





AN ORDINANCE ORDERING A SPECIAL ELECTION TO BE HELD IN THE CITY OF QUITA-QUE, TEXAS, ON THE QUES-TION OF THE ADOPTION OF A ONE PERCENT (1%) LOCAL SALES AND USE TAX WITHIN THE CITY; DESIGNATING THE DAY OF THE ELECTION AND THE POLLING PLACE; APPOINT-NG ELECTION OFFICIALS THEREFOR; PROVIDING THAT ALL DULY QUALIFIED RESI-DENT ELECTORS SHALL BE QUALIFIED TO VOTE; PRE-SCRIBING FORM OF BALLOT; PROVIDING FOR NOTICE OF EL-ECTION; CONTAINING OTHER PROVISIONS RELATING TO

SAID ELECTION; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND DE-CLARING AN EMERGENCY. WHEREAS, Article 1066c, Vernons Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967. 60th Legislature, Regular Session Chapter 36, Page 62) authorize the governing body of any city, town or village in Texas to call an election for the purpose of adopting a local sales and use tax within such city, town or village




