

## News of Baird PEOPLE & THINGS

IF YOU WANT TO see something interesting and something that will strike home to all of us, prevail upon Glen Rockey to take you out to his well improved farm about three miles west of Baird. We were afforded the privilege the other day, and what we saw was surprising. Some 50 head of cattle were grazing on 15 acres of land, and the cattle, with the exception of some which had been placed in the field the day before were in top condition.

GLEN BOUGHT THE 60 acre place a little over a year ago and began improvements. He drilled a water well and hit a pretty good strata. He drilled others until now he has five or six wells in production. He then dug a storage tank where the water from the wells is stored for use as needed. Glen had heard of coastal bermuda grass and had seen some acreage in use. He began thinking along the lines of the grass and grazing as an experiment. He bought enough sprigs to cover 15 acres and on Good Friday of this year "sprigged" 15 acres of a 30 acre field. In the six months it has been in the ground, he has supplemented the natural rain with irrigation, and the grass took hold.

WHEN THE GRASS had rooted well and started running, Glen turned a few calves loose on it, and finally built the herd up to 50 head. The 50 head have been unable to graze down the coastal bermuda. In June he had the remaining 15 acres of the field sprigged and is now alternating the grazing. He grazes one patch while he irrigates the other and allows it to grow. The grazing is supplemented with light feeding, and the cattle thrive on it. The original 15 acre patch is less than one half covered and the newest patch is about a third covered.

ACCORDING TO Glen's thinking, the area could be greatly benefitted by use of the coastal bermuda or similar grass. An individual with small acreage could sprig five or so acres with the grass and run a number of calves on it to supplement his income. An increase of six or seven hundred dollars per year in income would allow the farmer to buy a new Ford more often, and Glen would make more money to spend for advertising or other local items, and the economy of the area would climb each year. Heard the other day that during the at least 6,000 years the world has been in existence, the population had reached some three billion, and at the present rate of growth, the figure would double in 40 years. That means that it will take twice the amount of beef we now produce, so it appears that the answer probably lies in operations such as Mr. Rockey's. It will be time well spent to go by and look over his operation.

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## IMPROVING BEARS TO GO TO MERKEL FOR GRIDIRON CONTEST FRIDAY NIGHT

The improving Baird Bears outlasted the Roscoe Plowboys on the Plowboys home range Friday night, pushing two touchdowns across in the last 15 minutes of play to win their non-conference tilt 12-0.

Until the latter part of the third quarter it was largely a game of defense as neither team was able to near the goals. The Baird forward wall and the secondary combined to hold a stout Plowboy running game to six first downs and less than 100 yards. The Roscoe team was at full strength Friday night for the first time this season. Standouts on defense were hard to find as the entire group played it well.

Coach Vernon Townsend was

pleased with the progress of his team and praised them for the improvements shown.

Wally Harris set up the first score for the Bears late in the third quarter when he stopped a Roscoe drive with a pass interception at the Bear 15. On the second play following the interception, Tally Windham took a handoff from Quarterback Tommy Barton and ran 85 yards for the score. The kick for extra point was wide.

In the final quarter, Barton pulled the same play but, kept the ball and went 25 yards for the final touchdown of the game. The kick for extra point again failed and the final whistle sounded with the Bears ahead 12-0.

The Bears made 315 yards on the ground and the two fullbacks, Windham and Freddy Alexander, made 257 of the total. Windham made almost 200 yards, aided by the 85 yard scamper.

Friday night the Bears meet a strong Merkel eleven at Merkel. The Merkel eleven is big and play for keeps. They have been improving with each game, and will be in top form for the Bears. Weldon Tittle, a 190 pound fullback and C. B. Brown, a 195 pound halfback, lead the running attack. Then, they have Jackie Russel, a 150 pound breakaway runner to keep the defense honest.

Coach Townsend will go with the same team he started at Roscoe, depending on who wins the toss.

## Punt, Pass, Kick Program To Be Sponsored By Rockey Motor Co.

Baird area grade school boys eight through 11 can pit their football skills against thousands of other boys throughout the nation in the third annual Punt, Pass & Kick Competition which will culminate with a trip to Washington, D. C., for a White House tour, then to Dearborn, Michigan, and then an appearance at the National Football League Championship game for the top eight winners.

Sponsored nationally by the Ford Division of Ford Motor Company and the National Football League, the Punt, Pass & Kick Program — or PP&K — will be staged in Baird by Rockey Motor Co.

Baird youths will be tested for their ability to punt, pass and kick (using a kicking tee) footballs on the same day as thousands of other boys all over the country, with warm-up jackets, football helmets and autographed footballs to be given as first, second and third prizes for each age group, or four top Baird winners in all. Scores throughout the state then will be compared to determine the four top Texas winners, and these scores compared to determine the most skillful eight, nine, ten and eleven year old fledgling football stars in each of the areas covered by the telecasts of the 14 National Football League teams.

