Patriots Go For District Title Fall Bazaar Will Be Held Saturday In Quitaque

The Valley Patriots, who had already wrapped up the Zone Championship, kept their district slate clean by defeating Claude 13-0 at Claude last Friday night. The Patriots are playing the Lazbuddie Longhorns at Plainview tonight (Thursday) starting at 7:30 o'clock.

The Patriots are the defending Zone and District Champions, having won the district by defeating Amherst at Plainview a year ago. Valley has won eight games and lost one game this season.

Last Friday night's game was played in near-freezing weather and the Mustangs played the Patriots tough. Neither team was able to muster very much offense in the first period of play. Ray Williams picked off a Mustang pass and ran it back 25 yards for a touchdown in the first quarter, and the try for extra point was missed, giving Valley a 6-0 lead at the end of the first quarter.

Midway of the second quarter, the Patriots put on a good drive that wound up with James McNary pushing across a touchdown from one yard out. Mike Dowd kicked the extra point, giving the Patriots a 13-0 lead at halftime. That was all the scoring for the night. Valley ran another touchdown that was called back due to a penalty.

The Patriots were their own worst enemies, committing a number of miscues in the form of fumbles and penalties, mostly off-sides and illegal motion. These mistakes have hurt the Patriots all season long, but they have been able to overcome

their mistakes.

Statistically speaking, the Patriots had one of their poorest nights of all season long. Valley had 12 first downs to six for Claude. Valley rushed for 130 yards to Claude's 112. Valley gained 62 yards on four pass completions out of ten attempts. Claude attempted eight passes, completing one for three yards. Valley was penalized eight times for 70 yards, while Claude was penalized four times for 20 yards.

Looking ahead to Thursday night's game, Valley Head Coach Ted Giddens says that the teams are similar. He stated that the Longhorns have some speed and play tough defense. The Longhorns have won eight and lost two this season. One of those losses was to the Silverton Owls, but Coach Giddens stated that the Longhorns are playing better football now than they were at the time of their loss to Silverton. It figures to be a close game. The Patriots probably will be favored to win by a very small margin.

Valley will be the visiting team at Plainview Thursday night and their fans are asked to sit in the east stands. It is hoped that a large crowd will follow the Patriots as they attempt to win their second district championship. See you there!

West Texas Utility Company Files For Rate Increase

West Texas Utilities Company has filed for an increase in wholesale rates for electric energy it supplies to 14 rural electric cooperatives and one municipality.

The increase would average 10.6 percent, and for most of the co-ops would be the first increase in base rates in 15 years. Most of them have been buying power from WTU under contract initiated in 1965.

WTU, in its filing with the

Federal Energy Regulatory Commission in Washington, estimated that the increase would amount to \$2,261,349 in additional revenue for the Company during the 1980 calendar year.

The increase would be effective January 1, 1980. All of the existing co-op contracts expire on December 31, 1979. The contract with Sonora, which is the municipality involved, expires December 31, 1983, but contains provisions for rate changes.

W. P. (Bill) Sayles, WTU's vice president for customer services, said rising costs of providing service made the increase necessary. "Fifteen years without an increase is a long time," he said, "especially in a period of inflation."

He said the proposed rate structure is designed not only to bring charges to wholesale customers more in line with WTU's increased cost of service, but to encourage the co-ops to level their loads.

This incentive is provided in a demand charge, based on a ratchet clause which allows WTU to bill these wholesalers for up to 80 percent of their peak demands over a 12-month period and helps level costs over the year. It also gives them the opportunity to actually decrease the unit cost of electric energy and minimize costs to their customers by shifting load to off-peak periods.

"We chose the demand charge because we feel it will be beneficial to the co-ops and their customers, and to the overall efforts to conserve energy," Sayles said.

"Without such a provision there is no incentive or benefit for the wholesale customers to implement load management programs."

Sayles said the proposed new contract had been discussed with all of the co-op managers and their engineering consultants be-

Districts Being Realigned For 1980

Starting with the 1980-81 school year, Class B will be a thing of the past. The classification will become Class A, and the rest of the classes throughout the state will add an "A".

In other words, AAAA will become AAAAA; AAA will become AAAAA and so on down the line. Next year's cutoff point for AAAAA will be 1,310 students, according to the latest University Interscholastic League realignment notice. The cutoff for AAAA is 1,309 down to 615. The AAA enrollment figure will include schools with 265 students up to 614. Schools in the AA class will have between 135 and 264 students, while all those below 135 will be in Class A.

