCK - Producers who want to take a look at profitability scenarios for 2008 and closely examine their financial options should attend at least one of four Texas AgriLife Extension Service cotton profitability workshops, said an Extension economist.

The first two workshops are slated for Feb. 12 and March 4, at the AgriLife Research and Extension Center at Lubbock, said Jackie Smith, Extension economist based at Lubbock. "We will also have at least two other workshops, set in counties here on the South Plains. Our objective is to provide producers the tools, data and skills to evaluate the potential profitability of alternative crops

"Each participant will receive a hand-out that includes a printed copy of our presentations and selected crop budgets. They will also receive a CD containing Excel crop budgets and break-even tables, reference files, and a set of Internet links. This will help them use the Excel spreadsheet on their own computer.

The workshops will run from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Registration costs \$20 per person, and includes lunch and refreshments.

The workshops are funded by a grant from the Texas State

Cotton Support Committee.

"The grant enables us to develop a crop budget projection tool, conduct training workshops, keep the data updated, and then make the tool and information readily available to pro-

ducers," Smith said. "The Excel spreadsheets are also designed to allow users to examine the impact of different crop share rental arrangements on landlord and renter's net income.

Extension risk management specialists Jay Yates and Jeff Pate, Lubbock, and Extension cotton marketing specialist John Robinson, College Station, will help conduct the workshops.

Other topics on the agenda include: input price trends and projections for 2008; a farm bill update; basis, cash contracts and forward pricing tools such as short futures and put options. They will also cover margin requirements, margin costs and other advanced pricing tools

January Crop Report Includes Slight Increase In 2007 Crop Estimate

The latest look at the 2007 High Plains cotton crop by USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS) included a slight increase in the region's estimated production to 5.43 million bales, up from 5.3 million bales projected in December for crop reporting districts 1-N and 1-S

The adjustments were included in the NASS January Crop Production report released January 11, 2008 and further refine yield projections for all Texas crop reporting districts

The High Plains changes amounted to a 70,000-bale drop in overall production in district 1-N. The drop was a result of the downward revision in 1-N expected yields of 62 pounds from 1,040 to 978 pounds per harvested acre.

On the other side of the ledger was a 200,000-bale increase in district 1-S production that resulted from a 39 pound per acre yield increase from 799 to 838 pounds per acre.

The net effect was a 130,000-bale production increase to 5.43 million bales. Good weather during the last half of the season plus an above average, early season moisture situation allowed the 2007 crop to overcome its' somewhat slow start.

The favorable weather also allowed yields to reach record levels with the area poised to set a new all-time record yield per harvested acre in the neighborhood of 840 pounds per acre. This would be some 54 pounds above the current yield record of 786 pounds set in 2005, when the area broke the 5 million bale mark.

As it stands the 2007 crop will most likely go down as number two in the record books, just short of the 5.62 million-bale

crop produced on the Plains in 2005.

Whether or not the 2007 crop has a chance to challenge for the top spot, which it currently trails by just 190,000 bales, will depend on the final adjustments NASS makes when reconciling final ginning figures with final planted and harvested acre-

The following table includes district level estimates for 2007 and final 2006-crop production and acreage figures as released by NASS on January 11.





University of Maryland Visiting Associate Professor of Dance Karen Kohn Bradley is a certified movement analyst - who studies the nonverbal and movement behaviors of political leaders. She says, "It is important for reporters and analysts to utilize the tools of nonverbal communication and body language in assessing the messages the American population receives from the White House, candidates and other leaders. What is conveyed through movement is, after all, behavioral patterns that impact policies, and ultimately, the lives of the people."

She offers these tips for watching this year's State of the Union:

The Entrance: This year is George Bush's swan song and so it may be more interesting to observe how he is welcomed than how he enters. One expects him to use the usual swagger and wink, and perhaps even to show some relief that this is the finale. Generally the Congress has been warm to him, but this year, given the sense of frustration the nation seems to have with both the Congress and the President, the real story might be in the tensions that are revealed as he enters the chamber.

The Speech: How much fable will he spin vs. how much will he try to justify? Watch for hypervigilance in the eyes, excessive
