Valley School Has A New Dress Code

Good taste and sensible attire are the keys to the new dress code. There are only three rules for boys and four for girls.

BOYS

1. Shirts should be buttoned except at the neck, shirts extending beyond the waist should be tucked inside the trousers if so designed and "muscle" shirts are not acceptable.
2. Boys hair should be kept off the ear, shirt collar and out of the eyes.
3. Sideburns should be kept neatly trimmed and not longer than the lower part of the ear. Beards and mustaches are not acceptable for high school boys.

GIRLS

1. Extreme applications of makeup are to be avoided; wigs, hairpieces and artificial eyelashes are not acceptable.
2. Dresses and skirts should be of "reasonable length," blouses extending beyond the waist should be tucked in if they are so designed. Slacks and pant suits should be clean and neat; sweat shirts and shirts with slogans are not acceptable, nor are hotpants, sizzlers, midriff and halter blouses acceptable.
3. Jeans may be worn, except that bleached jeans, jeans with frayed cuffs or patches are not acceptable. Hip huggers are acceptable as long as the torso is covered.

Services Held For Charlie Carpenter

Funeral services were held at 2:00 p.m. Friday, August 17, in the First Baptist Church in Ruidoso for C. T. (Charlie) Carpenter, 59, who died Wednesday morning, August 15, in an accident at a logging site on the Mescalero Apache Reservation. Rev. Fred Moore of the Ruidoso Downs First Baptist Church officiated, assisted by Rev. Ed Terry, former pastor of the Ruidoso Downs Baptist Church, now of Westside Baptist Church, Las Cruces. Interment was in Forest Lawn Cemetery in Ruidoso with Clarke's Chapel of Roses in charge of arrangements.

The Charlie Carpenter family formerly lived here at Quitaque, moving to Ruidoso from here. According to reports received here, Mr. Carpenter was driving a Caterpillar tractor down a mountainside, when another of his tractors died going uphill, and he stopped to hook booster cables to the other tractor. Evidently the tractor was left in gear and when it started it ran over him, killing him instantly.

Carpenter was born in Malvern, Arkansas on January 3, 1914. He had been a resident of Ruidoso Downs since 1950 and owned and operated Carpenter Logging Co., Inc. He was a very active member of the Ruidoso Downs First Baptist Church where he served as Sunday School superintendent for several years as well as a member of the Missions committee, the Pulpit committee and the Building and Grounds committee. He also was elected to four separate terms as Ruidoso Downs Village Trustee.
