The first loads of 1973 The first loads of 1973 - crop wheat have been brought to the elevators here in the valley with Bob Jones of White Flat bringing in the first load to Selliff Eleva-tors at Turkey on Tuesday, June 5. At the time this report was made to The Tribune, Mr. Jones had not completed harvesting his crop and the average per acre was not known, but Arville Setliff reports that to date all the wheat that has been harvested has been good.

Elevator mana-ger Arville Selliff said that the local wheat that has come in has been averaging from 20 to 40 bu-shels per acre, which is a pretty good dryland crop. Much of the wheat was grazed through the winter, thus giving the farmers a good double-barreled crop.

The price of wheat right now is pretty good, too, so if the farmer can harvest his crop it will be very worthwhile.

According to Mr. Setliff, the big

problem right now is getting com-bines to cut the wheat. There has been no reported shortage of fuel right now. There has been some damage to wheat crops in spots over the area from hail that fell last week and the week before but it was not widespread.




