The dangerous toxin Fumonisin (foo-MON-is-in) has been found in texas 2002 corn crop. The toxin can be fatal to horses and rabbits. The Iexas State Chemist reports that forty-nine percent of the corn analyzed
is above recommended levels. The problem is not located in a specific area of the state. Fumonisin positive samples have come from crops around Waco, Austin, Kerrville, and Victoria.
