## STUBBLE - MULCH FARMING IS YEAR - ROUND OPERATION

Stubble-mulch farming is a year-round tillage system that utilizes crop residues to prevent soil blowing and conserves soil and water. All tilling, planting, cultivating and harvesting operations are performed to maintain a sufficient amount of residue on the surface for soil protection.

Soil blowing is a serious problem in the Silvertown and Quitaque

splashes and wind and increases the amount of moisture entering the soil. The organic matter eventually decays and returns to the soil as humus.

Stubble-mulching is very useful on sloping lands to retard runoff, hold snow, increase infiltration, conserve moisture and reduce wind erosion.

### Tax Workshop To Be Held In Quitaque

As the end of the year approaches, agricultural producers begin to turn their thoughts toward the upcoming income tax report that each must file. This annual event, which no one looks forward to but everyone will be involved in, requires many hours of planning and preparation. A thorough knowledge of the workings of the Federal Income Tax procedure is a must for all producers to keep from over-paying as well as under-paying the yearly tax. Many producers utilize a tax accountant to keep up with and prepare their yearly tax report but the professional who prepares the returns has only the information provided him to go by in preparing the return. Every producer should see that he is provided with the necessary information to prepare the most accurate return possible.

A "Farmers' and Ranchers' Income Tax Workshop" will be held in Quitaque Thursday, November 30, at 7:30 p.m. in the Community Room of the First National Bank. Mr. Marvin Sartin, Area Economist-Management, with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service stationed in Lubbock, will be in Quitaque to discuss ways of managing operations that will provide the producer with the best advantage when it comes time to prepare his tax returns. There is still ample time to make tax-based decisions before the end of the year but if producers wait until time to prepare their returns it will be too late to make any changes. During the meetings last year, several producers became aware of tax laws and rules that saved them large amounts of money. One producer learned that he had paid approximately \$800.00 too much because of a misinterpretation of the investment credit rules. Another saved paying a large amount of taxes during the year because of the ruling governing sale of cattle during a drought.

Everyone is invited to this meeting. If you are interested in learning more about the income tax structure or have specific questions concerning your own situation, please plan to attend this meeting.

**Most Texas Birds Are Protected**

AUSTIN—Quail season is coming up and the mourning dove is getting a breather until January.

Don't be tempted to take a potshot at a bluejay just to stay in practice.

Of the more than 500 species of birds in Texas, each falls into one of three categories: game, nongame and unprotected.

Game birds are protected and hunted during regular seasons and cause little confusion.

Considerable controversy, however, rages over nongame and unprotected birds.

According to state and federal regulations, only three birds may be shot at any time. English sparrows, European starlings and feral pigeons may be killed at any time and their eggs and nests destroyed.

The federal government protects hundreds of species, most of which are also guarded by state law, including all song birds, raptors, shore birds, other nongame species and all game birds.

In March, 1972, the U. S. and Mexico agreed to add 32 families of migratory nongame birds to the protected list and caused some misunderstandings.

Several birds which formerly could be hunted are now protected by the act.

The disputed species are crows, grackles, red-winged blackbirds and cowbirds.

These birds are still unprotected by state law and the federal government has amended its ruling to permit control if the birds are "found committing or about to commit depredations upon ornamental or shade trees, agricultural crops, livestock, or wildlife, or when concentrated in such numbers and manner as to constitute a health hazard or other nuisance."

Hunting protected birds can draw a fine of up to \$500.

**SAVING-POSTPONED SPENDING**

"Saving is postponed spending—taking some of what you have today and putting it to work tomorrow," one expert said this week.

Lynn Bourland, home management specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, explained saving as a "positive act leading to a goal—not a negative act of self-denial."

Savings aid in meeting emergencies, in buying items outside the

cultural Extension Service station in Lubbock.

**NUMBER TWO MAN CHOSEN**

**FOR USDA'S FARMERS HOME ADMINISTRATION**

Appointment of Darrel A. Dunnas as Associate Administrator of the Farmers Home Administration was announced today by Secretary of Agriculture Earl L. Butz. In assuming this position, Mr. Dunn becomes the back-up man for Administrator James V. Smith, head of the U. S. Department of Agriculture's rural credit agency. Mr. Dunn has two decades of experience in agricultural credit work and now will share responsibility for conduct of a program which will invest more than \$3.2 billion in rural America this year. His first assignment with FHA was as Kansas State Director from 1953 to 1957. He served as an Assistant Administrator from 1957 to 1961, and subsequently worked for a decade with the Agency for International Development as an agricultural credit advisor in Ankara, Turkey, and New Delhi, India.

Mr. Dunn returned to Farmers Home Administration in 1970 as Assistant Administrator for Farmer Programs, supervising loan activity for farm ownership, operating expenses and emergency credit. Seeking to expand the private credit available to family farmers, Mr. Dunn administered a joint government private lending policy that brought some \$300 million of commercial support for FHA borrowers. His efforts resulted in the first billion dollar lending program for FHA farmer - borrowers.

As Associate Administrator, he will assist in overseeing a broad spectrum of new programs assigned to FHA by the Rural Development Act of 1972, signed into law by President Nixon on August 30. The new law, termed by the President "a significant first step in our determination to strengthen economic opportunity and community life throughout rural America," provides loans and grants for pollution abatement and control, economic and environmental improvement, comprehensive planning, essential community facilities and industrial and business enterprises.
