Applicator Training To Be In Matador

Representatives from the Texas Department of Agriculture will be in Matador on Thursday, October 7, 1993 to conduct the training and testing for the Private Applicator License. The training will start at 8:30 a.m. at the Senior Citizens Building in Matador. The private applicator exam will be administered after lunch. There will be a fee charged for the license.

A Private Applicators License is required to purchase and supervise the use of a federally restricted or state limited pesticide. Anyone without a current private applicator license or certificate must attend the TDA training and pass the

test before a license will be issued to them. The license will allow them to purchase and/or supervise the use of any pesticide restricted by the Environmental Protection Agency or the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Local producers and homeowners needing a private applicators license are encouraged to attend. The Texas Department of Agriculture will conduct the training and testing if there is a minimum of 10 participants. If you are interested in attending, notify the Motley County Extension Service at 806-347-2733 before October 5th.

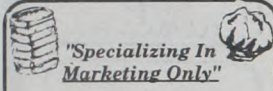
