## BAIRD TO PLAY GORMAN IN FEATURE EVENT OF ANNUAL BHS HOMECOMING

Several hundred former Baird High School students and their families will be in Baird Saturday for the annual homecoming program, and plans for the day have been completed, according to Charles Walker, president.

J. Rupert Jackson, Jr., Baird attorney and a 1931 graduate of Baird High School, will be the speaker at the general assembly which is scheduled for 2 p.m. Saturday. Jackson is a member of a prominent pioneer Baird and Callahan County family and is active in community work. He is a graduate of the University of Texas and is active in alumni organizations of the school. He is a member of the Baird Chamber of Commerce, the Luncheon Club, the Sheriff's Posse and many other civic and professional organizations.

Registration will get underway

at 1 p.m. at Baird High School and the general assembly and business session will begin at 2 in the auditorium. Coffee will be held at 3:30 p.m. with Bess Driskill in charge of the arrangements.

Dinner is to be served at the cafeteria beginning at 5 p.m. The Band Boosters report that a "ham with all the trimmings" dinner is to be served at \$1 per plate, and that the revenue derived will be used to purchase new uniforms.

## Dr. E. B. Atwood, Former Baird Teacher, Dies In Houston Sunday

Funeral for Dr. E. Bagby Atwood, Jr., 57, graduate of Hardin-Simmons University who became professor of English at University of Texas, was held at 3 p.m. Wednesday in All Saints Episcopal Church in Austin, with the Rev. Wayne M. Mahan, pastor, officiating.

Dr. Atwood taught in the Baird Schools in 1926 and 1927 and was well known here.

Graveside rites were held at 10 a.m. Thursday in Elmwood Memorial Park in Abilene, with Weed - Corley Funeral Home of Austin in charge of arrangements.

Dr. Atwood died Sunday in M. D. Anderson Hospital at Houston following a five-week confinement.

Author of several books, Dr. Atwood received an honorary Doctor of Literature degree from H-SU in 1953. His father, the late Dr. E. B. Atwood, Sr., was a professor of Bible there for 25 years.

His varied background included go'dmining in California and teaching in Hawaii, British Columbia, California, Michigan and Texas. He worked as an American Red Cross field director with an infantry division during World War II.

He was educated at Wayland College, H-SU, Kings College at London, Phillips University at Marsburg, Germany, the University of Virginia and was a Fulbright Scholar at the University of Louvain in Belgium in 1954-55.

The courses he taught in the English department at UT included phonetics, history of the English language, Old English, American English and dialectology.

Survivors include his wife and daughter, Alison Lee of Austin; and a brother, J. Leland Atwood, president of North American Aviation, of California.

## Report Given On Debbie Fund

A total of \$1,008.31 was contributed by Baird and area people to the Debbie Alexander Fund, it was reported by James Eubanks, one of the three members of the committee appointed as trustees of the fund.

Of the more than a thousand dollars contributed, \$942.06 went to pay the hospital bill and for medical and nursing care. The remaining \$162.55 was used in the purchase of school clothing for Debbie, who entered school for the first time after her recovery.

The bank is expected to open soon after the first of the year, perhaps earlier, Mr. Jackson said. David Fry, a former Abilene resident who is now vice-president of Panhandle Bank and Trust of Borger, will be the bank's first president. Don Pierson of Eastland will serve as board chairman.

In addition to Jackson and Pierson, other organizers of the bank are Dr. Stanton J. Barron, Marshall Boykin, Max Fergus, H. H. Grubbs, Donald P. Hanks and Carroll R. Rogers, all of Abilene.

## Tax Collector Asks That Poll Tax Not Be Paid At This Time

Tax Collector-Assessor Albert Lovell this week asked tax payers not to include poll tax payments with their regular tax remittances since there is some doubt as to the requirement for payment as a requisite for voting next year.

