

The Goodnight herd that was the talk of the country did not come easy. It was a product of careful watching, cutting, and breeding over long years by Goodnight and his top men.

J. B. Jenkins, now of Flouded.

J. B. Jenkins, now of Floydada, Texas, and an early "F" cowboy, believes that the "F" cattle were the best, and Bascom Jenkins left plenty of horse tracks throughout

plenty of horse tracks throughout the southwestern cattler country. Goodnight and Moore operated the "F" Ranch as the Goodnight High Grade Cattle Company until around 1890 when Goodnight stepped out of the picture and Moore continued to operate the ranch under the firm name. Many and varied reasons have been and varied reasons have been given as to why Moore and Goodnight dissolved partnerships. Some say that Goodnight was forced to sell; others say that he could not afford not to sell; while others say that the two men were disagreement on policies-that they belly-ached at each other. It seems more reasonable to believe that Goodnight made a good deal and let the "F

Whatever the reason, Charles Goodnight disappeared forever from the "F" Ranch scene and moved up on the Fort Worth and Denver Railroad east of Amarillo, Texas. He established the town that bore his name, built a college for the young people of West Texas, and continued his experiments with beef animals. Mrs Goodnight continued to hold shares in the Goodnight High Grade Cattle Company with L. R. Moore as president, for some length of

Lysander R. Moore had his ups and downs as sole owner of the "F" Ranch. Settlers were pushing into the country and many of them were not friendly toward the new owner. Howard of Biloxi, Mississippi. In Later sales for sizeable considerations, Ho-ward bought over one hundred thousand acres of "F" Ranch land, but the Goodnight High Grade Cattle Company leased the land Cattle Company leased the land back from Howard and continued

But things grew more tense on the "F". In September of 1898, many windmills on the ranch were burned to the ground when opponents climbed to the top of the towers, poured kerosene down the side, and set matches to the soaked

During his administration of the ranch, Moore made no more than ordinary changes. Most of the old Goodnight men remained on the ranch. Barton continued as manager and J. B. Jenkins recalls that Rex Edolmon became a boss about this time.

The Lysander R. Moore era of

the "F" Ranch came to a close on November 15, 1898 when the Goodnight High Grade Cattle Company transferred by bill of sale for a consideration of \$100,000 to Crostwell Cattle Company the following described property: 1st-Entire stock of cattle known as "F" herd running in Floyd, Motley, Briscoe, Hall, and adjoining counties, branded as follows: "F" on left hip or left side and "1F" on left side, conveying all cattle bearing said brands situated as above described except steer calves of year 1898, said steer calves of year 1898, said steer calves being branded "F" on left hip and 8 on left shoulder. 2nd--About 75 head of bulls branded Quarter Circle J on left side. 3rd--All horses and mules on said ranch belonging to Goodnight High Grade Cattle Company in above described brands. 4th-All improvements, leases, implements of every kind whatsoever located on ranch belogning to Goodnight High Grade Cattle Company

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Lines From Lynda

If stress from daily problems is controlling your life and affecting your health, it's time for you to take

It's not what happens to you but how you react to it that causes stress. One of the first steps in managing stress is to recognize the situations that make you feel stressed and tense. When you can identify your particular sources of stress, you have taken a first step in being able to take control.

Stressors usually are of three typer-psychological, physical, and external. Psychological stressors are chronic worrying, repressing feelings, low self-esteem, strong emotions, and excessive competi-

An individual's own high expectations can be a major source of psychological stress. When unrealistically high goals are set, a feeling of failure or guilt can result when the goals are not met. The "Supermom" syndrome experienced by many employed mothers is an example of this type of stress. Children and teens can also experience stress from overly high expecta-

tions from parents.

To control these psychological stressors, recognize your time and energy limitations and accept that your best is good enough. Talk to friends or family about your concerns. If you are a chronic worrier, you might be interested to know that 95 percent of what we worry about never happens. Most of what

does happen, is beyond our control. Physical stressors are lack of sleep, poor nutrition, smoking, alco-hol abuse, and significant weight gain or loss. These are areas over which we have control. Improving nutrition, eliminating smoking and alcohol, and beginning an exercise program can reduce these stressors. Leep breathing and relaxation techniques als nelp.

External stresso, s are caused by

job changes, death in the family, moving, excessive demands on your time at work or at home, or financial difficulties. These stressors are more difficult to handle, but the key is to feel that you are in control. Improve your time and money management. These are skills you can learn. Seek help from professionals in managing grief and loss if you are having difficulty dealing with death or divorce.

Simply learning to recognize that there are some situations be-yond our control can help tremendously in reducing the stress over

If all these methods fail and you feel like your problems are over-whelming you, look around you to those with more problems, alcohol ism, and family crises. Take time to visit one of these families and see stress should vanish




