Paving Project Discussed At Public Hearing

Representatives of the Texas Department of Transportation held a public hearing at the Floyd County Courthouse last Thursday evening. The purpose of the hearing was to provide information concerning a proposed farm road in northeast Floyd County and to hear comments from Floyd County residents concerning the possible future project.

Floyd County Judge Bill Hardin introduced TxDOT representatives, including Plainview Area Engineer Mike Craig, Lubbock District Right-of-Way Agent William T. Nichols, Lubbock District Environmental Coordinator Davis Melton, and several other TxDOT employees. Floyd County Commissioners George Taylor, Lennie Gilroy, and Jon Jones attended the session as did about fity local residents and land owners.

The road being considered 207 with FM 1065 in the northeast section of Floyd County According to Craig, the proposed highway would be two lanes, approximately 26 foot wide paving on a 100 foot rightof-way. The road would be designed to carry 70 mile per hour traffic.

State Highway offices emphasized that the county would be responsible for acquiring and clearing the right-of-way sometime after the summer of 1997 if preliminary state construction funds can be secured. State estimates for acquiring and clearing the right-of-way range from \$225,000.00 to \$278,436.00. These figures include federally mandated appraisers, review appraisers, compensating landowners, and relocating utilities. The amount of county funding required could be considerably less if land owners donate the right-of-way and accept responsibility for moving their own

fences and utilities. Federal regulations require that the land to be utilized as a right-of-way must be appraised and the appraisal must be reviewed to ensure that no one is being unnecessarily displaced or improperly compensated for their land.

According to Craig, the timetable for proceeding on the proposed project has been set in motion by the January 25th public hearing. After hearing public comment, Craig stated that anyone wishing to make a written comment could do so. Letters of comment are to be directed to him at P.O. Box 148, Plainview, Tx. 79072. Comments should inlude the name, address and reason for involve-

Work on the proposed project will continue with the environmental impact review and statement which should be complete by the early winter of 1997. Another public hearing would then be held.

The study will cover a wide area, determining what impact the proposed road project would have on the primary impact area bounded by State Highway 86 on the north, FM 1065 on the east, FM 97 on the south and State Highway 207 on the west.

At present, six alternative routes are being considered with costs estimated from zero (if no road is built) to more than \$6 million for the most expensive of the proposed routes. After determining the preferred roadway, a right-of-way map will be drawn. When that is approved, acuisition of right-of-way could begin, possibly in the summer of

When 75 percent of the rightof-way has been acquired, highway design plans could be drawn. Estimates for plan completion were placed at the fall of 1998 if right-of-way acquisition moves well. Requests for

state funding could be submitted in 1999 if all goes well.

At that time, the project would have to compete on a statewide basis for funding. Texas now allots \$15 million per year for new farm road construction. The road project in Floyd County will have to compete for funds on the basis of cost vs. benefit against all projects requesting funding in the year the request is submitted.

# **Thunder Junction Announces Deal** With Pepsi; Cooper To Build Arena

courtesy The Childress Index Pepsi -Cola is now part of Thunder Junction and roping great Roy Cooper of Childress has agreed to build a large calf roping arena as part of the Clarendon theme park, according to Stan McClendon, spokesman for Thunder Junction.

McClendon made the nouncement Monday during a meeting at Clarendon College.

'We've signed a five-year contract with Pepsi Cola and they have agreed to help us ensure that Thunder Junction will not fail," McClendon added. "Pepsi will provide a package worth about \$40,000 each year to promote our theme park and make sure it succeeds."

The proposed Cooper arena would have 48,000 square feet in the roping area.

This is going to be a huge facility and will cover well over an acre when it's finished,' McClendon said. Cooper told the Childress In-

dex this morning that no decision has been reached concerning the location of the proposed Museum of Champion Ropers. Several cities are under consideration as a site for the mu-

Preliminary drawings for the arena are expected to be avail-

able for the next meeting, set for late February or early March.

The theme park's water slide and go-cart track will open by Memorial Day, McClendon told about 75 supporters during the meeting.

"We have a window of about 100 days for our water slide and if we don't open by Memorial Day we'll be in trouble," added.

Speaking on behalf of the developer, Ralph Hatfield of Chicago, McClendon reported a stock option is being prepared and might be offered within 45 to 60 days.

"We have hundreds of plans, but we lack capital. This will helpus raise the money we need," he continued.

McClendon described trying to build a \$22 million theme park like eating an elephant-'it doesn't happen all at once."

But we've taken the first bite and that is the most important

Thunder Junction is located two miles east of Clarendon on State Highway 70. The City of Clarendon is expected to annex the property and provide water and sewer facilities.

#### Driver training key to school bus safety

COLLEGE STATION — How safe are the 1.2 million children riding on a school bus in Texas this morning? It may well depend on the training of their bus driver.

"Bus driver training won't be taking a back seat in Texas if the Texas Engineering Extension Service (TEEX) has its way," said Dr. G. Kemble Bennett, director of TEEX and Associate vice chancellor for engineering of the Texas A&M University

"We have teamed up with the Texas Department of Transportation and other groups to offer comprehensive behind-the-wheel school bus driver safety training one of only a handful of states to do so."

The latest figures from the Texas De-

partment of Public Safety show crashes involving school buses are up more than 20 percent since 1991. Injuries to school bus drivers and passengers have increased 55 percent in the past four years.

But school buses are the safest form of ground transportation and have an impressive safety record, according to the Texas Department of Transportation. For example, passenger cars were involved in 72.3 percent of all traffic crashes and 61.2 percent of all fatal crashes in a national report compiled in 1989. However, school buses were involved in only 0.2 percent of all crashes and 0.2 percent of fatalities for the same period, the agency reported.



#### GAS THIEVES

Q: I recently read somewhere that customers taking off without paying after filling their gas tanks is a top security problem for convenience store operators. What type of offense is this under Texas law and what are the penalties for it? What can the local police do to help?

R.A. Amarillo

A: The offense is theft, and depending on the amount of gas taken, it can be a Class B or Class C misdemeanor and carry a fine from \$1 to \$2000 and a jail sentence from 1 to 180 days. In my area, the police agencies catch quite a few of these violators. In most cases the clerks get the description of the driver, the vehicle, and the license plate off of the vehicle. Most gas pumps have alarms indicating when someone is there pumping gas.

#### Believe all you hear about catching colds?

COLLEGE STATION - During winter months, it's a good idea to keep warm and dry, but most health specialists will tell you, this has little to do with cold or flu prevention

"Common beliefs about how a person gets a cold are unfounded," said Dr. Carol Rice, a registered nurse and health specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Texas A&M University. "Many think that being out in cold or rainy weather, sitting in a draft, or coming inside from hot weather into a building cooled by air conditioning will bring on a cold. None of

these ideas are supported by research."
What causes colds are more than 200 viruses, she said. Adults average about six colds each year while children may have as many as nine colds a year.

"The reason colds occur more often during winter months is because people stay inside where viruses tend to be more concentrated," she said.

To reduce the incidence of colds it is mportant to always wash your hands with soap and water, and avoid hand contact with those who have colds, Rice said. Also, try to keep hands away from your mouth
