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Fifth Annual Bob Wills Day Draws Record Numbers

The fifth annual Bob Wills Day celebration drew record numbers to Turkey last Saturday. Most "guessers" estimated the crowd that gathered for the parade, barbecue lunch and for the program presented by the members of the old Bob Wills Texas Playboys band to be in the vicinity of 5000 people. There was no way to estimate just how many people were there. Around 1500 were fed at the barbecue, but many people did not fight the long lines at the cafeteria.

Around fifty floats, riding clubs, Boy Scout and Cub Scout Troops, auto clubs, etc. took part in the parade, along with the Memphis Junior High School band. Mrs. Bob Wills was present, and was Parade Marshal. She rode in the parade in a convertible driven by her son, Bob, and his wife. Two of Bob's grandchildren rode in the parade with Al Stricklin, one of the old-time band members (piano player), who introduced a book he has written, "My Years With Bob Wills."

Parade winners in the float division were as follows: First place was won by Security State Bank of Hedley. Second place went to Ham Barber Shop of Turkey. Third place was won by Senior Citizens of Turkey. Riding club winners were Lubbock Riding Club, first; Lamb County Riding Club, second, and N.A.P.R. of Amarillo, third. Following the parade the crowd was directed to go to the Bob Wills Memorial Center to the Museum where dedication ceremonies were held with Bob's widow, Mrs. Betty Wills, and his brother, Johnny Lee Wills, being present. There is a great deal of memorabilia already in the museum and much more to be placed there from time to time.

The noon barbecue was served starting at 11:00 o'clock. The Old Fiddlers Contest was held following the meal. Bartow Riley of Childress took top honors in the contest. David Cunningham, 17, of Paducah came in second in the contest and Wes

Voters Must Bring Blue Registration Slip

It is very important that you bring your blue voter registration certificate with you when you come to vote Saturday, May 1, in the Democratic and Republican Primaries. If you do not bring your registration certificate with you to your voting place, it will be necessary for you to fill out an affidavit before you can vote.

BRISCOE COUNTY
Voting places in the Democratic Primary will be: Precinct One at the City Hall in Silvertown; Precinct Two at the City Hall in Quitaque; Precinct Three at the Pioneer Room at First State Bank; Precinct Four at the PCA community room in Silvertown and at the San Jacinto community building.

One Republican voting place will be open in Briscoe County, at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Williams, 201 North Loretta in

Silvertown. The polls will be open from 7:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m.

HALL COUNTY
Voters in Texas are facing a new type Primary Election in this year of 1976 for both the Republican and Democratic Primaries. In Hall County, the Republican Party Primary will be held in the office of Fisher-Red River Insurance Agency on Main Street at Memphis and the Democratic Party Primary will be held in five precinct polling places. In Turkey, the Democratic Primary will be held at the City Hall.

Voters could be confused about voting on the Presidential candidates in Texas Primary Elections this year. This is the first time Texas has used a Presidential Primary system. Voters will, first off, select which Primary they desire to vote in. Texas law clearly states that it is illegal to vote in more than one Party Primary election, Art. 13.03 states "No person who participates in the primary or convention of any political party during a voting year shall participate in any subsequent primary or convention of any other party during the same voting year. Any vote cast in a primary election in violation of this prohibition shall be void and shall not be counted for any purpose, and the violator shall be punishable as provided in Article 240 of the Texas Penal Code."

When a voter votes in a Party Primary election, he will have his registration certificate stamped with the party designation, or a certificate of party affiliation issued, to make him therefore eligible to participate in that party's conventions.

The Democratic Party ballot contains the names of nine delegate candidates, three for Lloyd Bentsen, three for Jimmy Carter

and three for George C. Wallace. These delegate candidates all reside in Ray Farabee's 30th Senatorial District. Voters will vote on which of these they desire to be delegates to the National Presidential Nominating Convention.

Republican Party ballot has eight delegate candidates, four for Gerald R. Ford and four for Ronald Reagan. Among the four for Gerold Ford is Memphis' Zack Fisher. Also on the Republican Party ballot are five propositions in which voters are asked to express their opinions. Four of the propositions are about changes in the constitution concerning legal treatment of felons and the fifth concerns forced busing of school children for the purpose of achieving racial balance.

