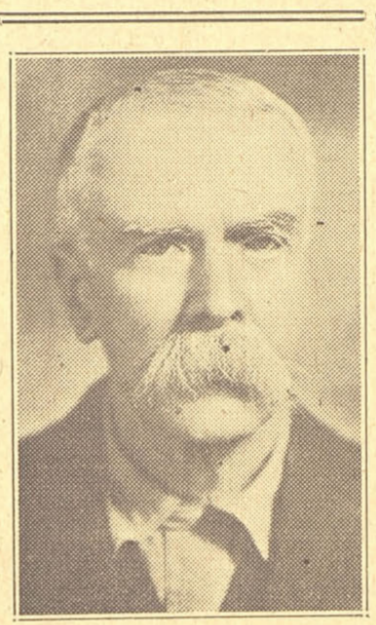

FEDERAL MILLION FOR RIO GRANDE PROJECTS

The valley of the lower Rio Grande is looming largely in the picture. Willacy county is there for the very good reason that the public works administration has advanced \$4,483,000 to that country's irrigation district No. 1. Willacy county was named for John J. Willacy of San Antonio, editor and publisher of the magazine Facts and Fiction, who was many years a state senator. Originally this district, which is the largest in Texas, voted \$7,500,000 in bonds when it was formed in 1928. Indeed, it is the largest in number of acres and the scope of expenditure, originally planned. Before making the loan the public works administration set-up fixed it so that the district will not bring into cultivation any land not already under development.

Of course, the plain English of this is the 129,000 acres will be cut to approximately 80,000 acres. Bear in mind the Trinity Farms Construction company of Wichita Falls started building the great canal from the Rio Grande to the two lakes in the tract. According to a local correspondent the main canal will float a ship—being 18 feet deep and 50 feet wide. It extends from the Rio Grande river up through Cameron county to Willacy county. Furthermore, the district never sold any of its bonds, the owners of the land being closely allied with those who directed the construction company.

Texas is reminded that the funds allocated to the lower Rio Grande section reached nearly \$14,000,000 with the allotment of the land and grant to the Willacy project. First a loan of \$2,472,000 was made to the Brownsville navigation district. Prior to this loan, \$1,500,000 was advanced for the Rio Grande flood control project. Hurricane relief funds advanced bring the total to date to \$14,000,000. The Willacy district system when finished will serve 36,740 acres in Willacy county and 38,000 acres in Hidalgo county. It is said that approximately 4000 men will be given employment for 18 months. Speaking of increased crops about 50,000 acres of the land now planted in cotton will be devoted to the citrus industry and winter vegetables to be shipped to the far north and east. Rep. Milton West appears to be on the job all the time from his lofty perch on the banks of the Potomac river.

Rep. Ewing Thomason of the El Paso district is very hopeful that he will put over his request for a large sum for the upper Rio Grande project which calls for the straightening of the upper river and to confine its quarters in flood times to the regular channel. Building activities, assisted by federal aid, are being pushed on a huge scale under the skies of Texas.

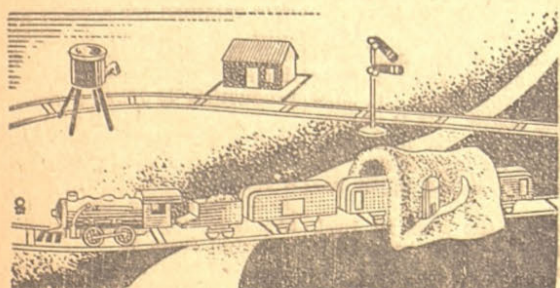
ALEXANDER LEGGE'S LAST GIFT

All that was dust of Alexander Legge has been consigned to Mother Earth. Alexander Legge was one of the notable men of the period in which he lived. Former Gov. Frank O. Lowden, a distinguished citizen and humanitarian, has disclosed that the departed industrial chief had made a \$500,000 bequest towards formation of a Farm Foundation to be devoted to the general welfare of the agricultural population of the United States. This was in addition to previous gifts totaling \$400,000. Alexander Legge did not render lip service alone to the farmers of America, or to the thousands of employees of the great International Harvester company, which has its factories and offices and branch offices throughout the United States and Canada. He was ever the staunch friend of the wage workers of the organization which he headed and directed.

Now what are the purposes of the Farm Foundation? To provide a testing ground for ideas for the improvement of farming conditions and farm life and encourage experimentation and cooperative efforts along sound lines. And yet, this man of the people had many biting critics when he was chairman of the federal farm board and the pathetic side of it is that many were farmers or representatives of the wage workers of the nation. He was a great leader before death called him. Dying, he made his money talk for humanity and its advancement.

A TRAITOR IN THE TREASURY HOUSEHOLD

Gloomy Buckeye Predicts Country En Route to Hades

Sen. Simeon D. Fess of Ohio is the gloomy assistant republican leader in the senate. He had been a man of gloom as a member of the house of representatives and in all the years he has been a senator. He is a solid rock of Gibraltar city. Year in and year out he predicted that the 18th amendment would last through all the years to come. He backed Harding for president—both before and after the Chicago convention in 1920. He backed every standpat act ever enacted by a republican congress. All in all he never voted for a liberal bit of legislation in his career. He went down the line for Herbert Hoover in 1928. He declared first last and all the time that Hoover had given the American people the most glorious administration since the close of the war between the states. He agreed that the poorhouse had been abolished, that poverty had disappeared from America, that the breadlines was a relic of antiquity and that prosperity would go on forever.

