## MUNICIPAL GAS PLANT CONSIDERED

### INVESTIGATE FEASIBILITY OF FINANCING PROJECT THROUGH FINANCE BODY

Several phases of the gas situation was discussed by the members of the city commission and attorneys Grantham and Wright, who are representing the city in the gas rate contest now pending before the railroad commission. The commission authorized Judge Wright and City Attorney Grantham to procure a transcript of the hearing held here the past week. It was said this transcript will cost \$125 or \$150, but it was the opinion of the commissioners that it was worth the price, and should be secured to enable the attorneys to more efficiently prosecute the case, not only before the commission, but before the courts, as Judge Wright stated that it was practically certain that the case would be taken into the courts should the city win before the rail body, and it was very likely that the city would take the same step should the gas pirates' demands be granted.

Judge Burnett, of the commission, said that the gas rate question was the most important matter now before the people, and he favored fighting the case through to the end. "Already the people of Cisco have been saved several thousands of dollars by contesting the gas company's request for increased rates," Burnett stated.

Judge Wright said that the prospect of Cisco being granted the rate established by the commission of 50 cents was most favorable, though, of course, no one can tell how any litigation will terminate.

"Should the city lose this fight it is my opinion that the cheapest and most effectual manner of whipping the gas octopus is to follow the example of Rising Star, and build a municipal gas plant. I believe this can be done by pledging the income of the project to pay for its construction. Probably the building of the plant can be financed through the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, as my recollection is that the R. F. C. proposed to finance self-liquidating projects. Certainly there is no question about a municipal plant coming under that head.

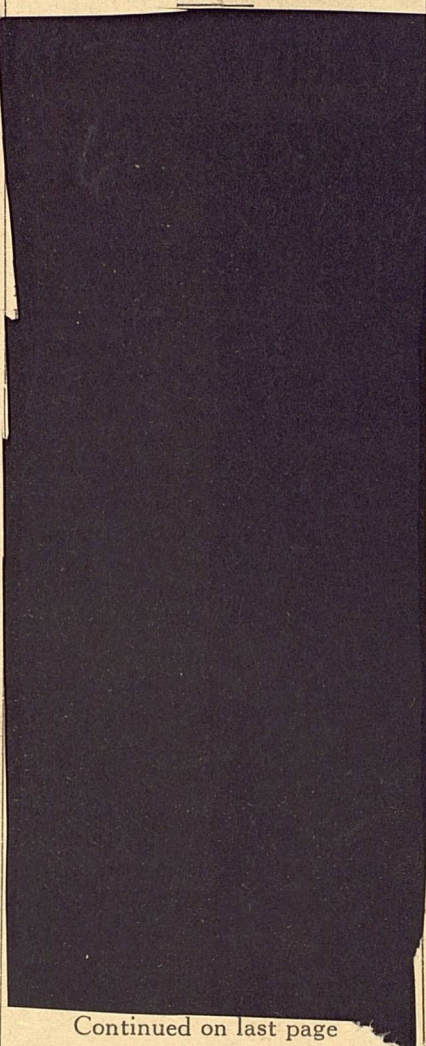
"Like Rising Star we can buy used pipe in the oil fields at about one-fourth its original cost, and we can pay for the labor with R. F. C. funds, in the event the project cannot be financed direct with the Reconstruction Finance Corporation," Wright stated.

This discussion brought to the surface the fact that the commission was practically unanimous for a municipal plant, and on motion of Clements, City Attorney Grantham and Commissioner Burnett were appointed a committee to correspond with the R. F. C. officials to ascertain if the municipal gas plant can be financed through that corporation, and also if the water treating plant can be financed likewise.

If a municipal plant can be built, even on a small scale to begin with the commission favored making a start.

