\section*{FEWHE FIRST AIRPLANE, PLUS A} One December 17, 1903, Orville Wright flew the first airplane, as we an know. Then, only seven years later in
Mitchell County at Colorado City, word was received by telegraph that the first airplane to fly over Mitchell County would land at Colorado City the next day. The city Mayor reported that the whistles would blow and all the bells would ring whenever
the airplane was sighted. It would be just above the tree tops the airplane was sighted. It would be just above the tree tops.
The people were all excited and waited all day, but no airplane arrived. We found out later the pilot could not get it off the ground at Big Springs, Texas, which was only thirty air miles
away, but would be there the next morning. We all got up early away, but would be there the next morning. We all got up early
the next morning and gathered around a flat of land close to the the next morning and gathered around a flat of land close to the
Colorado river. At about 10:00 a.m. the whistles began to blow and the bells began to ring. As we looked toward the west, a speck appeared in the sky and began to grow larger. It was a
treat to our eyes, for never before had we ever seen an airplane treat to our eyes, for never before had we ever seen an airplane
which came in and landed safely. It had two wheels about the size of bicycle wheels, two wings, one above the other about four and straps motor was suspended between the wings with cables plow seat, and was over to one side so he could look ahead and control the plane. He had nothing for protection but the clothes he wore. He also had a leather harness around his shoulders so wings and cause the plane to climb or go down. The pilot's mother would follow by train. She came on the evening passenger train. The next morning the people from all over several other men were instructed to hold on to the plane until he got the motor speeded up, and at a given signal they would let

Now before swathing for hay you must make you
intentions known to your

ASCS office by designating
the ACR acreage and by signing a register in the
office, stating the intended use of the hay.
The same prccedure will be
necessary for those producer necessary for those producers
who plan to graze ACR acres past May 31st.
The cover on ACR must not The cover on ACR must not will cause wind and water erosion. Producers who do not
have their own livestock cannot charge for the value of harvested for hay when used by another person.
You will be permitted to
