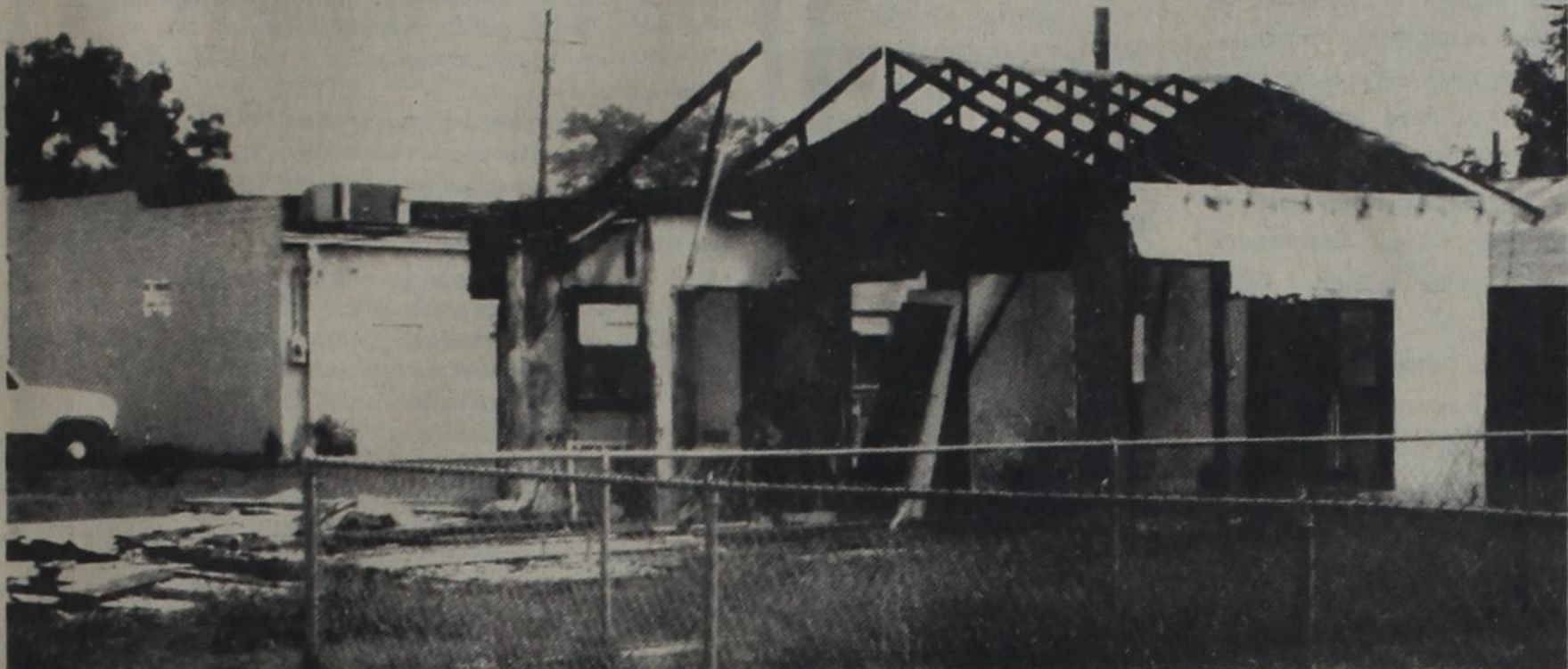


Clean-Up Underway

Felony Charges Filed Against Ex-Officer

An internal investigation of the Cisco Police Department resulted in the termination of officer Tom Barrett from the department on Friday, September 20, according to an announcement here by City Manager Mike Moore.

Mr. Moore said the investigation was conducted by Chief of Police Billy Rains and he was assisted by Eastland County Sheriff Don Underwood and Texas Ranger Gene Kea. The Sheriff's and Texas Ranger's assistance was due to the Cisco department's policy and normal procedures in such an investigation.

Third degree felony charges were filed on Barrett Thursday, September 26. He is charged with theft of "over \$200 and under \$750 by a public servant." A warrant was issued by Cisco Justice of the Peace J.V. Heysler and Barrett was arraigned him. Bond was set at \$3,000 and Barrett was released on public recognizance. Barrett is alleged to have stolen a 44-magnum Smith & Wesson pistol and a M-1 carbine rifle from the police department property room on or about June 10.

Competition Is Important In Students' Program

Competition in schools is a necessary component in rounding out a student's educational program. As long as these activities do not become the dominate force in the educational process, they will serve as an invaluable aid to students, school and community. Competition is not limited just to athletics. Literary and music events must follow the same eligibility and grade requirements.

Students must maintain a passing grade in all subjects to participate in competitive skills after the first six weeks of each fall semester. In addition, students in grades 7, 8 and 9 must have been promoted to their grades and not retained at that grade level. Students in the 19th grade must have earned at least five credits. Students beginning the 11th grade must have at least nine credits with at least five passed the preceding year. Students entering the 12th grade must have earned thirteen credits with at least five credits earned during the preceding twelve months. Students not having the required credits may become eligible after the first six weeks of the fall semester by passing all subjects they are taking.

In order to maintain the eligibility of all students, whether they participate or not, special tutoring classes will be available after the first six weeks of the fall semester. Students and parents are encouraged to contact the counselor, principal and teachers in order to ensure that each student has a diagnostic program available to overcome their grade deficiencies.

The weather conditions were so bad that it was necessary to give up the project. They had hit quicksand and with the high winds daily the crown pulleys would fall out of the derrick. The company notified them that they had arranged passage back to New York on a new ship and it was unsinkable.

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Heartworm Disease in Eastland County

Heartworm disease has become a common problem of Eastland County dogs. Dogs from every city and area of the country side have been diagnosed as having heartworm disease.

This disease was limited to the Gulf Coast and Mississippi River areas only a few years ago. The disease has become established nearly everywhere east of the Rocky Mountains and along the West Coast.