### Charter Petitions To be Acted Upon At Jan. 24 Session

Tuesday night the commission formally decided to act on the petitions for an election on the amendment to the city charter, setting Jan. 24 as the time to pass the ordinance giving notice of the election. The city attorney ruled that the law requires the notice to be published for ten days consecutively, whose opinion is not concurred in by some other able attorneys of Cisco. This ruling caused the city printing to be awarded to the Daily News, at a rate of 1½ cents per line higher than the bid of the Cisco Citizen, and this, too, after competitive bids had been called for. The law simply says these notices must be published for ten days. Heretofore this mandate of the law has been construed that the time must be ten days, which has been done by publishing two weeks in a weekly newspaper. A town without a daily paper could not publish the notice at all, if attorney Grantham's construction was upheld.

Just why the commission deferred action till Jan. 24 was not stated.

The petitions have been before the commission since the middle of Sept. or the first of Oct., and this is the first definite action that has been announced. The only reason for the delay that can be advanced is that the matter was postponed that the three salaried commissioners might enjoy the emoluments of their office as long as possible. Probably they realize their pay will be chopped off as soon as the people are permitted to act, and by passing the ordinance authorizing the election on Jan. 24, it will be near the end of their term before the election can be held and the results declared.

### FINANCE GAS SYSTEM THROUGH R. F. C.

Cisco is advised to adopt the Rising Star plan in coping with the gas situation. Hon. E. O. Thompson, who is accredited with being the only municipal executive who has whipped the gas octopus, but he didn't win in the courts. He went out to build his own municipal plant for the city of Amarillo, and when the monopoly saw that he had them whipped they came to terms, and gave Amarillo a rate of 27 cents per 1,000 cubic feet, for domestic gas. Rising Star has adopted the Amarillo plan, and is putting in its own municipal gas plant, and Rising Star will have domestic gas at 50 cents per 1,000 or less. We predict that the Southwest Gas Company will cut their rates to less than the proposed municipal rates, but if Rising Star is wise she will ignore the reduced terms and go ahead with its municipal plant. It not only means a cheaper rate for gas for the people of that city, but a source of revenue that will pay a large part of the municipal expenses of the city government.

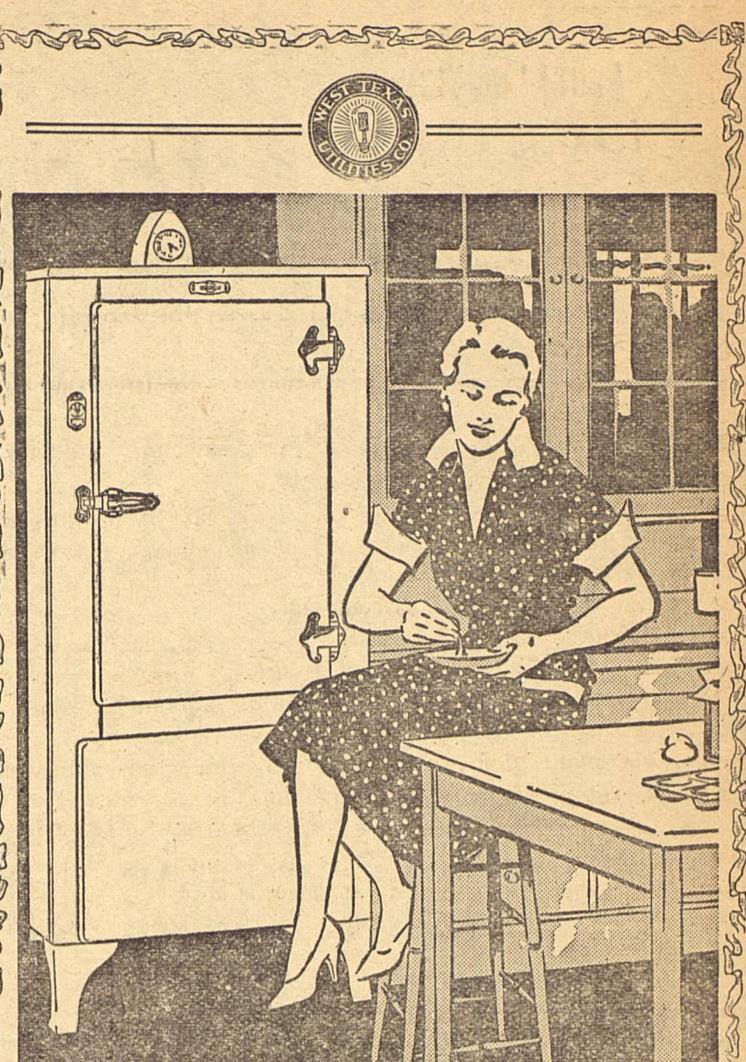
But Rising Star has a mayor with a vision. He is looking ahead and planning for the weal of his town. He saw an opportunity to build something substantial when the Reconstruction Finance Corporation donated funds to Eastland county, and instead of digging ditches for storm sewers

