Ten to fourteen former Texas Playboys will be featured, it has been announced. The Saturday night dance will be on April 30, beginning at 7:00 p.m., with breakfast to be served beginning at 11:00 p.m. at the Bob Wills Cafeteria. Hoyle Nix and the West Texas Cowboys will be featured.

Saturday morning's activities get underway with the Kwahadi Indian Dancers at 10:00 in front of Turkey Variety, followed by the parade at 10:30. The Kwahadi Dancers are made up of a Boy Scout Troop that is just fantastic, with authentic costumes and dances. As soon as the parade is over, the barbecue committee will start dishing up barbecue at the Bob Wills Center at 11:00 a.m.

Special entertainment will feature the original Texas Playboys with Leon McAuliffe, Al Stricklin, Smokey Dacus, Joe Ferguson, Eldon Shamblin, Gene Gassaway and Bob Boatright at 2:00 p.m. at the old football field east of the Center. This will be one of the largest groups of Texas Playboys ever assembled at one place! Dr. Charles R. Townsend will again be master of ceremonies. And he will be remembered as the Grammy Award winner and author of "San Antonio Rose—The Life and Music of Bob Wills and Texas Playboys."

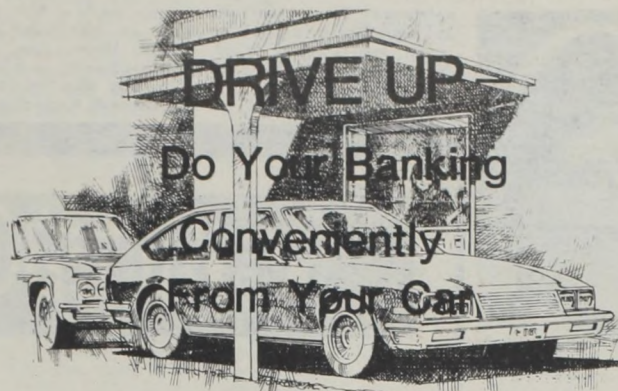

A. CHAMBER OF COMMERCE REORGANIZED

Representatives from each civic organization in the area formed the nucleus of a successful membership drive. Among other things, the organization coordinated Grand Opening for Canyons State Park on 9.

B. BOY SCOUTS REORGANIZED

Last June, after several years of inactivity, a new Boy Scout program was reorganized. There are now eighteen boys involved with three packs. They were very helpful working on the Community clean-up as well as helping with the Grand Opening. They helped place chairs for the program and put bumpers on all cars that drive. Scouts have a meeting each week and have been on several outings and hikes.

C. SOFTBALL ASSOCIATION

A. CHAMBER OF COMMERCE ORGANIZED

Last April a group of civic-minded citizens decided that a Chamber of Commerce was needed in Quitaque. Several meetings were held and by April 29, it was formally organized and by-laws adopted. Representatives from each civic organization in Quitaque formed the nucleus and a successful membership drive was held. Among other things, this organization coordinated the Grand Opening for Caprock Canyons State Park on October 9.

B. BOY SCOUTS REORGANIZED

Last June, after several years of inactivity, a new Boy Scout program was reorganized. There are now eighteen boys actively involved with three leaders. They were very helpful in working on the Community-wide clean-up as well as helping on the day of the Grand Opening. They helped place chairs for the program and put bumper stickers on all cars that day. The Scouts have a meeting each week and have been on several camps-outs and hikes.

C. SOFTBALL ASSOCIATION

There are eight softball teams in Quitaque and they have been very active. Last summer they held five tournaments with teams from a wide area participating. This brought many visitors to town. They maintain one of the cleanest, most attractive ball parks in the Panhandle and are constantly improving it.

This past summer they built one new bleacher with shade for the ball park and a new shaded group picnic area at the City Park size 12 feet by 62 feet.

D. GRAND OPENING FOR CAPROCK CANYONS STATE PARK

The State Park officials declared that this was the best Grand Opening any community had ever had for a State Park—and it truly was a grand day for Quitaque. Those having a part on the program were Mrs. Mark White, Senator Bill Sarpaulis, Representative Foster Whaley, Representative Mary Polk, Former Governor Preston Smith, James Bell, Director of Parks for Texas Parks and Wildlife, and Charles Travis, Executive Director of Texas Parks and Wildlife. Mayors, County Judges and civic leaders from area towns were also present along with several hundred local residents and visitors.