Adult heartworms live in the right chamber of the heart and in the large arteries of the lungs. The female worms are 10 to 14 inches long, while the male are about half that long. The adult worms obstruct blood flow, there by increasing the heart's work load and obstruct blood flow to the lungs, liver, and kidneys. Untreated, heartworm infections damage these vital organs and usually result in the death of the dog.

Adult female heartworms produce up to 5000 microscopic larvae called microfilaria each day. These microfilaria circulate in the blood stream and are picked up by a mosquito when it feeds on the infected dog. The microfilaria must be ingested by a mosquito before they can progress in their development. In the mosquito they under go 3 molts after which they become infective larvae which enter the dogs body in association with the mosquito's next blood meal. It takes 6 to 8 months for the microfilaria to become adult heartworms after the mosquito deposits them in the skin.

Heartworm disease is curable if caught early. In advanced stages the disease is difficult to treat due to the heart, kidney and liver failure. The treatment consists of a series of intravenous injections with an arsenic compound. Once the adult worms are treated it is necessary to use another medication to clear the microfilaria to prevent fur-

ther spread of the disease.

The best approach to the heartworm control is through prevention. A drug called diethylcarbamazine given daily is available in many dose forms (liquid, tablet, pet treat). This drug must be given at all times when mosquitos are present. Here in Eastland County unless we have very severe winters the drug should be given year around. Any dog over 6 to 8 months of age must be tested prior to being placed on heartworm preventative medication. Dogs that are harboring adult worms must not receive diethylcarbamazine. See your veterinarian if you would like more information concerning heartworm disease or if you want your dog tested and started on preventative medication.

The Eastland County Fair will be next Saturday. Now is the time to get your Agriculture exhibits ready. The Agriculture division will be in the courthouse basement. Entries will be accepted from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Friday, October 4, with judging to be done after 2 p.m. All entries will be on display throughout Saturday.

Any kind of agriculture crop, fruit or vegetable may be entered. We know that it is out of season for many vegetables and fruits, but others are still being produced. We should have entries of grain sorghum heads, corn, grain and grass seed, peanut plants, forage bundles, watermelons, and cantaloupes. Vegetables still in production include okra, sweet potatoes, winter squash and pepper. Some people should still leave tomatoes and other vegetables. You surely have some crops, fruits, vegetables or nuts you can bring to the fair. You may win the prize ribbon and

your participation will help our fair by showing some of the products of Eastland County.

Fall armyworms left uncontrolled can wipe out entire lawns and cause heavy damage to peanuts.

While fall armyworms have been light this year, the pests often increase following a local or general rain. They prefer to feed on well-fertilized lawns and other lush grasses.

Frequent and careful inspections to locate infestations before extensive damage occurs is necessary for good control. Control measures are most effective against young larvae (worms).

Fall armyworm adults are ash gray moths with mottled forewings which have irregular white or light gray spots near the extreme tip. They lay batches of white eggs on foliage which hatch in about five days. Young larvae are white with black heads. They become darker

in color as they grow older and can devour forages and lawn grasses.

Larvae are about 1 1/2 inches long at maturity and light gray to almost black in color with several light strips along the body. The front of the worm's head is marked with an inverted white "y"

Worms are full grown in two to three weeks and then burrow an inch or two into the soil to pupate. Moths emerge 10 days to two weeks later and the cycle repeats. There may be as many as six generations a year, and it's common to find various sizes of larvae infesting pastures at any one time.

Pesticides labeled for control of fall armyworms in lawns are carbaryl (Sevin 80 percent wettable powder and Sevin XLR), malathion, diazinon (Spectracide), Dylox and various products containing Bacillus thuringiensis.

Use sufficient water for complete coverage. Also, read the insecticide label for rates and follow all directions, instructions and restrictions.

National Employ The Handicapped Week

October 6-12, is National Employ the Handicapped Week, according to Billie McKinnon, Senior Counselor, of the Texas Rehabilitation Commission.

Since 1944, when President Franklin Roosevelt declared the first National Employ the Handicapped Week, time has been set aside each October to increase the public's awareness of disabled people and their strengths and abilities.

"There are disabled people living in every community in this country," McKinnon said. There are disabled people right here in Eastland County. Our job at the Texas Rehabilitation Commission is to help these people find jobs, improve the quality of their lives and allow them to contribute to society as taxpayers, productive citizens."

McKinnon said her office helps people with a wide range of disabilities, including people with spinal cord injuries, mental retardation, mental illness, epilepsy and other internal disorders,

hearing impairments, learning disabilities, and orthopedic impairments. "We provide counseling, guidance, medical treat-

ment, job placement, training, and many other services to help our clients get and keep good jobs," McKinnon said.

In 1984, the Texas Rehabilitation Commission helped 14,712 disabled Texans get jobs.

AUSTIN—Did he promise back in '82 to lower utility rates or didn't he?

Governor Mark White says he didn't. But several opponents and the Texas Republican Party say White came awful close to it back in 1982 when he was campaigning against GOP incumbent Bill Clements.

Last week in Beaumont, it was a group of loyal Texas Democrats who wanted to know the answer from White himself. Beaumont residents pay higher electric rates, and citizens hit hard by an economic slump there, asked White about the issue at a press conference.

The question came from a group of more than 40 black ministers, and White's own reply was: "Some people say I promised to lower rates—I didn't."

He went on to promise he would sign a bill making the Public Utilities Commission an elected board. He appoints it now.

White Misled Public?

Two Republican foes, Kent Hance and Tom Loeffler, are campaigning now against White's record on utility rates. And old foe Bill Clements, now running again, said utility

was a "phony issue" when White brought it up in the last weeks of the campaign.

White was saying he would eliminate the automatic fuel adjustment charge on utility bills. Whether he actually said the elimination would lower rates is still a mystery.

Clements says White deliberately misled the public by suggesting he could lower utility bills.

White Defends Issue

White's foes were angered and they vowed then to keep the issue alive, just as White hoped it would go away quickly.

Only days after the election and before he took office, White began denying publicly that he had ever promised to lower rates. He has had to deny it ever since.

This summer, he went so far as to include his own little message in thousands of mailed utility bills in the Houston area where rates stabilized.

