Men Still Required To Register with Selective Service

Responding to a recent decision by the President, the U.S. House of Representatives voted on May 23 to continue the requirement for all men to register with Selective Service upon reaching age 18. The members considered a proposed amendment to the Defense Authorization Bill, H. R. 4301, that would have ended registration. The amendment was rejected 125 to 273.

Five days before the vote, President Clinton notified Congress that continuing draft registration and providing funding to operate the Selective Service System is "essential to our national security." In letters to the leadership of the House and Senate on May 18, the President based his decision on a recently completed review of the program by a National Security Council Working group. He concluded that the Selective Service System and peacetime registration must be retained as a prudent military preparedness measure in an uncertain world, as a link between American society and the volunteer military, and as a symbol of national resolve.

Although there has been no need to draft men for military service during the past 21 years, the nation has maintained the capability to reinstate a draft in a major crisis. Since July 1980, draft regristration has been an obligation of virtually every man, ages 18 through 25. Federal law requires that every man must register within 30 days of his 18th birthday. Each man completes a form to provide Selective Service with his name, date of birth, address, phone number and Social Security number. Registration froms are available at any post office. Most men also receive a registration reminder in the mail a few months before reaching age 18, and they may use it to register by return mail. The Selective Service System has a telephone line dedicated to answering questions about registration: (708) 688-6888.

Men who don't register are in violation of Federal law. Nonregistrants can be prosecuted and they are ineligible for Federal student financial aid, most Federal jobs and job training. The law applies to male immigrant aliens, 18 through 25 years old, as well as male citizens.

Information On Marijuana Sought

With marijuana use and concealed growing operations on the rise, the Texas Department of Public Safety Narcotics Service has established rewards for those pro viding information leading to the izure of growing marijuans

A new toll free number will allow the public to call the authorities when operation of an indoor or outoor growing site is suspected. Callers who identify themselves and the situation can receive a cash

Murray listed several things that may indicate an indoor growing operation: covered or blacked out windows; loud humming sounds (from fans or ballasts); a strong musty odor; large amounts of potting soil, containers, fertilizer, hoses, halide light system, and ballasts; use of guard dogs; or security sys-

Many times marijuana is grown outdoors on public land. Indicators may be: large purchases of fertilizer, garden hoses, PVC pipe, and camouflage netting; 'No Trespassing or Keep Out signs; guard dogs; unusual structures or items in remote forested areas (buckets, garden tools, fertilizer bags).

"Marijuana growers can be dangerous; investigations should be left to the law enforcement officers, Murray said.

When a caller notifies the authorities, the exact location, address, landmarks, and whether persons or vehicles are in the area will assist the officers in their investigation.



"See You at the Pole is the

world's largest simultaneous prayer meeting launched by Texas Baptists in 1990 to pioneer a way for students to present a visible, bold witness of their faith on their school campuses within the boundaries of the nation's legal system," Flowers

To Russia With Love", Be A Penpal

The organization "SAPE" (formerly "The Soviet-American Penfriend Exchange" in New York) is looking for 100,000 Americans between the ages of 10 and 40 who would like to strike up a penpal friendship with someone in the former Soviet Union. Since its inception in 1989, SAPE has linked up more than 20,000 pairs of penpals. News of that success has spread via word of mouth all carees the former Soviet Union. spread via word-of-mouth all across the former Soviet republics. This has resulted in an avalanche of mail-more than 100,000 letters-which has

completely overwhelmed the small group of volunteers who operate SAPE.

Penpals are matched up on the basis of age, gender, choice of male or female penpal and, in the case of the small percentage who do not know English, common language. Because of the wide variety of mail, SAPE is usually able to fulfill rquests for penpals from a specific geographic are. Letters have arrived from every major city in the former USSR, as well as

from remote Siberian villages.

Despite the recent backlash against western-style reforms in Russia, the majority of young people remain avid fans of American music, films and TV shows. In the Baltic nations, residents are often able to pick up TV broadcasts from Scandinavia of such shows as Beverly Hills, 90210 and