Extensive advertising was done prior to the Park opening with news articles sent to all area

newspapers, radio and television stations. Five television stations and several radio broadcasters covered the festivities that day. There were also representatives here from the "Texas Parks and Wildlife" magazine and a very nice, lengthy article appeared in the subsequent issue. Caprock Canyons State Park caps were presented to each of these visitors.

A coffee was held during the hour before the Dedication Program for the visiting dignitaries and news media. Vans were available to transport them to the Park.

The dedication program was in a beautiful setting at the Park with the stage located beneath large shade trees with scenic Lake Theo in the background. The platform was decorated with large baskets of yellow mums. Our local musicians performed on an adjacent stage before the program began and during the meal and it was a very festive occasion. Over three hundred chairs were placed in front of the stage area and others sat on surrounding picnic tables or on the hillside. It was only a short walk to the picnic area where the noon meal was served.

All that morning the Boy Scouts were busy placing bumper stickers with Quitaque's slogans on all vehicles and there was another large group directing traffic and parking. "Shuttle" vehicles brought people directly to the dedication site from the parking areas.

There were eighteen committees formed for this Dedication Day with at least 200 people actively involved. This Grand Opening for Caprock Canyons State Park was a day in which Quitaque could feel pride in a job well done.

E. CAP DAY

On the day prior to the Grand Opening of Caprock Canyons State Park, every business person in town wore State Park caps in support of this event. Many residents also wore caps on that day to show support in this project.

F. FALL ARTS AND CRAFTS BAZAAR

"We the Women" is the only woman's organization of this kind in Quitaque. Each year it sponsors a Fall Bazaar featuring hand-crafted items and home-baked foods for sale. A large majority of Quitaque women donate regularly to this event. Booths are also available to rent for the sale of hand-crafted items. This is a popular project and attracts visitors from a large area. Proceeds this year from the Bazaar brought a very nice, large piece of playground equipment for the City Park.

G. COMMUNITY CHRISTMAS TREE

This was the first year for the Chamber of Commerce, Lions Club and We the Women to jointly sponsor a Community Christmas Tree and carol singing. Some of the men brought a huge cedar tree from the breaks and it was placed on the lawn at the Community Center and covered with lights. As carols were sung the lights were turned on and were very impressive. The Lions Club provided a visit from Santa with bags of fruit and candy for all the children and fruit bags were also taken to the shut-ins.

Later a large group went caroling to the shut-ins and

finally had hot chocolate and cookies to top off the evening. This event was successful in getting more people from all walks of life—the blacks, hispanics and whites together and there was visiting with those you would seldom see at any other Community gathering. It is planned to make the Community Christmas Tree an annual event.

H. ACTIVE EMERGENCY MEDICAL TECHNICIANS AND VOLUNTEER FIREMEN

Quitaque is indeed fortunate in having twelve qualified Emergency Medical Technicians and three more who are now in class taught by the local EMTs. The sixteen volunteer firemen are also very well trained and have upgraded Quitaque's fire protection tremendously. Not only do these men and women take care of the community's needs, they are civic minded and always help in Community Clean-up days and remodeled an ugly old service station into an attractive brick building for a fire hall. This year they added an attractive garage attached to the fire hall to house the fire truck. They are at present time building a new structure in which to keep the

ambulance, auxiliary fire truck and Green Thumb van. They meet regularly once each week and are very valuable to Quitaque and the surrounding area in their unselfish service.

I. CHAMBER OF COMMERCE BANQUET

The first annual Chamber of Commerce Banquet was held this year with 75 persons attending. Kenneth Wyatt, a well-known banquet speaker and noted artist, was guest speaker.

J. BANQUET HONORING EMTs AND FIREMEN

"We the Women" sponsor an appreciation banquet in the spring each year with honored guests being the Firemen and EMTs. At this event they also announce the "Quitaque Man and Woman of the Year" and plaques are presented.