Price Of A Barrel

The Republicans wouldn't let him get away with that, either. Texas GOP treasurer Rob Mosbacher said White was playing it both ways by denying he had made the promise, then trying to take credit for rates which actually were depressed by a lower cost of oil.

Was White going to take responsibility for rate increases if the price of oil went up? Mosbacher asked.

Speaking of the price of oil, Texas may be facing another tax increase if the price of oil is lowered further, as OPEC officials have indicated will happen.

Tax Issue Remains

That's another issue Republicans hope to keep on the table to hound Mark White, and it won't be hard to do if another tax increase looms in the future.

WHERE'S THE HANDLE? Those of you who read this are not the problem.

The problem is those who don't read it because they can't.

Those of you who attend Parent Teacher Organization meetings are not the problem.

The problem is those who don't attend PTO meetings because they don't know they're going on.

So, where does the vicious circle break? Where is the handle on a bowling ball?

You have to stick your fingers into a bowling ball in order to pick it up. You have to realize that people who can't read, people who are lumped under the heading of "Functional Illiterates," are your business.

These peoples are to be helped...not criticized. It does not matter why they don't read.

It may be a physical reason, such as dyslexia. Do you know the dyslexic person may have an IQ potential exceeding the average by many points? Unless the dyslexic has to reprogram part of his brain, he is locked into a pattern where he cannot help himself.

Lack of opportunity to learn may be another factor. There are people who fall through the cracks in our system of public education, but it may be little fault of their own.

Regardless of the reason people don't read, it is the concern of everyone who can read to do something positive about those who can't. We have to stick our fingers into the bowling ball

of non-readers to do what we can to be sure everyone gets a chance to benefit from this "free public education."

At present, I feel just a plain dumb—as in lacking in sensitivity, not mute! All the years I taught, I did not give homework and how it got done much thought because I did not assign much homework. I put my classes through a day's work, and I didn't have much faith in homework.

As the Texas Legislature has ordained homework, so Mandi has brought hers home. We read, we spell, and we do what is prescribed. I still don't like homework. It rules out time I had hoped to use for books, games, and other activities to complement her school materials. The attention span of a seven-year-old, tired from a day at school, is not all that great.

However, what I feel so dumb about is that never before have I given more than a passing thought to the youngsters who have no one who can listen to their homework, no one to read those umpteen notes sent home about picture-taking, PTO meetings, Book Fairs, safety patrol and school rules of behavior.

Where to pick up on the bowling ball is a question. A recent article in the paper announced that those who are interested in adult education should call for information. How many people who can't read will respond?

At the moment, I feel the only feasible way of getting help on homework for the youngsters who have non-

readers at home is to put another burden on the teachers, but with the laudable objective of making their work easier. If they can identify such youngsters, perhaps the PTO can take on the task of parent-pairing where possible.

Most parents will do anything that will help their children. As reading is rated a desirable status, I don't suppose anyone would want to make an announcement that, "I can't read." But if a quiet way to say, "I need help with my child's homework" is made possible, I'd be willing to bet it would work toward breaking that vicious circle.

Pairing parents with other parents who have children in the same grade appeal to me as the most desirable (or quickest) way to break that circle. However, willing neighbors could be paired. This is a topic the senior citizens might consider to their advantage as well as to the children's—and their parents.

Maybe those of you who read this and don't do something about it ARE the problem after all.

P.S. I don't believe in asking someone to do something I'm not willing to do if I can, and my fingers are already in a bowling ball.

Jury Sets

Punishment

A 91st District Court jury Tuesday set punishment on two drug charges against a 29-year-old Abilene businessman.

Allen A. Brown of Tuscola, who testified he was manager of the Baby Dolls nightclub in Abilene, was assessed a 10-year probated term and fined \$10,000 for possession of cocaine and was given a 1-year county jail term and fined \$2,000 for possession of amphetamines.

Brown's attorney, Robert Rose of Dallas, immediately filed notice of appeal of the punishment. Brown had pleaded guilty to the charges and requested that a jury set punishment.

Brown was arrested Sept. 6, 1984, on Interstate 20 by Hernando Hernandez, Department of Public Safety trooper. Testimony showed that Brown had 4.88 grams of cocaine and 0.55 grams of amphetamines in his possession at the time of the arrest. She pleaded guilty to felony charges in March and testified for Brown during Tuesday's trial.

She reportedly told officers she had been hired to work for Brown at Baby Dolls.

Sgt. Don Bush of the DPS narcotics division and Abilene Police Sgt. D.W. Havins testified Brown has "a bad reputation as a peaceful and law abiding citizen."

District Attorney Emory Walton and Assistant District Attorney Bill Dowell prosecuted the case.

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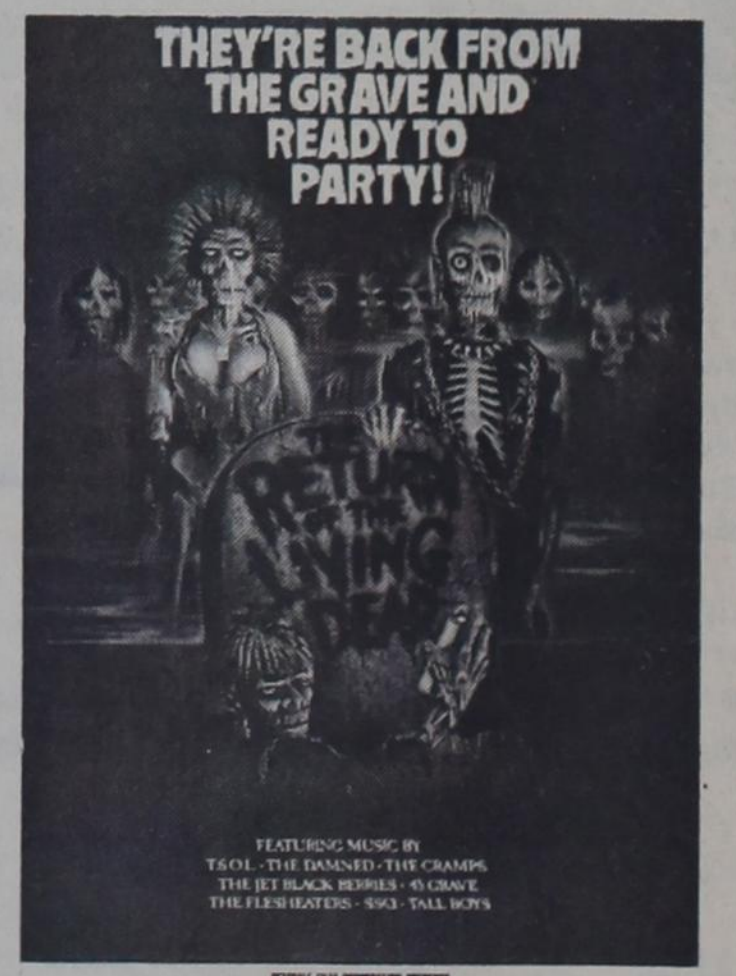

