Bank Officers Named For Turkey Branch

The Turkey Peoples State Bank opened for business May 1, 1987 as the Memphis State Bank Turkey Branch. The Memphis State bank assumed \$5.9 million in 1,150

deposit accounts. Peoples State had total assets of \$6.8 million. Peoples' depositors automatically became customers of the new bank.

Chief executive officers are Stanley Williamson, Chairman of the Board, Bert Williamson, Assistant Chairman; Bob Nicks, President; Sonny Hilburn Jr., Sr. Vice President; and Roger Ferguson, Cashier.

It was announced that Wilda Fuston will serve as assistant cashier at the Turkey Branch, and DeLane Proctor, Cindy Lane, Mary Beth Adamson, Bonnie Hill and Joan Crowell will continue to be employed at the Branch Bank.

President Nicks explained changes in state banking laws and how these changes the citizens of Turkey can still have convenient banking services.

The people of Turkey seem to be happy with the banking situation as banking can be handled in the usual efficient way.

Farmers Invited To Run For Co. Committee

Eligible farmers in Briscoe County are invited to become nominees for the Farmers Home Administration county committee, FmHA County Supervisor Becky D. Via announced today.

As a result of the 1985 farm bill, two of the three members of FmHA county committees must be elected. The third member is appointed by FmHA. The Briscoe County Committee assists the FmHA county office in reviewing application for FmHA farm loans and on other farm credit matters.

Generally, farmers who are residents of the county but not FmHA borrowers are eligible to become nominees for the FmHA county committee.

"Farmers in this county, serving on the committee, can play an important role by assisting in the process of loan applications and reviews," said Ms. Via. Nominating petitions must be returned to the FmHA Briscoe county office by June 10th, 1987.

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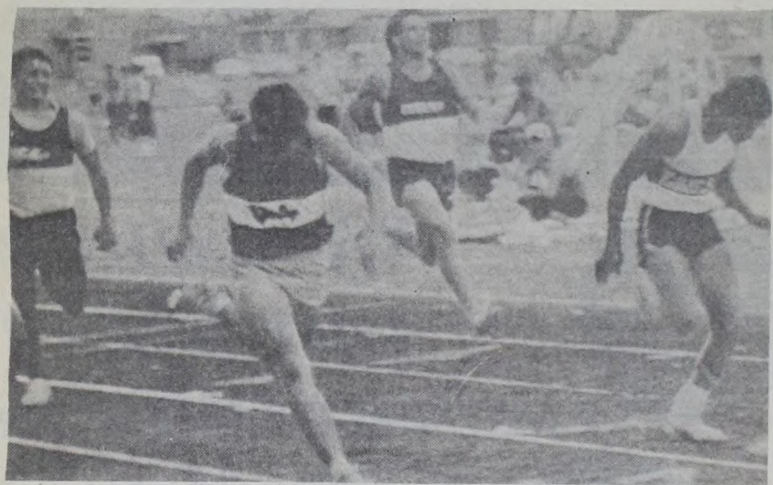

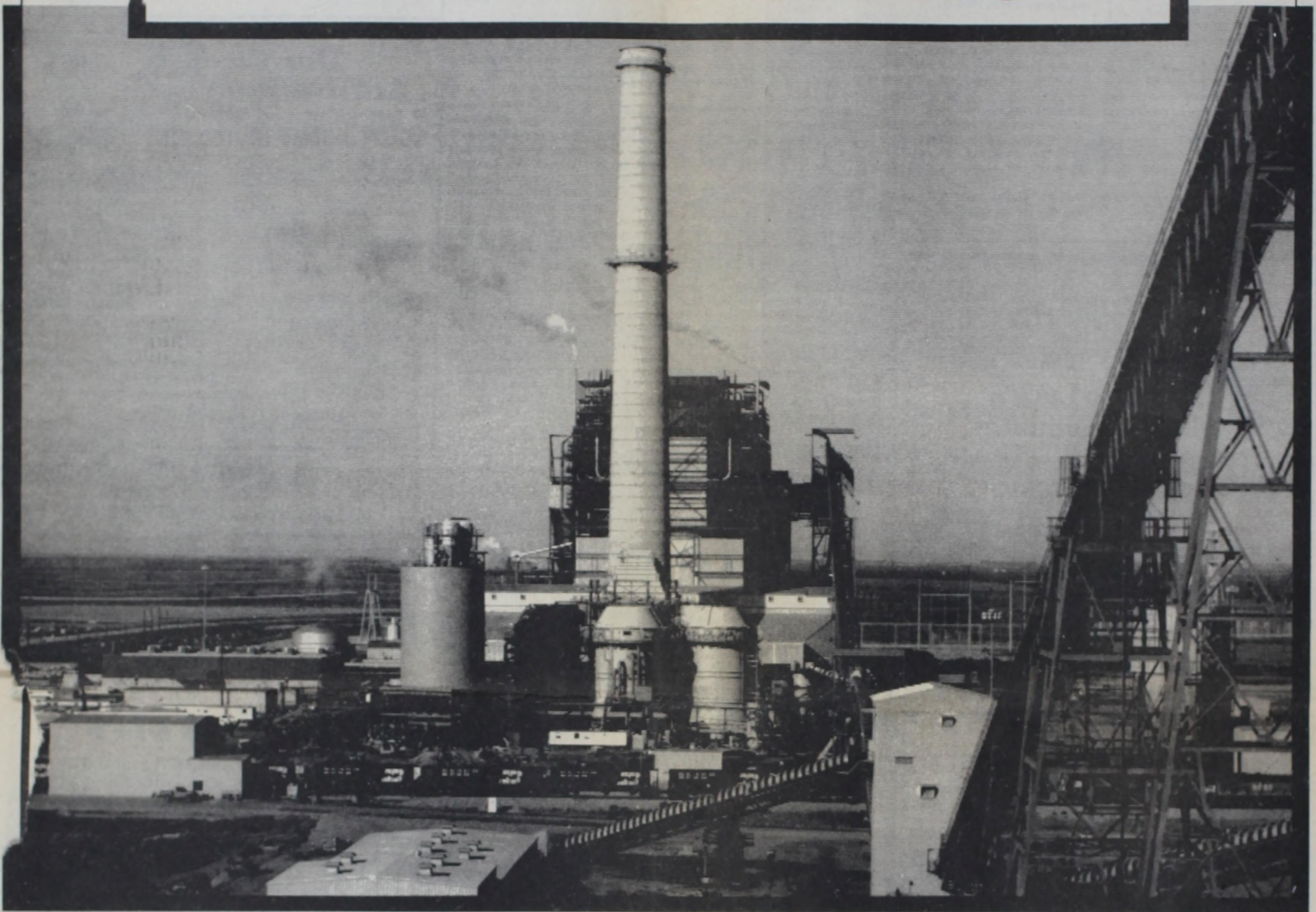

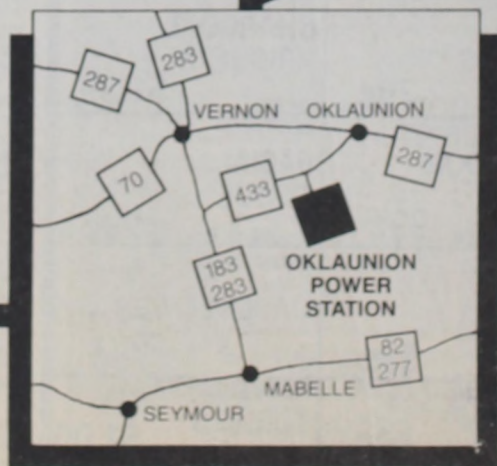
