# Turkey City Fathers Considering City Water System Improvements

Much of Turkey's water system was built in the 1950's and is in need of improvements. In an effort to prevent potential problems and possible citing by the Texas Water Commission, <u>Turkey</u> city staff members are now in the process of developing an application for state grant funds, which, if funded, will pay a substantial portion of those improvement costs, eliminating the need to obligate future revenues or to increase user fees.

regionally through the Texas Community Development Program (TCDP) to help localities like Turkey to address key community development needs. Unfortuthe Panhandle's TCDP allocation is never large enough to fund the many grant requests made year by local governments in the become very competitive.
Successful applicant Panhandle, so the process has determined by a point system set up by a two-tiered scoring procedure. Half of the score is determined by a committee of government-appointed, local elected officials known as the Regional Review Committee. The other half is determined by TDHCA staff. All of the factors used in scoring process are based on a predetermined set of criteria, and the applicants vying for the funds will have been made aware of which factors will be in advance of their preparation of their applications. To the extent ssible, the applicants will take advantage of every scoring opportunity possible in order to improve their chances of being selected as one of the fortunate few which receive the grant funding.

One of the primary objectives of this program is to improve public facilities to meet basic human needs, principally for persons of low and moderate income. To that end, the City must show that at least 51 percent of the persons which benefit from the proposed project will be

allocated persons whose income is 80 percent or less of the median income in Hall County Since the water project will benefit the entire Turkey Community, that threshold percentage of 51 percent must be determined for the whole community in order to meet eligibility requirements.

The analysis of data for the City of Turkey shows the low/mod income percentage as 55.23, so the is eligible however, in order to receive the highest possible score and the best chance of getting funded, the City needs to take an additional step. Though the census-based method is a valid means of deriving this income percentage, it tends to overestimate the actual numbers. So TDHCA allows for applicant communities to conduct their own surveys to detemine this percentage. This method is more entailed but is much more accurate. This method involves a brief survey, taken door-to-door, of all the households in Turkey. The survey includes nine questions and takes about two to three minutes to complete.

If the City can show that the beneficiaries of the project would be over 60 percent low to moderate income, then the application will automatically receive 40 additional points.

Given the pressing situation involved with the water lines, the City of Turkey has decided to apply for TCDP funding this year. The City will conduct this City-wide survey. City staff will survey from 5:30 to 9:00 on Tuesday, September 7, 1993. Since this is such a large task, the City will welcome volunteers to assist them in this area.

The City would appreciate the full participation and cooperation of all of the households in Turkey as they endeavor to provide better facilities and conditions for their citizens.

#### **Dove Season** On The Horizon

Shotguns are being cleaned, and camoflage clothes are being dusted off by Panhandle hunters in preparation for the September opening day of dove season. Mourning dove counts were conducted in May by Texas Parks & Wildlife biologists along 44 survey routes in the North Zone. The counts were very similar to last year, resulting in about 20 birds per route. However, TPWD biologists have incidentally counted 150 to 200 doves on several routes in the southern high plains and rolling plains when conducting quail surverys in August.

With the relatively dry conditions in the south plains, flocks of doves are being attracted to almost any form of standing water surrounded by clean dirt banks. These water sources can range from small lakes to mere puddles on a dirt road, and hunters can expect these areas to be a good bet during the first week September if the dry conditions continue. A sunflower would improve the odds of a 'good shoot" even more. However, as any old-time dove hunter knows, the migratory nature mourning doves can result in a frustrating hunting season. The birds may the skies" 'darken August 31, but an early coolfront may send them south and many of the doves can literally disappear over-

As usual, mourning dove regulations in Texas are set forth according to hunting zones: North, Central and South. The Panhandle is part of the North Zone which is the area north of I-20 across most of the state, north of I-10 in the extreme west, and north of I-30 in the extreme east. Mourning dove season in the North Zone will extend from September through November 9, 1993. Shooting hours begin one-half hour before sunrise and conclude at sunset. It is recommended that hunters check the official sunset time for their area prior to every afternoon hunt since official sunset


changes considerably as the season progresses. The statewide daily bag limit for doves is 12. This daily limit of 12 may not include (except the Lower Valley) more than 6 white-winged and 2 white-fronted doves. Of course, fronted doves. Of course, almost all bag limits in the North Zone will consist of mourning doves. The possession limit is twice the daily bag limit.

#### A Supplemental **Security Income** (SSI) "Primer"

If you are 65 or older, or blind, or have a disability and don't have a lot of income or own much, you should know about SSI. Supplemental Security Income (SSI) can provide money to help you meet your needs. This program, administered by the Social Security Administration, also pays benefits to children who have serious physical, mental, or sensory disabilities. To be eligible for SSI, you must either:

\*be 65 or older, or

\*have a physical or mental disability that keeps you from working and is expected to last at least a year or to result in death; or \*be totally blind or have very poor eyesight.


Whether you can get SSI also depends on how much you own and how much income you have. (Income is the money you have coming in such as wages, Social Security checks, and pensions. Income also includes the value of non-cash items you receive such as food, clothing, or shelter.) The income limits vary depending on several factors, so check with Social Security to find out if you qualify. The value of the things you own cannot exceed \$2,000-- or \$3,000 if you're married. We don't usually we don't count your car.

\*patient numbers for hospital or clinic accounts, claims numbers from Medicaid, Department of Veterans Affairs, or any other agencies from which you receivehave applied for-disability or other benefits.

Don't put off filing your claim even if you don't have all of this even it you don't have all of this information. (Parents or guard-ians should apply for children under age 18.) Social Security staff will assist you in obtaining necessary information. You may qualify for SSI benefits even if you're receiving Social Security benefits.

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

Governor Richards hailed the decision stating, "The Environmental Protection Agency understands that Texas is facing extreme danger from fires that calls for immediate action. The protection of our land from fires is of great importance.'

Many parts of Texas face extreme fire danger after the prolonged period without rain. The Department of Transportation has received many requests from local officials asking for help. The Department of Transportation has responded wherever possible but has been prevented from blading new fireguards by restrictions.

"I understand the serious fire threat that we face in many areas of the state due to the continuing dry weather conditions," Governor Richards stated. "We need to do something immediately to protect the Texas land that is being destroyed by grass fires.

Due to the increased danger of grass fires, Governor Richards asked the EPA to waive restrictions on blading new fireguards to prevent grass fires.