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Davis Jones - M.C. And Musician

Eastland County, meet Mr. Jones. Davis Jones of Stamford, Texas, that is; who will be Master of Ceremonies for the Fiddlers Contest at the Eastland County Fair. This will begin at 7 p.m. Oct. 5 on the Courthouse Square.

Not only will there be some good fiddle players out for the Contest, but other top-notch musical entertainers will enliven the affair.

And right along with those

will be Davis Jones, who will prove he can sing and play the piano as well as talk.

Jones has been involved with music as long as he can remember, beginning when his parents and 13 brothers and sisters played and sang together in Sagerton, Texas. By the time he was grown Davis Jones was playing all over the country with the Brown Derby Orchestra. This group also broadcasted from KRBC in Abilene on top of the old Hilton Hotel.

From 1938 to the 1950's he played with Bogan Rhea and The Roundup Boys. "Bogan Rhea was one of the best all-around fiddlers I ever saw," Jones says. "We played for the National Champion Square Dancers in Washington, D.C."

By that time Jones was married and had small children, and decided to travel and dance environment was no place for a family. So instead of going on National Tours he went into the construction business, in Stamford and spent all the time he could with his children.

A brother, Willard Jones, went on to play the piano, guitar, bass and drums with Bob Willis, T. Texas Tyler and Hoyle Nix. Another brother, Jack Jones, is a talented musician also. He used to operate Rockwell Bros. Lumber Yard in Cisco. "The first oldtime fiddler I ever heard was in Sagerton, Texas, about 1914," Jones says. "He played 'Trail of the Lonesome Pine'. I also heard fiddlers at traveling shows and Medicine Shows.

"My idea of an oldtime fiddler is someone who bought a six bit (\$1.50) fiddle and went to sawing. Maybe he only learned five or six tunes, then started over. He may even skip a note now and then but never misses a beat. 'Don't break the rhythm' is the key."

Many fiddlers play a good waltz but not a good breakdown, Jones says, or vice versa. But a really good oldtime fiddler can play them both equally well, he adds. Smoothness is something the Judges look for on a waltz. It has to be bowed much slower and is more difficult to keep smooth.

He lists some favorite oldtime fiddle tunes as 'Sally Goodin', 'Arkansas Traveler', 'The Gal I Left Behind Me', 'Old Joe Clark', and 'Soldier's Joy'. These date back to the 1800's or before.

Today, at 76 years of age, Davis Jones entertains around the North Texas area. He has judged Fiddler's Contests for 20 years.

He and his wife, Lorene (Richardson) have four children. They are Davene Jeffcoat, Cisco, who is Music Teacher in Siebert Elementary School in Eastland, Dianne Harwell, who lives in Sicily, Eddie Jones of Stamford, who took over Brazos Construction Co. when Davis retired, and Ronnie Jones of Graham, who teaches and coaches football and golf. Davis Jones also has 10 grandchildren and one great-grandson.

Davis takes care of the Bus Station in Stamford, and also takes care of a small farm where he raises cattle. So you can't call this musician idle!

At least he will take some time off to come down to the Eastland County Fair, and help carry out the Fiddler Contest. His daughter, Davene, will also be assisting in this event - making an excellent combination.

Central Freight Merges Companies

WACO--Central Freight Lines Inc., headquartered here, has merged its wholly-owned subsidiaries, Curry Motor Freight Lines and Perry Motor Freight System, into its operation, an action which followed formal approval by the Railroad Commission of Texas.

The merger of the two freight companies into the operation of Central Freight Lines creates a single-line motor freight carrier operation, serving virtually all of Texas. The single-line system will be providing daily freight service to more than 1,600 Texas cities and towns out of more than 100 facilities, staffed by almost 5,000 employees. The operation is the largest in Texas.

Since the purchases, Central has operated the two motor carriers as wholly-owned subsidiaries, and has been providing Texas freight shippers and receivers with single-system freight service to virtually all of Texas.

"We are pleased that the Railroad Commission approved the merger," said Central President W.W. Callan, Jr. "The merger of Curry and Perry into Central's operation will simplify operational and accounting procedures, and will enable Central to provide an even more efficient and dependable freight transportation service throughout the state.

"The Railroad Commission decision is one that will benefit the shipping and receiving public of Texas. As Central Freight Lines

prepares to enter its 61st year of service to Texas, we are looking forward to providing a more complete and efficient freight transportation service to the state than has ever before been offered. The merger and formation of the single-line system is in keeping with Central's commitment to providing Texas' cities and towns and shippers and receivers of freight with the best and most equitable freight transportation system possible."

Callan pointed out that the majority of changes brought about by the merger have taken place. He said the largest task, replacing the orange Curry signs and red Perry signs with green-red and white Central signs should be completed in the near future.