Voters in the Democratic Party Primary will name 98 of Texas' 130 delegates (and 70 alternates) to the Democratic National Convention to be held in New York City July 12-15. The other 25 percent of the delegates (32) and all of the 70 alternates—will be elected at a two-day State Convention to be held in Houston June 18-19.

Each voter for the Presidential delegate candidates, has three votes in the Democratic Party Primary, or four votes in the Republican Party Primary, and he does not have to cast all of them for the same Presidential candidate's delegates if he so chooses.

Voters should remember to bring their blue voter registration certificates to the polls with them and remember to vote by placing an X in the little box beside the candidate's name for whom they desire to vote.

Death Of "Sleepy" Johnson Mars Bob Wills Day

The death of C. G. (Sleepy) Johnson, who played fiddle and banjo with Bob Wills and his original Texas Playboys band dampened the celebration of the fifth annual Bob Wills Day at Turkey Saturday.

Johnson, who had been associated with Bob Wills in making music since 1928, suffered an apparent heart attack on the stage where the band had just concluded the afternoon program and was preparing to clear the stage. He was rushed by ambulance to Hall County Hospital where he was pronounced dead on arrival at 6:45 p.m.

Funeral services for Johnson were held at 11 a.m. Tuesday at the Gause-Ware Northeast Funeral Home Chapel in Fort Worth with the Rev. Ben R. Rhoades, a retired minister, officiating. Burial was in the Mount Olivet Cemetery in Fort Worth.

Survivors include the widow; a son, B. A. of Hurst; a daughter, Mrs. R. E. Throne of Fort Worth; two brothers and two sisters, and seven grandchildren.

Many people who attended the first Bob Wills Day celebration will remember the occasion when Bob Wills, who was confined to a wheel chair due to a stroke and paralyzed on his right side, motioned for one of the band members to give him his fiddle. Bob took the fiddle in his left hand and tucking the instrument under his chin, told the other man to draw the bow across the strings. So, while Bob Wills fingered the notes on the fiddle, the other band member, Sleepy Johnson, drew the bow across the strings. Bob Wills passed away last year,

CANYON SCENERY PROMPTED RE-NAMING OF LAKE THEO

The surrounding habitat of caprock, canyons and scenery prompted the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department to rename Lake Theo the Caprock Canyons State Park. The new park is located four miles north of Quitaque in Briscoe County.

The new 13,600 acre park is open to visitors without charge from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily at the present time. These hours will be changed later this spring and extended to 9 p.m. each evening.

Only the late area is open to day use with several picnic tables and some good fishing in the 120 acre lake.

"The clear lake is located in one of the park's deep ravines and it stays clean because there is another lake upstream that catches all the silt and debris," said Dennis Wynne, park superintendent.

A masterplan has been devised to develop and open the area to full use by 1980 and this would include overnight camping, hiking throughout the park, photography and other park activities, said Wynne.

present time on the face of the earthen dam which will dress-up the structure and riprap will be placed along the water level to stop erosion by wave action.

One of the most interesting residents of the new park is the aoudad sheep. This animal, an African import, has increased its range in the rough country along the caprock with as many as 60 sheep being spotted in one group on the park.

No hunting or firearms will be permitted on the park as all state park lands are wildlife sanctuaries.

Many other Texas natives are seen daily in the park such as mule deer, quail, wild turkey and over 120 species of birds over a 12-month period. These species have been recorded by Panhandle and South Plains bird clubs. Rattlesnakes also call this park home.

Fishermen are reporting good catches of crappie and channel catfish and bass are becoming more numerous on stringers leaving the lake.

Anglers are boaters wanting to put their craft on the lake are restricted to boats less than 19 feet in length and motors under 12 horsepower. This rule applies to all state lakes under 225 acres in size.

All regulations pertaining to a Texas fishing license, boating safety requirements and rules will apply to Caprock Canyons lake. Visitors are reminded that all