Claude will move out of Silverton's district to compete in District 1-A with Booker, Follett, Groom, McLean and Miami.

Silverton's district will be numbered 2-A, and competition will be between Amherst, Anton, Happy, Lazbuddie, Motley County, Nazareth, Silverton, Smyer, Sudan, Sundown, Valley and Whiteface. Undoubtedly, the teams will continue to compete in a North Zone and South Zone situation, since each team plays only ten games during the regular season.

ORDINANCE NO. 79-07
 BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TURKEY, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. There is hereby created the office of Animal Warden. The Animal Warden shall be appointed by the City Council and shall perform such duties and receive such compensation as shall be prescribed by the City Council and this ordinance.

SECTION 1-1. It shall be the duty of the Animal Warden or any of his deputies or any city policeman on duty to seize or impound, subject to the provisions of this ordinance, animals found running at large in violation of this ordinance, whether in the immediate presence of the owner or custodian or otherwise.

SECTION 1-2. Any animal found trespassing or running at large on any person's private property may be taken up by

that person and delivered to the Animal Warden or his deputies; but no such person is authorized hereby to destroy such animal, such authority for the destruction of any animal being hereby specifically reserved to the Animal Warden or any of his deputies or any police officer.

SECTION 1-3. Every person, other than a police officer, the Animal Warden or his deputies, who takes up any dog or cat under the provisions of this ordinance shall immediately thereafter give notice thereof to the Animal Warden, and every such person, or any person in whose custody the animal may in the meantime be placed, shall deliver such animal to the Animal Warden without fee or charge, and the Animal Warden shall thereupon hold and dispose of such animal as though such animal had been found running at large and impounded by him.

SECTION 2. Definitions. When used in this ordinance the following words and terms shall be interpreted as follows:

SECTION 2-1. Running at Large - Shall pertain to an animal off the premises of the owner and not under the physical, visible or audible control of the owner or his authorized representative. An animal intruding upon the property of another person other than the owner, shall be termed "Running-at-Large."

SECTION 2-2. Owner - Any person who has the right of property in an animal or who harbors an animal or allows an animal to remain about his premises for a period of seven (7) days.

SECTION 2-3. Harboring - The act of keeping and caring for an animal or providing a premise to which the animal returns for food, shelter or care.

SECTION 2-4. Vicious Animal - Any animal that commits an unprovoked attack upon a person or constitutes physical threat to human beings or other animals.

SECTION 2-5. Public Nuisance - Any animal which:
 1. Molests passersby or passing vehicles
 2. Attacks other animals
 3. Trespasses on school grounds
 4. Is repeatedly at large
 5. Damages private or public property
 6. Barks, whines or howls in an excessive continuous or untimely fashion

SECTION 2-6. Stray Animals - Any animal for which there is no identifiable owner or harborer.

SECTION 2-7. Rabies Vaccination - Shall mean the vaccination of an animal with an anti-rabies vaccine approved by Texas Department of Health and administered by a veterinarian licensed by the State of Texas.

SECTION 3. Rabies Control.
 SECTION 3-1. Vaccinations - Every owner of an animal shall have every animal vaccinated at three (3) months of age or older against rabies. Such vaccinated animal shall be revaccinated once during each twelve (12) calendar month period. Owners of animals moving from a location outside the city limits of the City of Turkey shall comply with these regulations within fifteen (15) days after moving into the city limits of the City of Turkey.

SECTION 3-2. Certificate of Vaccination - Upon vaccination, the veterinarian shall execute and furnish the owner of the animal or evidence thereof a certificate upon a form furnished by the veterinarian.

SECTION 3-3. Rabies Tags - Concurrent with the issuance and delivery of the certificate of vaccination referred to in Section 3-2, the owner of the animal shall cause to be attached to the collar or harness of the vaccinated animal a metal tag, serially numbered to correspond with

SECTION 3-4. Duplicate Tags - In the event of loss or destruction of the original tag provided in Section 3.3, the owner of the animal shall obtain a duplicate tag.

SECTION 3-5. Proof - It shall be unlawful for any person who owns or harbors a vaccinated animal to fail or refuse to exhibit his copy of the certificate of vaccination upon demand to any person charged with the enforcement of these regulations.