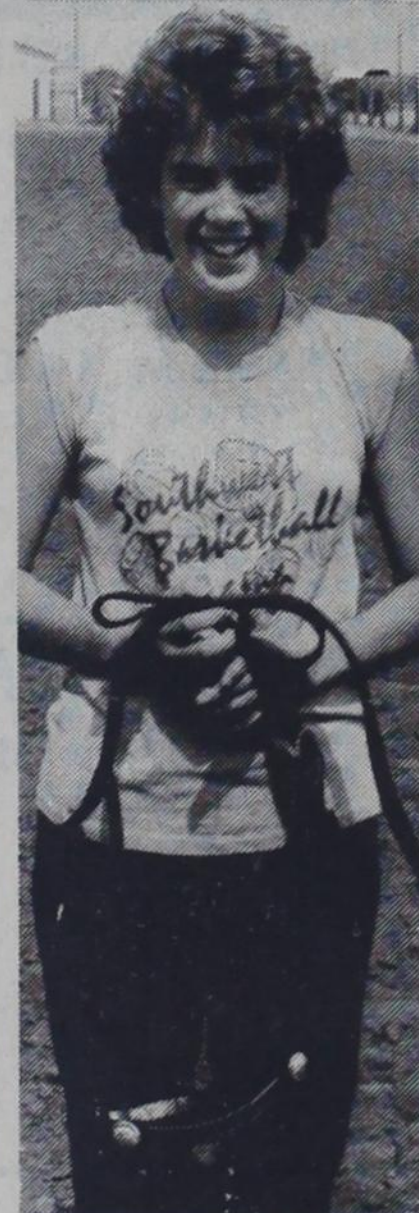

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK:

Last week we were in Stephenville at the Extension Research Center for the annual Field Day tours. The Home Economics Agents in the district had booths promoting commodity agriculture products. I am going to share with you one of the recipes from the Peach and Melon booth for peach bread which was delicious.

PEACH BREAD

1 1/2 c. sugar
1/2 c. shortening

2 eggs
2 1/4 c. pureed peaches
2 c. all-purpose flour
1 tsp. EACH cinnamon, soda, baking powder
1/4 salt
1 tsp. vanilla
1 c. finely chopped pecans
Cream sugar and shortening together. Add eggs and mix thoroughly. Add peach puree and dry ingredients. Mix thoroughly. Add vanilla and chopped pecans and stir until blended. Pour into two loaf pans (approx. 5x9) that have been well greased and floured. Bake at 325 degrees for 55 minutes to 1 hour. Let bread cook for a few minutes before removing from pan.
Yield: 2 loaves of bread.

\$.55 on each and every \$100.00 valuation of 100 percent of the assessed market value of such property is hereby levied and assessed to provide revenue for carrying on the City government and the current expenses thereof.

SECTION 2. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication as required by law.

SECTION 3. The City Council, in order to provide adequate time to prepare tax statements for 1985-86, declares an emergency and that the provision of the Charter of the City of Cisco calling for two readings of an ordinance be dispensed with, and that this ordinance take effect as an emergency measure immediately upon its passage and approval.

