Large Crowd Attends Athletic Banquet Monday Night At Valley High School

The prettiest banquet I have ever attended. That statement was made by WTSU head football coach and Athletic Director Gene Mayfield at the Valley High School Athletic Banquet Monday night as he spoke to the large crowd in attendance. That statement was relayed by just about everyone who attended the affair for the auditorium was beautifully and tastefully decorated.

Recognition was given to outstanding individuals on the teams and they were as follows:

In girls basketball Coach David Sanders said that it was impossible to select an individual on the forward end because their statistics were so near the same. He said that in his coaching career he had had two girls on the forward end but he had never had three players who had to be guarded all the time. Michelle Lipscomb was the top scorer over the season with 420 points. Eva Cheatham was the best shooter percentage-wise and she scored 611 points over the season. Janna Turner was the best free shooter on the team and she scored 500 points for the season. So the top scorer, Michelle Lipscomb, scored just 21 points more over the full season (35 games) than did the third scorer, Janna Turner, with one player in between.

You can hardly beat that kind of balance.

Coach Sanders expressed his own appreciation for one of his guards, who, after playing forward for a couple of years in junior high and three years in high school, then unselfishly switched to guard and became a very good one. She is Cheri Brown and Cheri was the top rebounder for the Patriots, averaging 10 per game. Cookie Dowd, another converted forward, was selected as the Most Valuable Guard. Connie Ferguson was the other starting guard and all six of the girls were named on the all-district team.

On the boys basketball team, Coach Bill Hulsey said that Randy Green was the free throw shooter with the best average; Top Rebounder was Pepper Jones; Best Offensive Player was Pepper Jones; Best Defensive Player was Eric Lucero.

Ricky Hall was named the Outstanding Track Man and Ricky was also named the recipient of the Fighting Patriot Award, lettering in three sports: Football, Basketball and Track.

Just about everyone agreed that the banquet Monday night was top in every department. A big thanks goes to the Valley Booster Club, who sponsored the event. It was a good one!

Cancer Society To Hold Bike-A-Thon Saturday, May 18

Saturday, May 18 from 9:00 until 12:00 noon is the day for the Bike-A-Thon sponsored by the American Cancer Society. Registration will begin at 9:00 Saturday morning at the Turkey City Hall. The ride will begin at 9:30.

This is not a race. All persons between the age of nine and 69 who like to ride bicycles are urged to enter. After registration, the event will begin with a pace setter, Clyde Rogers, leading the group west from City Hall to a country road on the west side of town. Each time the riders return to City Hall, they will have ridden five miles. This trip will be repeated four times for the twenty mile course.

Each participant should obtain as many sponsors as possible. For each mile ridden, the sponsor will pay a minimum of ten cents. The money will not be collected before the ride, but must be collected after the ride when the rider returns to the sponsor with proof that he has ridden. The money will be turned in at the City Hall May 24. Three trophies will be given to the three participants who collect the most money. Other prizes will be drawn for on the 24th.

Bob Wills Dead At 70

Turkey's favorite and most famous "home town boy," Jim Bob Wills, 70, died Tuesday in a Fort Worth hospital where he had been a patient for more than a year following a severe stroke. Bob suffered a massive stroke in May, 1969 that left him paralyzed on one side.

Although he was not born in Turkey, Bob called Turkey his hometown and in 1972 that community held its first Bob Wills Day Celebration in his honor. Bob Wills Day has since become an annual affair. The town of Turkey bought the old Turkey school property and renamed it Bob Wills Memorial Center and built a monument in his honor at the west end of Main Street. Bob attended the first two celebrations.

Born in Limestone County, Texas, March 3, 1905, Bob was the

first of nine children born to Mr. and Mrs. John Wills. The family moved to Turkey in 1914. At the age of 16 Bob went to Munday to live for a short time, then went to barber college, returning to Turkey to live.

He left Turkey in 1929 with a medicine show, then was hired to play on the Light Crust Doughboys radio show in Fort Worth. He left the Light Crust Doughboys in 1933, going to Waco where he formed another band. From there he went to Tulsa where his band became known as the Texas Playboys.

Bob composed many songs, although his most famous song is "San Antonio Rose," one that became a classic and is still heard very often. The Texas Playboys in their heyday were reported to be the highest paid band in the country.

Bob Wills was installed in the Country-Western Hall of Fame in Nashville, Tennessee in 1963. Funeral services were pending at this writing, although it has been reported that he will be buried at Tulsa.
