Bison Project Well On the Way! **Much To Occur In The Future**

Caprock Partners Foundation met at the Quitaque Community Center Tuesday, May 12,

Roy Welch, head of the Bison Project, Shirley Jones, Interpretive planner; Danny Sweptson District Director from Canyon and Ruben Canto, Director from San Angelo were in attendance to brief the group on the progress of the Bison Project. They announced that Vickie Sybert of the Lubbock office was the site manager for the interpretive project.

The Bison holding pens and pasture fences have been completed. Work is now going forward on the working pens which will be built on the same order as the holding pens but will include working chutes for vaccination and branding to handle the bison. The working pens will be completed by end of August

Items still needed for this project are a chute made special for bison calves, concrete for alleyway floor, pipe and cable for the pens, and a bulk feed storage bin which will hold 10 ton of feed.

Plans for the future include the redevelopment of the interpretive center. In the future visitors to the park will be able to trace the history of the land, people and bisons through the ages. Students will be able to come to this area and see the how, where and why of the past

The annual budget for the bison program will need approximately \$100,000. Plans are in progress to set up an endownment for one million dollars to generate this \$100,000 for future generations.

Chevrolet's Suburban and Tahoe division will present the Interpertive bison project with \$50,000. It will be matched by \$50,000 from the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation but the bison project needs a matching \$50,000. Therefore, sponsorship for the project is needed and most welcome. The completion date for the project will be April 1999. If you would like to be a part of this continuation of history, contact any Caprock Partners Foundation member.

Plans are to use these monies for the restructure of the interpretive center, the education of the children of Texas about the connection of the bison herds to the history of man in the great

You sure get a strange feeling when you're standing on your flight deck, and see your your flight deck, and see your brother's ship go down," said Huckaby, an Amarillan who Huckaby, an Amarilloan who erved on the aircraft carrier USS Enterprise during the Bat-tle of Midway in 1942.

Huckaby's brother Don was among the crew of the USS Yorktown, another carrier engaged in the battle, but one not nearly so fortunate. Hit hard by Japanese bombs and torpedoes, the Yorktown listed precariously and was ordered abandoned on the afternoon of June 4

Don Huckaby was a survivor, and after several very scary hours in the water, he was rescued by a destroyer in the area.

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

(2) Crew Leaders, earning
\$9.50 per hour, who will manage teams of Census Workers.

As local people know their own communities better than anyone else, the Census Bu-reau especially hopes to find workers who reside in the com-munities where the fieldwork will be conducted. Moreover, the Bureau is seeking individuals who are not afraid to contact people and ask them questions. "This is not an of-fice job." Stovall emphasizes. "it's out in the field locating addresses and conducting door-to-door interviews."

Applicants must pass a written exam of basic skills. The testing will start at the end of May and will be conducted in Amarillo and other locations throughout the Panhandle. Work begins in early August and continues thru late September. Employees will be paid to be trend a training session. to attend a training session and will be reimbursed 31¢ per mile for using their own vehicle for fieldwork

To qualify, applicants must be at least 18 years old and U.S. citizens. They should not have a conviction other than for a minor traffic violation; and they should not be currently employed as collector/assessor forcement official. Men born before 12/31/59 must be registered with the Selective Service.

Employees must pass a security and employment reference

Ornamental Grasses Add Texture to a Landscape

provided by Calley Payne When thinking about land-scapes, we typically think flowers, shrubs and trees, but don't rule out ornamental grasses. Extension hor ticulturist Dr. Doug Welsh says or namental grasses add texture with their strap leaves in contrast to the course texture of the more common

landscape plants. Lemon grass is popular. It emits a lemony smell. Welsh also likes zebra grass with it's unusual horizontal stripes. He says blue stem and muhly grass work well since they're native grasses. purple fountain grass is popular, but a hard freeze can kill it, so in many places it has to be replanted each year.


