War On Litter Declared April 13

It's an all-out war against litter: On Saturday, April 13, 130,000 Adopt-a-Highway and Keep Texas Beautiful volunteers will lash out against litter, cleaning state and county roads, city streets and parks in the eleventh annual "Great Texas Trash-Off." Part of the Texas Department of Transportations's (TxDOT's) "Don't Mess with Texas" antilitter campaign, the Trash-Offis one of the nation's largest one-day

More than 2,000 adopt-a-Highway groups will rid state roads of trash, while Keep Texas Beautiful groups in 84 communities will be sprucing up city streets, county roads and parks. The groups expect to pick up 7.25 million gallons of litter statewide. According to Doris Howdeshell, director of TxDot's Travel and In-

formation Division, the combined effort of the Great Texas Trash-Off, Don't Mess with Texas and Adopt-a-Highway has changed behavior about littering and reduced the amount of litter on Texas roads. These antilitter programs also save the state beeen \$2 and \$4 million a year in

litter pickup expenditures.
"Awareness of TxDot's antilitter programs is very high in the state, and we've made great strides in re-ducing roadside litter," Howdeshell said. "The Great Texas Trash-Off is one single day on which we hope to see the whole state cleaner for the traveling public. Our hope is that seeing more than 130,000 people cleaning up after litterers, and see-ing miles and miles of clean roads will make drivers think twice about throwing something out of the car. Ultimately, our goal is zero tolerance—we will have done our job when no one in Texas litters.

TxDot's grassroots partner, Keep Texas Beautiful, is a non-profit, environmental umbrella group consisting of a network of private citizens, communities, industries, civic groups, schools and government agencies.
