



In every farm flock there are apt to be at least ten hens that are far superior to the average in that flock. Even when a flock is carefully culled there will be a lot of birds left which will be profitable layers and yet not good enough for breeders if much improvement is to be made. I have watched the figures from the different laying contests carefully this year and they are evidence of the difficulty of producing many birds that will lay even 200 eggs per year.

These birds are selected from the best stock of breeders that are fairly skillful. It means that farmers cannot be expected to cull their flocks down and keep only hens which the experts estimate will lay 175 to 200 eggs more. It means that most farmers have to keep a lot of hens laying from 120 to 160 eggs per year or they would not keep many hens. But this does not mean that these average hens need to produce the eggs which grow into cockerels for improving the flock.

There will always be a few hens so much better than the average that they are of special importance. That is why so much improvement can be made at a low expense by using the special mating during hatching season. If you obtain only 300 or 400



THE COST OF WAR IS GREAT

Mexico has learned the bitter cost of war. Happily, most of her troubles are now behind her, but there remains the reckoning. Mexico has been restored to good standing among the nations, but her revolutions and warfare has cost her, since 1910, a million in population, to say nothing of the monetary loss.

Forecasts from the last census indicate that Mexico will be fortunate if she has not lost more than a mlilion in population—thousands from death and countless others from emingration due to the unsettled condition of the past decade. War takes a heavy toll and Mexico is beginning to realize it.

It might help along government economy if congress were given a commission on what it saves from the federal budget.

SIMPLER TAX REPORTS COMING

It is good to learn that income tax reports will be simplified next year for the majority of taxpayers. There will be one small sheet, with instructions on one side and on the other side spaces for entering the essential facts required by the government. The income sources are reduced to three general classes, covering first, salaries and wages, or earned income; second interest and dividends on bank deposits, mortgages, bonds, etc., or investment income; third, "other income."

This should make the tax return much less of a task for the 60 or 70 per cent of taxpayers whose net incomes are not over \$5,000. The treasury department would add to its popularity if it would extend the same simplifying method, as far as possible, to the higher incomes.
