DESERTING IRELAND

Ireland is worried over emigration. Unlike Italy, it needs its people. The promise of the Irish Free State, of keeping the Irish at home, of affording them opportunity in the building up of their own country, has not been fulfilled so far. There is a steady drainage of country people abroad, especially to the United States, in spite of the various improvements effected by self-government.

"It is hard to blame such persons for seeking to better themselves abroad," says a Cork newspaper. "And yet, one feels that if they were prepared to work half as hard in Ireland, on the land, as they will be obliged to work in the factories and stores and quays of America, they need not emigrate for a living."

There's the rub! The same thing is true of emigrants from many another country. But somehow they do not feel the inspiration to labor in their home lands as they do in the new Land of Promise.

If opportunity is present at home, glamor or example may be lacking. Emigrants from anywhere to anywhere else nearly always work harder than they did before the change. It is still so with our eastern migrants to the west, or our northern migrants to the south.

That is as big a reason as any for the immigrants' success. If they do not actually find novel opportunities, the spiritual shaking-up and the commitment to a new world and a new life impel them to make opportunity. The trip is a distance equal to that between New York and St. Louis or between Chicago and Boston or that of an aeroplane journey from Wasington to Lincoln, Nebraska.

Bishop James H. Dickey of Waco, who will speak at the First Methodist church tonight, is a forceful, entertaining pulpit orator and Cisco Methodists are expected to pack the big auditorium this evening. "Unification" will be the visiting bishop's subject, and it is said he will give his reason for opposing the consolidation of northern and southern Methodist forces.