Banks were closed. They were stuffed with frozen assets. Despair was in the hearts of the people. Hunger was in evidence in the urban and rural districts of America. Purchasing power had been almost destroyed. All the (allegedly) super-wise leaders in and out of finance and industry who had been dictating the financial and tariff laws of the country were as helpless as babes in the arms of moth-ers. Now Fess says the country is going to hell. Fess says that the National Recovery Act must be repealed. Fess says that the democratic and progressive leaders are as mad as March hares and are as ignorant of economics and sound finance as the inmates of a home for feeble minded.

Fess has many grievances. Ohio has been torn from the control of the elephant and its trainers. Prohibition repeal has taken place. There is a new deal on and a new administration working to do something to bring about a restoration of confidence and the reemployment of idle workers and to find a market for the products of the farm as well as the output of the mills and mines and factories of America. Fess, the Buckeye apostle of gloom is mistaken. This country is not going to hell. This country is on the way to recovery. The republic of George Washington crawled out of the ditch in early springtime. Now the machine has ceased to crawl; it is walking. But poverty has not been abolished. The poorhouse has not been eliminated. The breadliners in city and country are being fed or given employment by their government. Gloomy Fess is a relic of bygone days. He should have lived in the oxcart period of civilization. He is dead, a political corpse to all extents and purpose, but he refused to give the undertaker a sporting chance to put him away. Christmas is coming. Buy now. Help the American cause along. Turn loose the coin that has been hidden out. Create employment for the idle. Assist businessmen and manufacturers and all this will be assisting to place idle in jobs during and after the passing of the holiday season and enable the merchants to make the best showing of any Christmas since 1929. There are men of gloom in high place who

are the rankest of pessimists. They clutter the sidelines for the marchers who are in the middle of the road. They are ever predicting that "the country is going to hell." Their kind or type made the same prediction in the days of the American revolution. They are ever with us. All the world is going to hell for the reason "that the world is not going their way."

Texas Topics

AUSTIN, Dec. 14 — A substantial abuse has been highlighted by the discovery of a joker in the city borrowing and improvements bill, and other jokers in many other bills — such as the university discrimination in salaries.

It is that after all the labor each house of the legislature gives to a bill, all the debates and roll calls, all the committee hearings, finally a bill is rewritten by one man signed by six to 10 men, and railroaded through both houses without any chance for members to know what it is, or have any part in shaping it

Examples have been shown that the conference committeemen themselves didn't know what was in the final bills they wrote.

The house had a recent example, after unanimously killing an appropriation for extra help in a department, a conference report came back on another subject, but tucked down within pages of language that appropriation had come back. Only a watchful antagonist's shot in the dark drew from a conferee the admission it had been restored.

The house had no choice but to kill a worthy bill entirely in order to prevent this overriding of its will.

The bond issue is one of the worst, but rivaled by the discrimination last May in the bill that would have let A.&M. college raise teachers' pay but forbid the university—whose funds are used to pay A. & M. costs from doing the same thing.

Hereafter the legislature ought, and after the discovery of the city funding joker, the university and the appropriations jokers, probably will, dissect every conference report, and either know what it is voting for, or kill the reports sent it during the final hours for customary railroading through.

Reports have listed Frank Scofield of Hillsboro, finance director of the democratic national campaign in Texas last year, as one of the two or three most probable selections for collector of internal revenue for the southern Texas district.

If he should be named then Gov. Ferguson would be called upon to name the second chairman of the state racing commission after just one racing performance.

Mr. Scofield has been given an important state recognition in his selection to administer the racing law. Whether this will help him along toward the federal appointment, or will be regarded as enough of a plum for one party leader, remains to be seen: Scofield is a man

whose abilities will distinguish him in which ever public office he holds. Try the Cisco Daily News and American Roundup classified column for good results.

Born in Tennessee
Mr. Weddington was born in Tennessee August 3, 1844, and came to Texas as a boy. He lived successively at Fort Worth; Fort Griffin, then a U. S. army outpost to protect settlers against the Indians; Albany and Cisco, at each of which places he was engaged in the cattle business. At Fort Worth he once owned the tract now occupied by Arlington Heights and there is a creek in the vicinity which bears his name.
He married Miss Beatrice Hamilton at Albany, who survives him.
At one time he and Cass Edwards, another of the pioneer cattle barons of the west, owned in partnership practically all of what is now Yoakum, Terry and Lynn counties. He was the owner of some of the largest herds in the west, regularly branding out more than 1,000 yearlings at a time.
He came to Cisco about 50 years ago, before the town was organized. Most of the present holdings are located in northwestern Eastland county, most of which he owned, and in adjoining counties. Lake Cisco was impounded upon land purchased from him and it is surrounded with Weddington fee on certain blocks of which oil and gas production has been found in large quantities.
He was a Confederate veteran, serving under Gen Forrest.

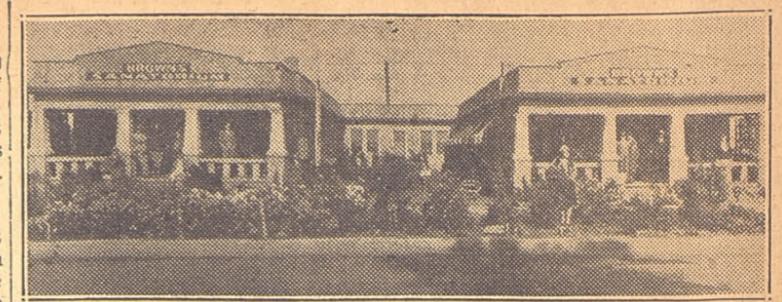