SECTION 3-6. Harboring Unvaccinated Animals - It shall be unlawful for any person to harbor any animal which has not been vaccinated against rabies, as provided herein, or which cannot be identified as having a current vaccination certificate.

SECTION 4. Reporting Bites and Related Procedures.
 SECTION 4-1. Any person receiving an animal bite shall report such incidence to the proper authority or animal control officer. In addition that animal shall be impounded and observed by a licensed veterinarian under the rules commonly and universally accepted as being suitable.

SECTION 4-2. The owner of any impounded animal redeeming the same shall be liable for all charges and expenses incurred by the impounding of the animal. In addition, the owner of any impounded animal which is unvaccinated shall cause the animal to be duly vaccinated prior to its release.

SECTION 5-1. It shall be unlawful for any person to maintain or keep an animal three months of age or older without a collar or harness attached firmly to the animal. In addition the collar or harness shall display a valid vaccination tag.

SECTION 6. Animals Running At Large.
 SECTION 6-1. It shall be unlawful for any animal to be off the owner's premises and not under the physical, visible or audible control of the owner or his authorized representative. Such animals shall be impounded.

SECTION 6-2. It shall be unlawful for any owner of any female animal to allow said animal to run at large while in season (stage of estrus), regardless of any other provisions contained in this regulation.

SECTION 7. Impounded Animals.
 SECTION 7-1. Impoundment - Animals owned or harbored in violation of this regulation shall be taken into custody by an Animal Warden or other designated official and impounded at the impoundment facilities at the City Hall for not less than three (3) days. At the end of this period of time, such animal shall be taken to a veterinarian or a veterinary clinic for disposal. The name and addresses of the veterinarian or veterinary clinic to which such animals are taken (or currently being taken) shall be kept on file with the City Secretary, and any changes in such location shall be noted immediately at the Secretary's Office.

SECTION 7-2. Redemption of Animals - The owners shall be able to redeem any animal at any time prior to the disposal of the animal upon payment of a handling fee of \$5.00 to the City of Turkey, Texas, such fee to double with each impounding event concerning said animal, plus the cost of boarding the animal at the impounding facility.

SECTION 7-3. At such time of redemption of animal, unless currently complied with, owner shall vaccinate the animal in accordance with this ordinance.

SECTION 8. Penalties.
 SECTION 8-1. Whenever in this ordinance an act is prohibited or is made or declared to be unlawful or an offense or a misdemeanor, or wherever in such ordinance the doing of any act is required or the failure to do any act is declared to be unlawful, where no specific penalty is provided therefor, the violation of any such provision of this ordinance shall be punishable by a fine or not exceeding \$200.00, provided, however, that no penalty shall be greater or less than the penalty provided for the same or a similar offense under the laws of the State of Texas. Each day any violation of this ordinance shall continue shall constitute a separate offense.

SECTION 9. Savings.
 SECTION 9-1. The sections, paragraphs, sentences, clauses, and phrases of this ordinance

are severable, and if any phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph or section of this ordinance shall be declared unconstitutional by a valid judgment or decree of a court of competent jurisdiction, such unconstitutionality shall not affect any of the remaining phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs, and sections of this ordinance.

The fact that there does not now exist a method in the City of Turkey for controlling the animals constitutes a danger to the public health and creates an emergency and therefore the rule requiring the reading of the ordinance at three (3) consecutive meetings is hereby suspended.

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URBAN VOTE FOR AMENDMENT SHOWS SUPPORT FOR SMALL FARMS

Passage of a constitutional amendment providing a state guaranteed loan program for small, beginning farmers is, according to the Texas Farmers Union, a sign that "urban consumers understand the importance of protecting a family farm system of agriculture."

TFU President Jay Naman said his organization, which was the most vocal in promoting passage of Proposition 3 on the November 6 ballot, has held the belief for years that "the general public wants government programs that help the 'little guy' survive and are opposed to ha-

ving Texas agriculture fall into the grips of corporate, foreign and absentee ownership."

"The passage of the Family Farm Security Act funding proposal by voters in Houston, Dallas, and other large metropolitan areas," said Naman, "confirms a belief that Farmers Union has always had. The consumer fully endorses the family farm as opposed to giant, vertically integrated agribusiness that would do all the producing, processing and pricing much like the oil companies."