K. FIREMEN'S WOMEN'S AUXILLIARY

Wives of Quitaque Firemen are organized with fund raising projects going toward new fire fighting equipment for the community. This year they sold "Vial of Life"—a plastic tube containing health information about each family member. These are to be placed in a car's glove

compartment and in the refrigerator in the home. In case of an emergency this information could be found and readily available. They also keep a file on each person. The Firemen's Women's Auxiliary also sold Quitaque Cook Books (containing recipes of Quitaque women) and promotional Quitaque plaques.

M. NEW SENIOR CITIZEN ORGANIZATION

A few months ago a new Senior Citizens organization was begun. They have recently been granted their charter, have adopted by-laws and are setting their goal to have their own Senior Citizen building. At the present time they are meeting once each month at the Quitaque Community Center. These people have also been actively involved in helping with the meal on "Community-wide Clean-up Day" and many of them have helped out with hoes and washing windows.

FEEDING PROGRAMS FOR CATTLE GRAZING WHEAT AND OTHER PASTURES

The conditions are right. Good soil moisture and improved feeder cattle prices set the stage. Now the USDA PIK wheat grazeout program has assured intense wheat grazing this spring. Strong numbers of feeder calves and yearlings, and breeding cattle are being placed on lush green pasture.

Good gains are expected on these pastures. However, experience has shown that precise supplemental feeding is the key to unlocking the full gain potential of green pasture. Animal performance is the key to profits and ACCO Feeds has a complete line of supplemental feed products formulated to help achieve maximum animal performance in grazing cattle.

Several factors are involved in reaching top performance on lush green pasture. These include:

1. Supplemental Energy—There is a wide ratio of protein to energy in green pasture. The high water content of this pasture restricts daily dry matter consumption, and cattle don't consume enough energy to utilize the high protein level. A readily digested high energy supplemental feed consumed at 2.6 lbs. per day provides this extra energy and is converted to extra weight gain very efficiently.

2. Rate of Passage—Succulent pasture passes through the digestive system too rapidly for maximum efficiency of digestion. Providing a source of slowly digested fiber tends to slow the rate of passage of the green pasture, giving the opportunity for enhanced digestion.

3. Prevention of Grass Tetany—Lush green pasture is deficient in magnesium. To make matters worse, these pastures have extremely high potassium levels and potassium interferes with the uptake of magnesium in the animals digestive system. As magnesium stores in the body are depleted, the blood magnesium level can not be maintained and hypo-magnesium tetany can occur. This can occur in young stock and dry cows, but is most prevalent in cows that are nursing because of magnesium loss through the milk. Supplemental magnesium needs to be fed to cattle grazing lush green pasture to reduce the risk of tetany.

4. Prevention of Bloat—Lush green pasture may cause cattle to bloat. Legume pastures and wheat pasture are prone to cause bloating during periods of rapid plant growth. During these periods, rainy weather or heavy dew may increase bloatiness and cattle should be held off the lush pasture if possible. Before placing cattle on lush forage, fill the animals with coarse dry roughage, then provide continuous free-choice access to the coarse roughage during the grazing season to lower the incidence of bloat. Bloat Guard* (poloxalene) is a feed additive approved by the FDA for prevention of legume and wheat pasture bloat. This antifoaming agent should be added to the supplemental feed at a level that will provide the animal 1-2 grams of poloxalene per 100 lbs. body weight daily.

5. Improved Performance from Antibiotic Feed Additives—

(a) Zinc Bacitracin at 35-70 mg/head/day increases weight gain

and improves feed efficiency of cattle on pasture.

(b) Rumensin fed at a rate up to 200 mg/head/day to slaughter, stocker and feeder cattle weighing more than 400 lbs. increases the rate of weight gain on pasture.

Options Listed For Terrace Farmers

Attention! terrace farmers are you tired of having to rebuild terraces every few years and being out this maintenance expense. Then please read on.

Any farmer in Briscoe County who would be interested in planting the tops of his terraces to a permanent grass such as Switchgrass will find several advantages, including:

1. Reduced wear on terraces and erosion
2. Protects annual crops from wind damage
3. Breaks the wind velocity, therefore reducing loss of topsoil
4. Helps conserve winter moisture by catching snow between terraces to be later used by crops
5. Only a minimum amount of acreage is taken from crop

production, which is received back in increased production

Local farmers who have a desire to use this conservation practice on their farms should contact the Soil Conservation Service office for details.