It all hinges on the November 9 constitutional amendment election at which time the people of Texas will decide whether or not to keep the poll tax. If the people vote to keep the tax, it will be required and must be paid before January 31. If the people decide to do away with the poll tax as a voting requirement, a 25 cent registration fee will be the only financial requirement.

There can be no refund of poll tax payments in the case the issue is voted down, Mr. Lovell reported.

He said that the total valuation of the county this year was \$13,429,062.14 as compared with \$11,906,876.93 last year. The county tax rate is 80 cents on the \$100 valuation, which is one of the lowest in the state. There

are only six counties in Texas with a lower rate. The State tax rate is 42 cents and the Road District No. 1 rate is 40 cents.

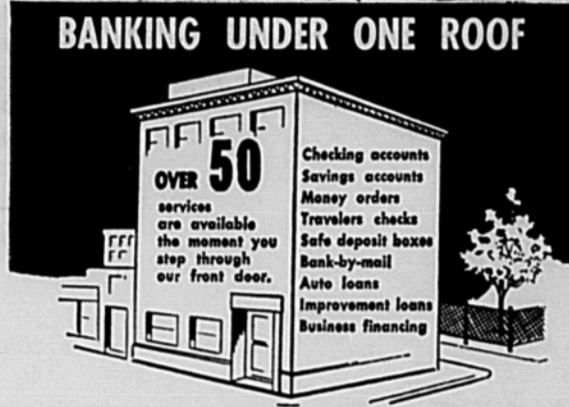

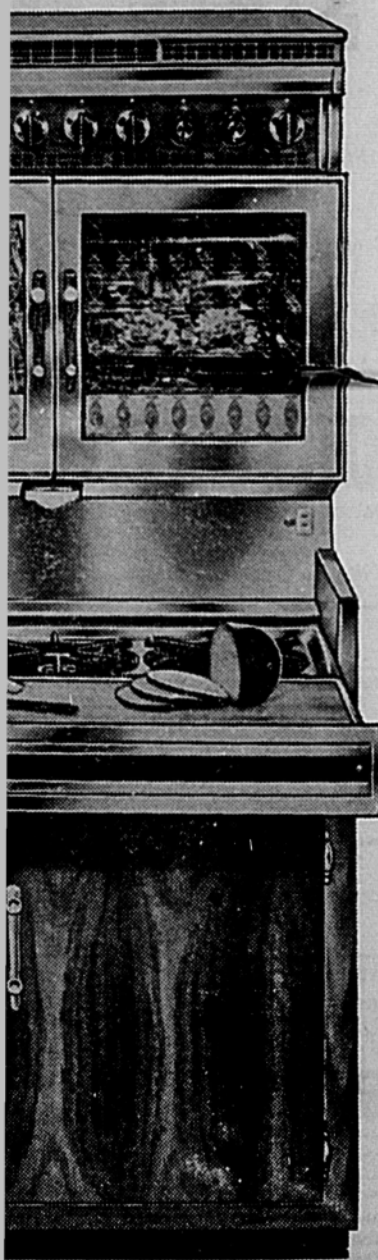

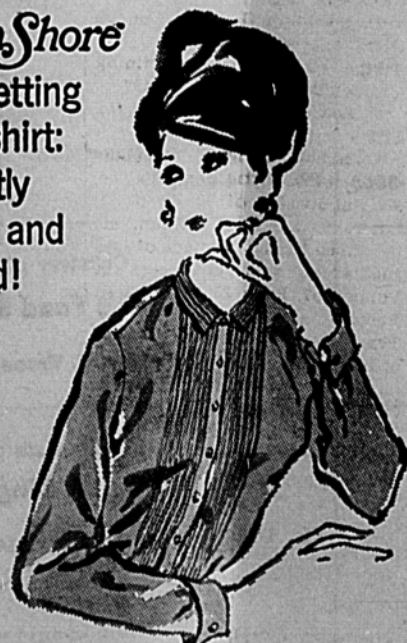