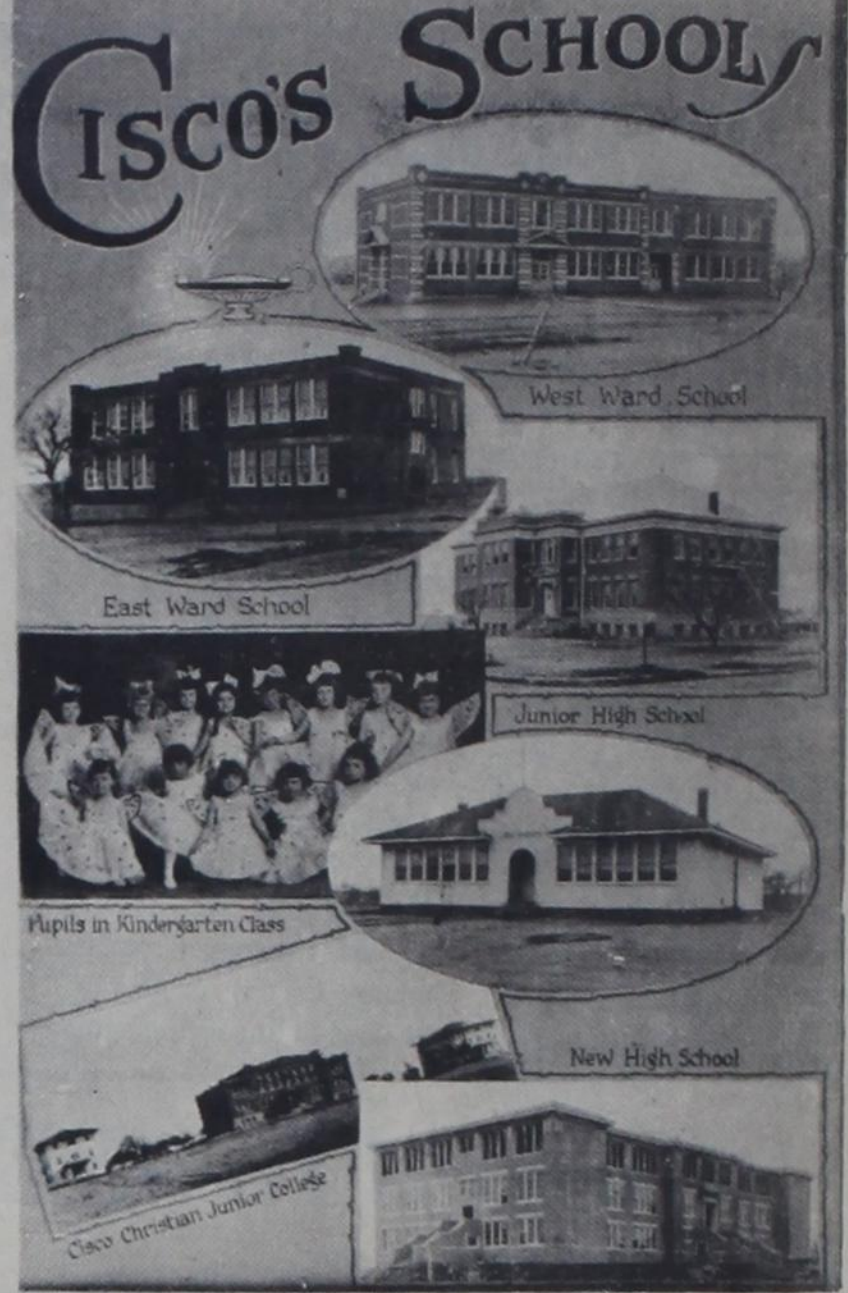

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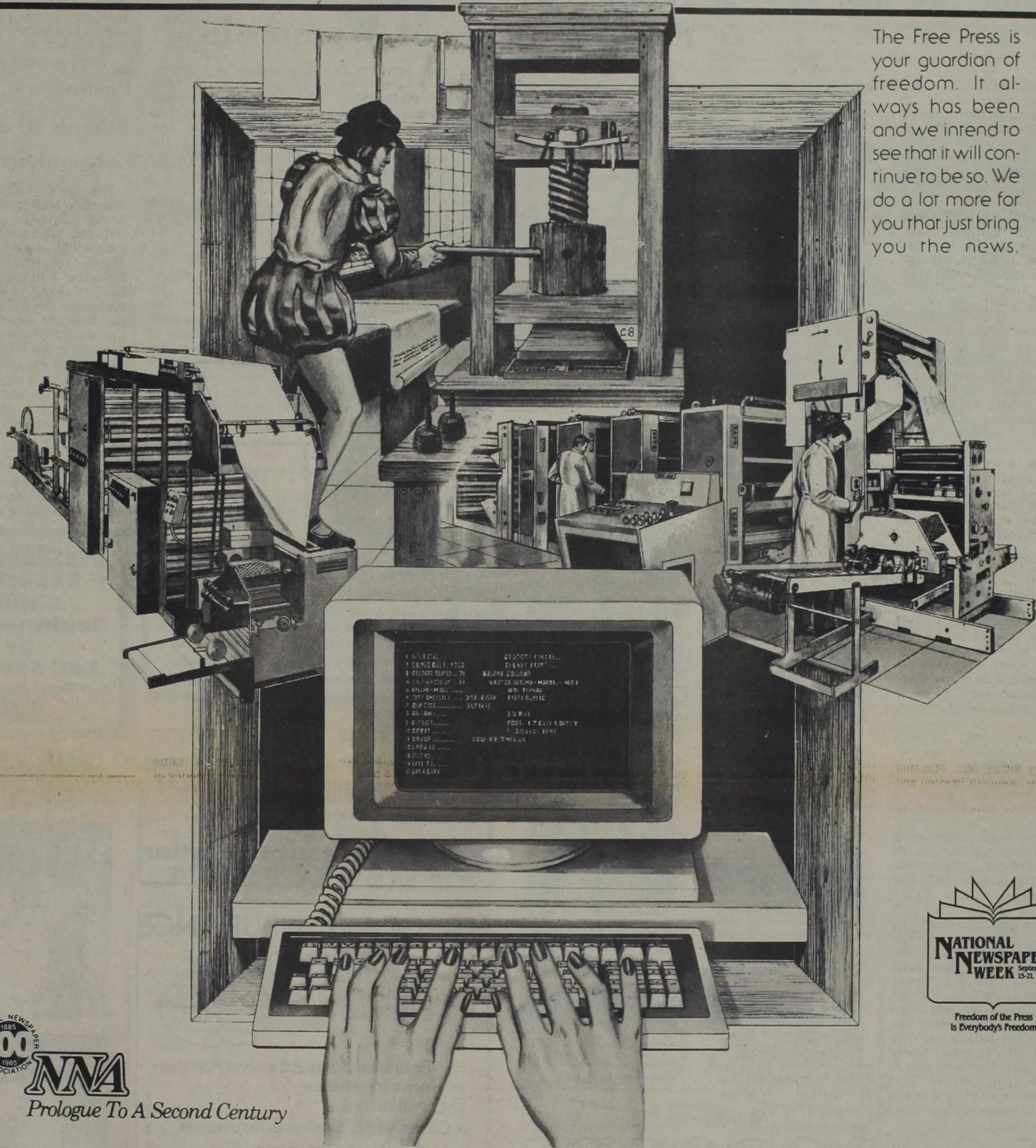

Cisco City Council members approved the second and final reading of an ordinance here Tuesday night adopting the budget for the fiscal year October 1, 1985 through September 30, 1986, for the City of Cisco.

The council also approved a resolution approving the establishment of staggered terms for members of the Board of Directors of the Eastland County Appraisal District as of January 1, 1986. The resolution will have no effect on the city.

A resolution was also approved adopting a safety policy for the city and establishing an effective date of October 1, 1985, for the policy. City Manager Mike Moore said the safety policy was recommended by the city's workmen's compensation insurance carrier.

He said the city will be having a safety meeting the first Monday of each month. They are already doing everything they can to promote safety by city employees, according to Moore.

Council member Brad Kimbrough suggested the city manager try to arrange some instruction in CPR and first aid for the employees.

The council also approved additional upgrading to city street lights by West Texas Utilities in the downtown area. The proposed lighting will be comparable to the lighting along Conrad Hilton Avenue from 12th Street to the Interstate and will improve the area between 3rd Street 11th Street.

Changing out the lights will only increase the city's electric bill by \$8.37 per month or \$100.44 per year.

However, there will be a one time charge to the City of \$31 per lamp which will be \$1,023 for the upgrading of 33 street lights.

This additional upgrading will remove all incandescent lamps from the city-wide system, according to Mr. Moore. He stressed that any citizens who still have an incandescent light near their home, should contact him at City Hall.

Lions View Picture Slides From Leningrad Wednesday

Picture slides made during a visit to Leningrad, second largest city in Russia, were shown by Dr. E.E. Addy as the program feature at the weekly luncheon of the Cisco Lions Club last Wednesday noon at the Colony Restaurant.

The recent trip was the second there for Dr. and Mrs. Addy and they found people generally to appear more prosperous than during a visit in the early 1970s. The Addys made the Russian trip with a group of doctors who were studying medical facilities.