Area winners and their fathers and mothers will receive all expense paid trips to a National Football League game in their area, and will compete during

half-time to determine the four top Eastern Division winners and four top Western Division winners. These eight boys, accompanied by their parents, will visit Washington, D. C., where they will tour the White House. They will then travel to Dearborn, Michigan and tour Greenfield Village. The entire group then will go to the site of the NFL Championship game, for half-time competition to determine the four National winners.

Glen Rockey, owner of Rockey Motor Company pointed out that there is no body contact necessary in the competition, no charge for entering, and no special equipment needed. "Registration will be open from September 3 through October 11," he said, "with Rockey Motor Co as the registration headquarters."

"In 1962, the second year of the PP&K Program, 431,921 boys entered the competition," he said, "and President Kennedy said 'Programs of this type will enable our youth to build the energy and strength that is their American heritage.'"

Mr. Rockey said entrants will be judged on the distance and accuracy of their punting, passing and kicking (using a kicking tee), with points awarded for each foot of distance the ball travels on the fly and subtracted for each foot the ball lands to the right or left of a center line. The Baird contest will be held on Saturday, October 12.

### Household Workers Have S. S. Coverage

"Many people do not know that people who work in private homes have the same protection under the social security system as workers in commerce and industry," R. R. Tuley, Jr., district manager of social security in Abilene said today. "I get about 25 to 50 inquiries a month on this subject alone," Tuley said. "Everyone should know about this aspect of social security, because people who have covered workers in their home are legally responsible for reporting their wages and paying social security tax."

Wages paid to domestic workers must be reported if the cash wages in a calendar quarter amount to \$50 or more. As little as \$4 a week, paid regularly, Tuley said, would amount to more than \$50 in a calendar quarter. Reports are filed quarterly, and the Internal Revenue Service provides a special simplified report form for the use of the housewife or home owner in making these reports.

"Any household worker who has a question about whether he or she is covered by social

security should get in touch with the local office of the Social Security Administration. Employers who need information about reporting their employees can secure information from the Social Security Administration or the Internal Revenue Service," Tuley added. "The thing to remember is that these reports must be made, or you may be called on later to pay the back taxes. If there's any doubt as to whether you have to report or not, get in touch with our office. We'll be glad to help you."

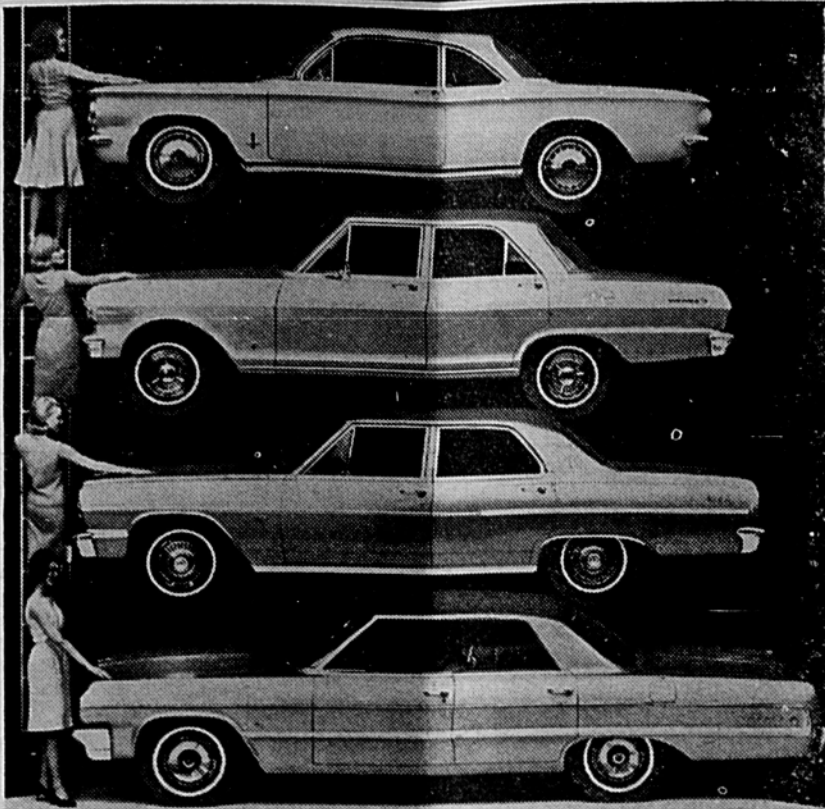

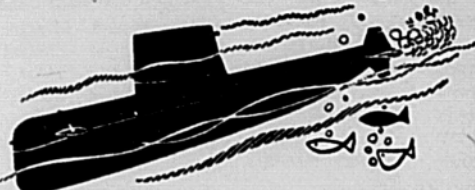

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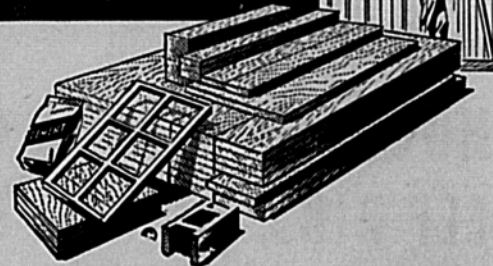

**STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights**

AUSTIN — Finance companies which hope to operate in the State under the new Texas Regulatory Loan Act must be licensed by November 21.