"What the public is disgusted with," he continued, "is doling out millions in low-interest loans and price supports to huge operators with unlimited assets who don't need the help, but who always seem to be first in line to get their checks."

The Farmers Union has historically sought federal farm programs that put limits on the size of farming operations that receive benefits. That position has, on several occasions, split Farmers Union apart from other farm organizations and is the basis of a current rift between many Texas cotton farmers and corporate cotton interests in California and Arizona who are collecting millions annually in government payments and subsid-

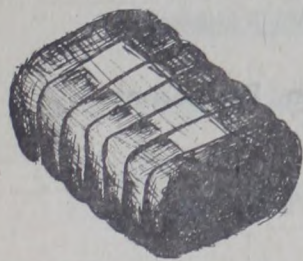

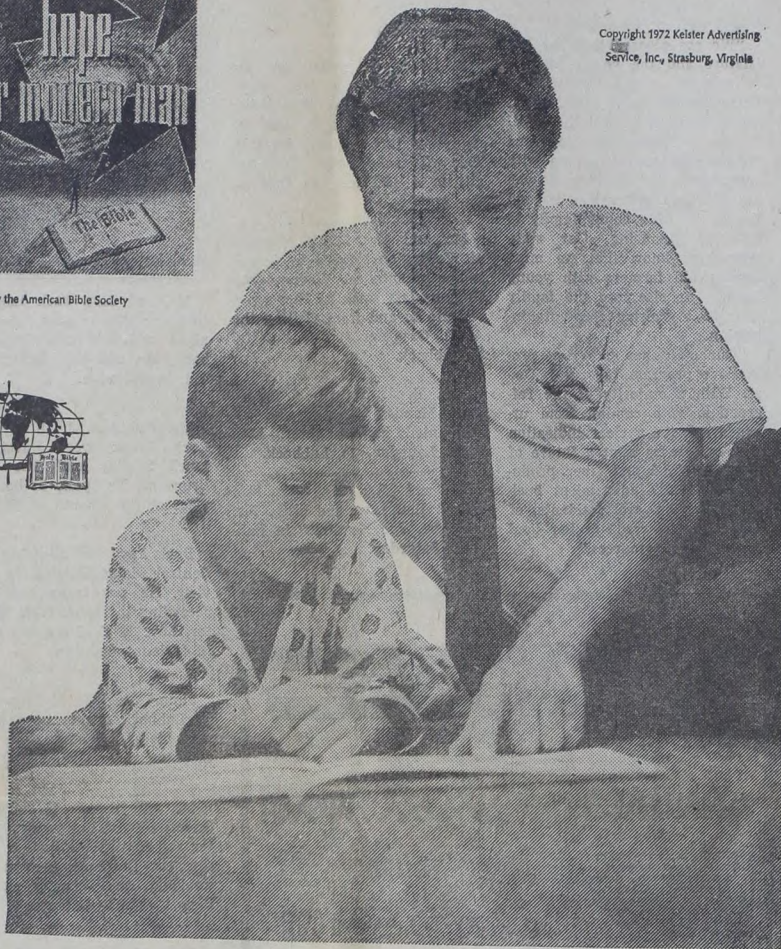

April 1 To Mark Decennial Census

April 1, 1980 is the date that will mark the Twentieth Decennial Census of the United States, County Judge Lester Campbell has been notified by the Bureau of Census.
 J. B. Scott, former manager of the Memphis office of West Texas Utilities Company, has been named by the judge to serve as

liaison from Hall County to work with the Census Bureau.

"During the taking of the 1970 census, I heard many people complain that the enumerators were asking too many personal questions," Judge Campbell stated, "and the same will very likely be true again this time. It seems to me that some of the information requested is going a little too far, but I know of nothing that we can do about it."

It is highly important, it was emphasized, that every resident of Hall County be counted. Campbell explained that an accurate count is valuable to any area when the "one person-one vote" principle is involved in re-districting for state legislatures, county commissioners court, and even city councils.

In addition, the census figures are used extensively in determining how the federal government distributes billions of dollars to states, to counties, and to cities. Revenue Sharing funds, which have been highly important in local governments for several years, are based in part on the population of the various areas.

"I realize that it is still early to be very concerned about an accurate count," Judge Campbell said, "but all citizens should keep the April 1, 1980, date in mind, and make certain that all family members are included in the final enumeration."