The Leningrad tour took in visits to churches, museums, and centers of culture. "We found that virtually all of these places were built prior to the Communist regime that began in 1917," Dr. Addy said.

Much of Leningrad was damaged or destroyed during a two-year siege by German battalions during the early days of WWII, Dr. Addy said, adding that restoration has been completed in most places.

A highlight of the tour, which was depicted in numerous picture slides, was a visit to the Hermitage Museum, which Dr. Addy described as one of the most interesting in the world. Other interesting sights included the university founded in the early 1800s, and the fortress of Peter and Paul, the city's oldest building.

Mr. Moore said he will then contact WTU to have the light changed out, since they have been changing out the lights throughout the city. Mr. Moore said they may not be all changed out yet, but they will be before long.

Council members tabled approval of the annual budget of Eastland County Cooperative Dispatch for fiscal year 1985-86, until their next meeting. The council mainly questioned a travel allowance of \$3,960 in the proposed budget for dispatchers.

The proposal calls for \$85,061 for a budget, which is a 12.3 percent increase over fiscal year 1985. It also proposes a \$0.15 per hour, 3.5 percent, wage increase for employees.

The city manager's report informed council members that the city is in the process of seal coating and paving different areas in the city. He said he has contacted several different companies about the possibility of re-painting the lettering the Cisco's water tower.

A couple of council members have voiced their disapproval of the quality of the lettering and instructed Moore to see how much it would cost. He said he has received only one estimate and it was in the amount between \$1,800-\$2,100.

Council members present for the meeting were Mayor Pro-Tem Linton Bateas, Bill Roberts, Roy Dennis, and Brad Kimbrough. Members absent were Bobby Ingram, Joe Besselaar, and Mayor Eris Ritchie.

Las Vegas Hilton. NAPUS National President Thomas P. Costin, Jr., Lynn, MA, said that postage rates could jump as high as \$1.50 a letter "or more" if Congress passes bills to allow private businesses to deliver the first class mail. The Postal Service would have to raise the rates to break even and continue delivery in rural areas while the private businesses would deliver only to the profitable areas such as the large cities.

Costin urged the Postmasters to make their customers aware of the critical issues on Capitol Hill. He stressed that it is Congress who is making these decisions, not the Postal Service.

Also attending the convention were Postal and Congressional Officials who included Postmaster General Paul Carlin, Deputy Postmaster General Jackie Strange, Congresswoman Mary Rose Oaker and members of the Board of Governors of the Postal Service.

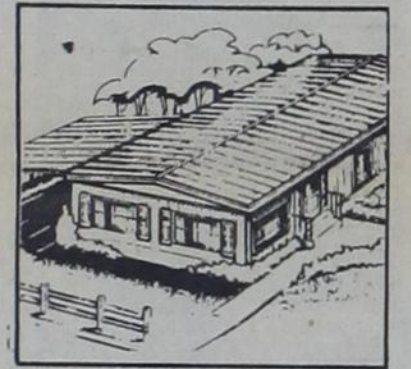

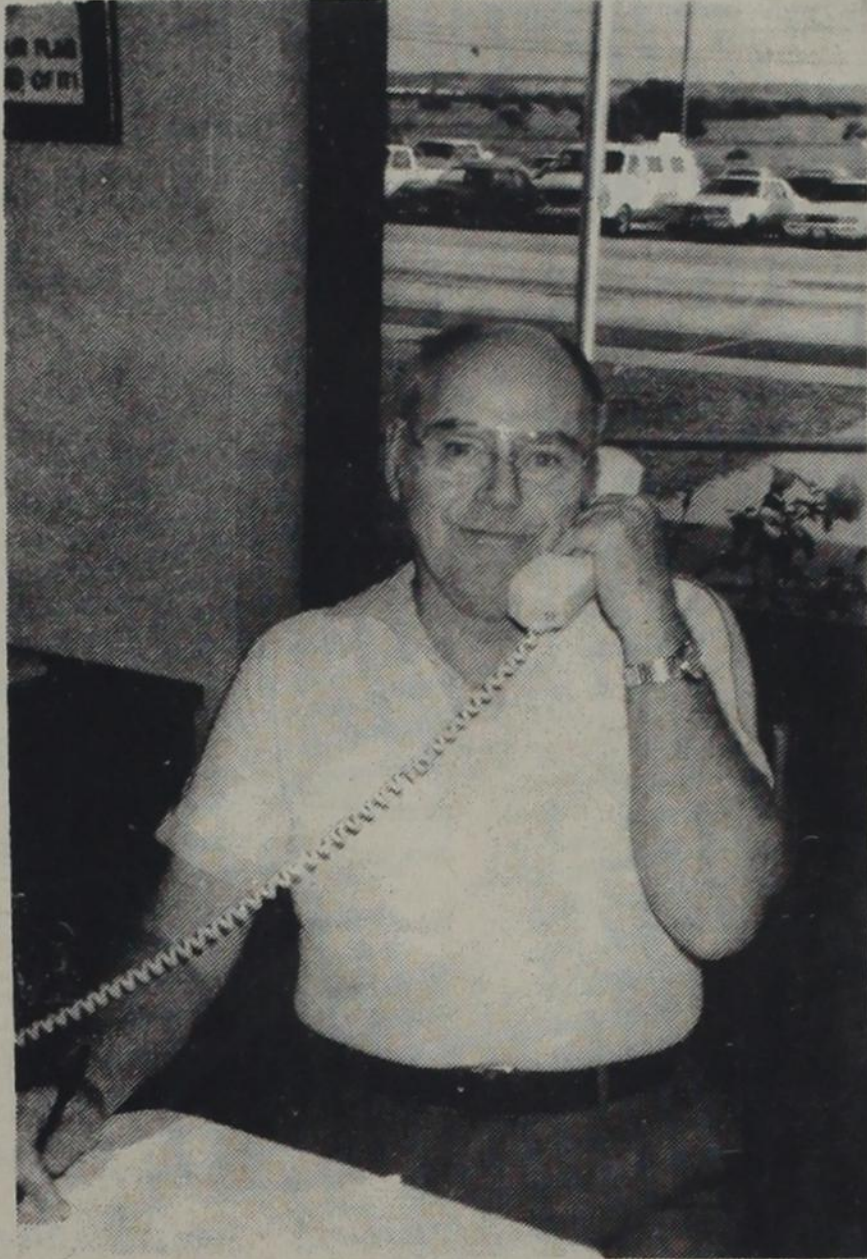

Davene came to Siebert Elementary this year as "the new music teacher." She believes that the coordinated rhythms, the patterns of music carry over into improving reading and math lessons. Our American heritage (social studies) is exemplified in folksongs, and in brief, "Music is one of the single greatest activities to prove it's certainly one of the major factors in the lives of her family.

