ACS Volunteers Receive Awards

The Briscoe Unit of the American Cancer Society, met in the FNB Community Room for their November meeting. Grady and Delene Tyler, Judy Barrett, Florene Cobb, Amy Marshall and Betty Ware were present for this meeting.

President Delene Tyler called the meeting to order. Judy Barrett read the minutes from the last meeting. The treasury report for Quitaque was given as well as reports on fund raisers: Send A Mouse To College and the Halloween Cake Walk.

A brief report was given on the Great American Smoke-out.

The upcoming "By Invitation" fund raiser was discussed.

Purpose of this meeting was to vote to represent the Texas Division of the ACS in this community for another year. Accepting this certificate of Authorization means that the Briscoe Unit agrees to represent the ACS, Texas Division within the unit's boundaries, and that they will uphold and operate according to the Standards of Certification, Unit Bylaws and Division Bylaws. The Board had to vote to accept this certificate. The motion was made by Judy Barrett and seconded by Florene Cobb. Motion carried.

Judy Barrett was appointed Communications Chairman due to the resignation of Mary Ann Sarchet of Silverton.

Amy Marshall, district representative, presented plaques to ACS volunteers.

Judy Barrett-Service and Rehabilitation Chairman, received the "Quality of Life" award. This award was presented for reaching at least 33 percent of the total patient population in this area. This is an increase of 10 percent of patients served last year.

Lynda Fogerson-Public Education Chairman received the "Lifesaver" award. This award was presented for reaching 40 percent of the youth and 10 percent of the adult population in this area. This is the first step towards

the Ruby award, which is the highest award given by the state.

Grady Tyler - Crusade Chairman received the Golden Achievement award for reaching an all-time high in crusade income and for exceeding the per capita goal of the Texas Division in the 1989 crusade to conquer cancer research (Research-Education-Service).

Delene Tyler-president received the Triple Crown award for excellence in programs of Patient Service, Crusade and Public Education. This is a State award and has been awarded to very few units.

Certificates and pins for years of volunteer service were awarded to: Peggy Flemming, 15 years and Margie Pinkerton, 10 years.

Bill Clements Says 1990 Census Crucial

Governor Bill Clements, in an effort to assure a complete count of all Texans in the 1990 census, has assembled a committee of state agency chiefs who will engender increased census awareness among state employees and agency clients.

A comprehensive census count is crucial to Texas in the 1990's the governor said, in ensuring the state gets its allotted share of federal funds. Also at stake is proper representation in the U. S. House of Representatives.

An accurate census count in Texas could net the state and local governments as much as \$900 million more in federal funds during the next 10 years, according to the Texas State Data Center.

In addition, Texas could gain as many as four new congressional seats if the 1990 count is accurate.

"Texas literally cannot afford to put forth anything less than an all-out effort to make sure all of our residents are counted by census-takers in 1990," the governor said. "This committee will make sure that key state agencies do

everything possible to help Texas achieve that goal."

The governor's State Agency Census Planning Committee is part of a strategy designed to avoid a repeat of the 1980 undercount of Texas residents. Estimates are the 1980 census missed as many as 547,000 Texans, of which 396,000 were minorities.

In 1987 alone, Texans lost an estimated \$21.3 million in Medicaid funds as a result of the undercount in the 1980 census.

The committee, using agency newsletters and paycheck inserts, will generate state employee awareness of the importance of the census.

The committee will focus special attention on agencies with heavy public contact, including those dealing in social services whose federal funding is tied to the census.

Promotional posters and informational materials will be distributed to targeted state agencies, including local offices of the Department of Human Services and the Texas Employment Commission.

Mrs. McKay, born in Detroit, Texas had lived in Amarillo since 1958. She was a Baptist, and a homemaker.

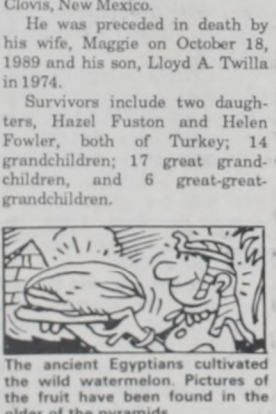

Burial was in Dreamland Cemetery under the direction of Schooler-Gordon Funeral Directors of Turkey.

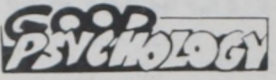
Mrs. Gafford died Monday, December 25, 1989, in St. Anthony's Hospital in Amarillo.

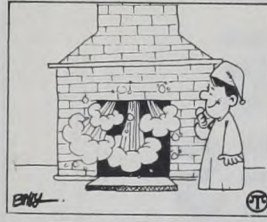

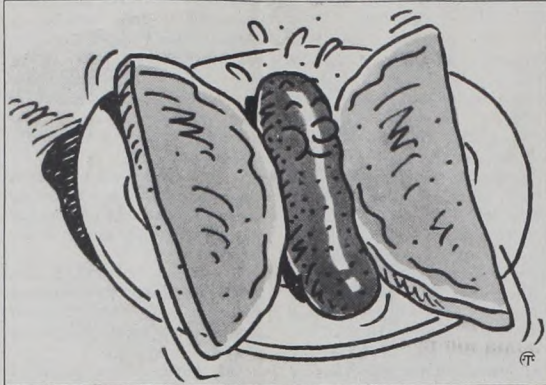
