**DEPARTMENT OF D. E. TAKES UP NUTRITION**

Five or six lessons have already been given to the classes recently organized by the Red Cross organization of the county known as "nutrition classes." These classes will be taught in one of the three ward schools every Saturday at ten o'clock at which time every mother of the city who is interested in having their children in perfect health, are urged to have their children in attendance, especially those undernourished or underweight.

These classes are being conducted by Miss Clara Tucker, who has charge of the Home Economics department in the High School. She is a registered Red Cross nurse and has had especial preparation in this particular line of work having completed four years of work in C. I. A. along this line, and she took a special short course in the University of Colorado.

This work is divided into three separate sections or classes:

First: Discussion of the proper food and proper preparation of same for children who are underweight.

Second: Building of a health house. (Illustrated by the construction of a building, as for every pound gained counts so many bricks, certain foods as so many shingles and refusing to eat too much candy or other sweets counts for other material in the construction of the wonderful house of health.) Especially sterilized sweet milk urged as a proper food for the children.

Third: Next is proper exercise, or rather pastime for the children as a perfect health builder, such as songs and stories giving expression to and arousing interest in nutrition.

This is a general outline of the work in the classes for the children, but also there will be an effort made to reach the mothers and encourage them along the line of proper food and the preparation thereof for the underweight child. Great interest has already been aroused among the children in the work who can see the fine points in the work and are taking an active part in it. And the mothers are sending their children to the classes in ever increasing numbers. On two separate occasions the weather was real cold, hence the small attendance. The mothers are not only invited to attend these classes but are urged to do so.

Mrs. Philip Pettit, chairman of the Red Cross organization, states that she is organizing these classes throughout the county as rapidly as possible, in the larger towns especially.

There are three active classes at Hanger under the management of Miss Hooker.

**CISCO WATER SUPPLY GOOD FOR TWO MONTHS**

The American man had been hearing so many frightful reports of late regarding the city's water supply, or the shortage thereof, out at Lake Burnie, that we became curious and, yet, just a little nervous. So, Sunday afternoon we fired up our old time-racked flivver and drove out Lake Burnie way; yes, partly to see for our own peace of mind as to the visible supply of water, and also to get away from the busy city and her rushing throngs for a time. But would you believe it! We found a little throng out there who were also interested in the outing, it seemed.

Having stuck around these bushes for thirty years as I have, and knowing how long one of those old surface lakes can hold out, seemingly indefinitely, we feel that the people of Cisco need have no fear of a shortage of water in the immediate future, for we are confident that there is an ample supply for sixty days, at least. But we do feel that all reasonable efforts should be made to conserve this supply, such as the use for irrigation purposes and the washing of cars should be abandoned at once.

We understand that we may be asked to discontinue bathing as a luxury, and have it only as a necessity perhaps—oh, yes, perhaps once every week or two weeks. Sure, we are setting the time when a bath would be absolutely necessary, but we feel confident that the sanitary officer might be visiting certain individuals who went without for a longer period.