Davene is the daughter of Davis and Lorene Jones. They combined their names to get hers, and Davene's saturation with music began at home, sitting on the piano bench with her daddy while he played for the family to sing.

The piano is the focal point for Davene and Jerry Jeffcoat's family entertainment, too. Their older daughter, Laura, is a senior speech and drama major at Tarleton. Jana is a junior at SWST in San Marcos, and she plans to teach early childhood through third grade. Jarrod is a sophomore in Cisco High School. He combines quarter-backing for football with playing the coronet in the bands, and he is a choir member, too.

Other interests? Davene and Jerry have been so involved with their children's activities--Little League, Flag Football, AND music--that there's hasn't been much time for anything else. "I paint when I feel I have time," said Davene. "Jerry is a reader." However, it is clear that music is the main influence in their lives.

When speaking of her professional qualifications, it came out that Davene was the first music major graduated from the University of Texas' Permain Basin campus. She attended Howard Payne, too, and taught in various elemen-

tary school where she did not teach only music because they moved often with Jerry's work.

Six years in Cisco's Intermediate School gave Davene opportunity to put her own combination of the Kodaly and Orfs concepts of music to the test. For example, her students won three sweepstakes in the annual CJC Music Festival. They won more than 350 medals in solo and ensemble contests.

Last year's University Interscholastic League contests brought her musical troops approximately forty-five medals.

The Texas Music Educators Association, selection from taped performances sent in by Texas schools, chose the Cisco Intermediate Choir to perform for their convention in Beethoven Hall in Old San Antonio.

Drilling Bits

Plug-and-abandon orders have been issued for the No. 4 Lynn Bint, a developmental venture of Lynn Bint in the Eastland Regular Field. Spudded June 27, the well had reached 400-ft. total depth. Drillsite was one mile south of Dothan.

Bill C. Burns has given up his efforts to make a producer out of the No. 2 E.H. Winge. It was a wildcat try in Eastland County's H&TC Survey, A-1416, four miles north-northwest of Romney. Spudded July 15, the well bottomed dry at 1,357 feet.

At a location three miles northwest of Crystal Falls, Shoshone Oil has finalized a new oil producer in Stephens County's Bower Field.

The well is designated as the No. 1-C Ray Puckett, pumping at the rate of 34 barrels of oil per day.

Location is in the Jose Malone Survey. Bottomed at

4,316 feet, the well will produce from perforations in the Caddo Formation, 3,873 to 3,883 feet into the hole.

Stephens County's Regal Field gained a new producer when Trinity Exploration completed the No. 1 Tomlin two miles south of Eolian.

The well indicated ability to pump at the rate of 25 barrels of oil per day. It was taken to a 4,284-ft. bottom and will produce from a set of perforations in the Ellenburger Formation, 4,201 to 4,215 feet into the wellbore.

The operation is in the OAL Survey.

Plug-and-abandon orders have been issued for the No. 2 Mike Holland et al "A", a wildcat venture of R. Chester Upham, Jr. in Palo Pinto County's Henry Bird Survey. Spudded March 28, the well bottomed dry at

3,915 feet. Drillsite was two miles north-northeast of Strawn.

Eastland County's Gipe Field gained a new producer when Northridge Corp. completed the No. 6 Ranger West Strawn Unit four miles west of Ranger.

The well indicated ability to pump at the rate of seven barrels per day. It was taken to a 3,760-ft. bottom and will produce from a set of perforations in the Lower Strawn Formation, 1,985 to 1,989 feet into the wellbore.

The operation is in the T&NO Survey, A-533.

A 1,400-ft. developmental well is planned by H.E. Austin of Cisco at a drillsite one mile south of Nimrod, Eastland, Eastland County.

The location is in an 80-acre lease in the H&TCRR Survey, A-1528. Well's designation is the No. 1 Albany Bank Prospect. It is in the Nimrod Field.

A gas producer has been brought on line in Eastland County's Marsan Field, with Piper Energy Co. as the operator.

Located five miles south-southeast of Carbon, the well is in the J.M. Rigney Survey, A-688. It is designated as the No. 1 Maynard Unit.

On a 16/64 choke, it flowed 150,000 CF gas per day. It was rated at 190,000 CFD on absolute open flow.

The well bottomed at 3,600 feet and will produce from a perforated interval in the Conglomerate Formation, 2,991 to 2,997 feet into the hole.

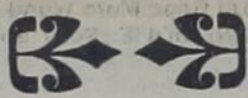

Don't let someone convince you that decoding or de-scrambling these signals can be accomplished with the addition of a cheap black box. And unauthorized reception of some satellite programming may violate federal law.

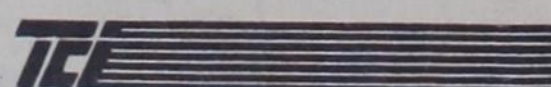

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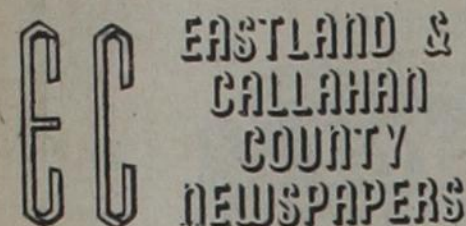