and building rock fences around the cemetery, he suggested something material that would live after the R. F. C. had been forgotten. He decided to use the unemployment fund to build a municipal gas plant, which would give the idle labor employment on a worth while project. Cisco could do likewise and save her people from the exploitation of one of the most consciousnessless monopolies in the south, but have we men at the head of our city government with such a vision as that manifested by the mayor and city commission of the city of Rising Star? If so they have not manifested such public spirit. Bill Tyler has demonstrated his ability as an executive officer, and says they are going to build a municipal gas plant despite the obstacles of court proceedings that might be thrown across their path by the gas monopoly that threatens law suits, injunctions and such other legal red tape that the gas monopoly resorts to in such cases.

Today Cisco is waiting the decision of the railroad commission for an equitable rate with the Community Natural hijackers, and we may get some relief, but the only permanent relief we may expect will come when Cisco gets busy and adopts the Rising Star and Amarillo plan. Then the gas monopoly will decide that 35 cent gas is not only a paying proposition, but advisable if it will kill municipal ownership of utilities.

Don't be deceived. The gas octopus will give our people gas at 35 cents before they will let the city put in a municipal plant if we show them we are determined to adopt this course. Unless municipal ownership is actually desired it will not be necessary to carry the project through. Just convince the gas monopoly that we mean business, go ahead and negotiate with the Reconstruction Finance Commission for the money to install the plant, and you will be having Mr. Chester May eating out of your hands, Messrs. City Commissioners, and he won't be looking at the ceiling

then, for he will be in earnest and gaze right into your countenance. But we must make a showing. We must probably incur some financial obligations. But it will be taken care of by the Community Natural. A monopoly hates municipal ownership worse than the devil hates holy water. It is the last step he wants a city to take where he has his plans all laid to rob the people. Just convince monopoly that you are determined to throw off the yoke of oppression and he will get busy right now. Ernest Thompson showed them where to head in, and they not only gave Amarillo a 27 cent rate but reimbursed that city for all indebtedness incurred in initiating its gas system. I am telling you they are afraid of municipal ownership, which is about the only thing that will make them eat out of the hands of the masses. Monopoly will fight you in the courts forever and a day, but when you

**GAS COMPANY'S MOVE  
TO BLOCK MUNICIPAL  
PLANT AT STAR FAILS**

The effort of the Southwest Gas Co., supplying Rising Star with domestic gas, proved an abortion, and only stopped the work on the Municipal Gas plant for a few days, as the checks were ordered held up until the matter could be investigated. At the same time work was stopped over the entire county, but all has been settled, so far as spending the R. F. C. fund is concerned, and forces are at work in the several committees of the county carrying out the plans of the local relief committees.

In the meantime Rising Star is going right ahead building its municipal gas plant, doing the work with local labor, which is not only giving that city's unemployed work, but is saving a neat sum under the bids offered by contractors to install the plant, and insure an utility for this enterprising little city that will prove a profitable source of revenue to the community and a great saving to the consumers of gas, as the rate will be only 50 cents per 1000 cubic feet.

This saving will be effected in the face of the sworn statement of Mr. Chester May, of the Natural hijackers, who testified at the hearing here last week, while gazing at the ceiling, that his company was losing money at 67½ cents.