The so-called "Loan-Shark" law, passed by the 58th Legislature, allows a much higher rate of interest for lenders. But it saddles them with stiff licensing requirements.

Regulatory Loan Commissioner Frank Miskell predicted that 2,000 loan offices would come under the act. Already he has received more than 2,000 letters of intention to file application for a license. And letters still are flowing in at the rate of 30 or more a day.

One reason for the big response is that many automobile financing companies want to up their interest rates, too. Question of whether they are eligible to operate under the act has not been settled. But they are signing up just in case.

**NURSING HOME** Investigation — House General Investigating Committee will explore possible scandals in nursing home construction according to its chairman, Rep. Bob Fairchild of Center.

Investigation was requested by Speaker Byron Tunnell after a series of stories on sub-standard nursing homes for old people appeared in the Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

A separate check by the State Department of Public Safety has been ordered by Gov. John Connally.

Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr also has promised support.

**TEC ATTORNEY QUILTS** — C. W. Turlington, long-time Marshall attorney, resigned as general counsel of the Texas Employment Commission.

Turlington complained that he was not consulted by commissioners before they hired a new attorney for his staff.

"In order to render the best possible service to the State it is necessary for the general counsel to have a voice in the selection of his staff, regardless of the prospective employee's race or color of skin," said Turlington.

Hamah King of Houston, the new attorney, is scheduled to start work in October. King, a Negro, is a former vice president of United Political Organizations.

Turlington, who has served five years on the commission, says he has no immediate plans for the future.

**RAINMAKING AGENCY** Proposed — Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler thinks the State should have an official rainmaking agency. He says he has discussed the subject with the Governor and hopes to soon have a "concrete proposal to offer."

The Land Commissioner feels that his success with several cloud-seeding experiments warrants serious consideration of a rainmaking agency.

**DROUGHT POSING** Problem — Texas, with 53 reservoirs completed since 1950 and 12 more under construction, needs a stronger water development program says Governor Connally.

He proposes that the State harness surplus flood water for the protection of persons and property in areas which have too much water, then transport it to areas which have too little.

"We have the water resources to meet future demands. But only if they are properly developed, conserved and managed," the Governor stated.

According to the Texas Water Commission, reservoirs in the

**FINAL VETERANS LAND SUIT** — The last (\$200,000) State penalty suit growing out of Veterans Land Scandals is set for trial here on October 14.

Former Land Commissioner Bascom Giles, now living in Minnesota, may be brought into court again. The defendants, B. R. Sheffield of Brady and L. V. Ruffin of Shreveport, La., want Giles to pay a share of any judgement the State might win.

**QUICKIE LESSONS IN GRAMMAR**  
By Lloyd D. Huff  
QUESTION: What is meant by voice in grammar?

There are two words in English grammar — active and passive. Voice is that quality of a verb which indicates whether the subject of the sentence acts or is acted upon. In the active voice, action passes from the subject through a verb to a direct object; to make the passive voice, take the direct object and make it temporarily a subject. For example, in "He wrote a letter to his congressman," he, the subject, shows action through the verb upon the direct object, "letter." To make a passive voice, take the direct object, "letter," and start off with it as the subject: "A letter was written by him to his congressman." A mark of the passive voice is the use of a form of the verb "to be" with the passive voice is the use of a form of the verb "to be" with the past participle of the verb. Voice is a quality of transitive verbs only, intransitive and linking verbs by their very nature not being thought capable of conveying action.

Visitors in the Henry Pettlet home over the week end were Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Pettlet, who were on a prospecting trip.

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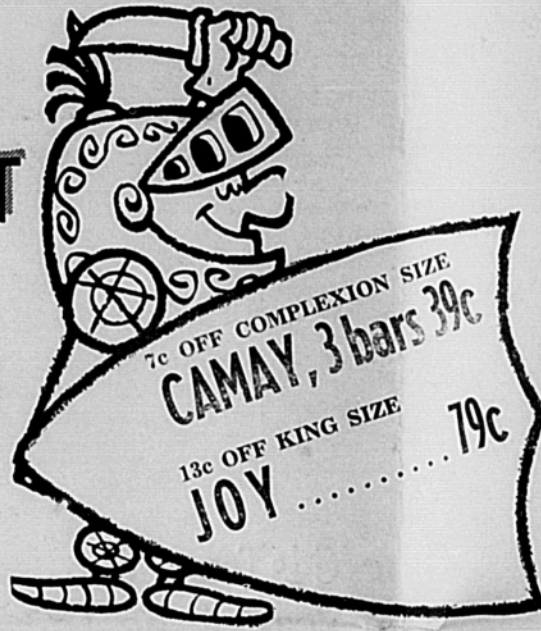
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
