Social Security Taxes Increase

The tax deduction from your paycheck for Social Security and Medicare (FICA) will be higher for 1990. The new tax rate is 7.65 percent. It was 7.51 percent for 1989.

Also, the earnings base-the maximum amount of earn-ings on which FICA taxes are paid-rises from \$48,000 in 1989 to \$51,300 in 1990. People who earn \$48,000 or less per year will not notice as big a change in their FICA de-ductions as workers who earn more than \$48,000.

If your earnings are \$15,000 nial C per year, for example, you rived. will pay \$21 more in FICA lection taxes in 1990 than you did in many If your earnings are 1989. \$25,000 per year, you will pay \$35 more.