The Rising Star Record tells of the progress that is being made, despite the threat of the Southwest company that it would take legal steps to protect its interest, rather to further exploit those people. The Record says:

The deal for the pipe near Shamrock, Texas, was completed late the past week and on Saturday a crew of men left for that place to begin taking up the pipe and getting it ready for shipment here. Trucks were also started and up to last night three truck loads of the pipe had been received and racked on the vacant lot just east of the Boase garage. Work of shipping in the pipe will be completed within a few days, it is stated.

The crews which have been at work digging the ditches for the gas line, were put to work on cleaning drain ditches and branches in the city and also doing some work on culverts and streets.

Mayor Tyler indicated yesterday that there would be no let up on the work of putting in the gas system, unless the city was restrained in a legal manner, and that although the relief funds might be held up temporarily, that the city would use its own funds to continue the work.

**WELFARE ASSOCIATION  
DONATED \$25 MONTHLY**

The city commission acted favorably on the request of the welfare association, through the chamber of commerce, for a donation of \$100 to be paid \$25 per month, through the chamber of commerce.

Commissioner Elliot, who is active in welfare work, reported in some detail of the collections for the needy, among which it was stated that the city employes had contributed the equivalent of one day's salary to the work. This fund is being disbursed through night desk sergeant Perdue, and is used only for transient people who have to be aided during the night.

**CITIZEN SAVES CISCO  
HALF ON PUBLISHING  
CITY LEGAL PRINTING**

Though the Citizen was not awarded the contract for publishing ordinances and such other public matter that the law prescribes to be published, despite the fact that it submitted the lowest bid, yet it was instrumental in effecting a neat saving to the city on this item.

The Daily News was named as the official paper, its bid being one cent a word. This will enable the city to make a neat saving, as the News, which has had a Community Natural monopoly on the city printing for the past ten years, but it has never before had to bid in competition for this work. For publishing the notices of the abortive charter amendment election the News charged and collected the neat sum of \$135, or 10 and 5 cents per line. The Citizen called attention to the charter requirements of submitting this work to competitive bids, and both the Citizen and News complied.

While the bid of the News was deemed the lowest submitted, but the commission failed to properly estimate the bids. The News' bid was one cent per word, while the Citizen's bid was 4½ cents per line. A representative of the News stated that the type used by that paper averages five words to the line, while as a matter of fact the type will average six, and often seven words to the line. The meeting of the commission was a little early and this action was taken before the arrival of the Citizen editor, who reached the city hall at 7:30, the usual hour of meeting.

It will be seen that the bid of the Citizen was the lowest submitted if the words in the lines of each paper are counted. The Citizen will average five words and the News six to the line. So, instead of the News' bid being lower it is higher than the bid submitted by the Citizen. The News will be paid at the rate of six cents for the matter it publishes, which is one and one-half cents per line more than the price submitted by the Citizen.

### CONTRACT AWARDED FOR CISCO FEDERAL BUILDING TO WICHITA, KAN., FIRM

Underhill Construction Co., of Wichita, Kan., has been awarded the contract to erect the Cisco federal building, according to a press dispatch from Washington, which stated that the treasury department had awarded the contract to this firm for \$75,000.

A letter from the contracting firm to Secretary Spencer, of the chamber of commerce, states that construction will begin early in January, and local labor will be employed except certain classes of skilled labor. The building is to be complete in 360 working days, which will probably be about Christmas, 1933.

### Mother of Cisco Man Died At Sulphur, Okla., Sunday

A message announcing the death of his mother, Mrs. U. A. Fox, called C. V. Fox, of Cisco, to Sulphur, Okla., last Sunday. He was accompanied by his daughter, Mrs. A. C. Williams, now of Wink, formerly Miss Virginia Fox, a Cisco high school graduate, whose marriage was solemnized Dec. 3, 1931. Mrs. Fox made her home here, and performed the duties of a mother to Mrs. Williams since she was a mere child of three years of age, as Mrs. Williams mother passed away when

he was an infant.

After Mrs. Williams' marriage Mrs. Fox made her home in Oklahoma, and had been in bad health for several years. She passed away Dec. 4, 1932, being 76 years of age at the time of her passing.
