Drug Law Violation Case Ends For Trio

A federal court jury found Bobby Maynard guilty as charged, couldn't reach a verdict on the guilt or innocence of Johnnie Hargrave, and returned a not guilty verdict in the case against Bryan Cotten as the three Ciscoans' four-day trial ended at Abilene Thurs-

Judge Halbert O. Woodward, who presided at the U.S. District Court, was expected to await further actions in the Maynard case pending an expected appeal motion by the Ciscoan's attorney, Ben Sudderth of Comanche.

Attorney Sudderth told interviewers that he will file a written motion for a verdict of acquittal for Hargrave and there was indication that it would be granted.

The jury deliberated some four hours before returning the verdict. Maynard was charged with possession of methamphetamines with intent to distribute, two counts of possession, and one count

of manufacturing the drug. Cotten had been indicted on a single count of possession of the "speed" drug and he was found not guilty. Hargrave, tried on a single charge of conspiracy, had

pleaded not guilty. The trio, along with several others, were arrested in Cisco last October

It's fun to try new recipes for cooking venison-and to make up some of your own. Expect some failures, along with successes, when you're "experimenting" with big game cookery.

Be sure to write down the recipe for any dish everyone enjoyed.

Four ways to cook venison are roasting for tender cuts and braising, stewing or pan frying for less-tender cuts. Other secrets include some general rules for successful big-game cooking:

*Cook big game the same as lean beef. Most game has little and corresponds in quality to beef carcasses with little or no external fat. It should be cooked in the same way. The tender cuts such as the loin and rib can be pan fried or roasted with basting. Round steak, meat from the leg and the less tender cuts are best when cooked by moist heat-braising, stewing or pot roasting.

*Do not overcook big game meat. It has short fibers that toughen quickly if overcooked or cooked at too high a temperature. Plan to serve it medium to well-done, never rare or overcooked. *Use acid to tenderize.

Vinegar, tomato sauce and French dressing sauces for at least 24 hours. Pan fry to medium-done.

*Reduce the sugar in sauce recipes. The natural flavor is sweeter than other meat. Sauces made for domestic meats may be too sweet. Use 1/4 less sugar.

*Remove all visible fat before cooking. The gamey flavor is exaggerated in the fat. If fat is desired, ground pork or beef fat may be substituted.

*Big game is a dry meat, so moisten it to prevent dryness. Add chunks of beef fat to self-baste it, or cover the surface with bacon strips anchored with toothpicks.

ROASTING: Trim off game

fat; rub with bacon drippings or similar fat. Season with salt, pepper and desired herbs. Place on roasting rack in uncovered pan, bone down. Place bacon strips on top of roast for added flavor. Baste with added fat as needed, but do not add water. Roast uncovered at 300 degree F. to 350 degree F. Allow 20 to 25 minutes per pound. Use a meat thermometer if possible because lean meat usually cooks faster than beef.

BRAISING: Season with salt and pepper; rub with flour. Brown on all sides in moderately hot fat. Add small quantity of water (about 2/3 to 1 cup). Cover tightly. Cook very slowly (simmer) until tender (2-3 hours). Turn the meat occasionally, adding water if necessary.

STEWING: Cut meat into cubes about 1 inch in size. Season with salt and pepper; sprinkle with flour. Brown on all sides in moderately hot fat. Cover with boiling water.

Cover kettle tightly and cook very slowly until tender. Do not boil. Add vegetables just long enough before serving time so they will be tender. PAN FRYING: Heat a heavy frying pan until it is sizzling hot. Add a tablespoon butter to pan and allow to melt; or rub the pai, with a little suet or a small amount of fat. Place the meat in the hot

He seems to think he will have one as his father did and lie helpless for years, unable to even talk. What are the main causes of a stroke and what can I tell him to do that might help prevent this from happening to him?-K.S., Ohio

DEAR K .- Many strokes are preceded by warning symptoms such as brief periods of loss of speech, weakness of limbs or loss of consciousness. High blood pressure, smoking, diabetes, older age and blood cholesterol levels are directly related to the higher incidences of cerebral infrac-

Vacation Offers May Be Phony

Las Vegas vacation offers that promise much more than they deliver are now being sold by mail across the nation, Postal Inspector in Charge W.R. Newsome warned today.

Newsome said at least 12 separate companies now contacting prospective buyers by mail and telephone are under investigation by the Postal Inspection Service. Complaints have been received from Texas consumers in Fort Worth, Dallas and Houston.

In response to inquiries vacation about "certificates," the companies ask for a "service charge" of from \$25 to \$50, sometimes requesting personal credit card numbers, supposedly to confirm identity but actually to bill prospective buyers through credit card companies. The claim firms the "certificates" are good for three days and two nights lodging for two in Las Vegas, and include meals and a gambling package valued at

Typically, those who take the bait have to pay additional fees and reservation deposits, and the so-called "service charge" is not refunded as represented in an initial offer. Newsome said when certificate holders send hotel reservation requests they are met with "regret" letters advising that no rooms are available on the days requested, and when refunds are requested they get letters asking them to be patient.

Anyone victimized through the mails should report it to Postal Inspector D.C. Swindle, Consumer Protection Specialist for the Fort Worth Division of the Postal Inspection Service, P.O. Box 1230, Fort Worth, Texas 76101, or telephone



Reflections In Perspective By I. Will Ussery

The industrial city of Liege, Belgium is one of the most pleasant places it has been my privilege to visit. In the course of my second visit to Liege I met a pensioner who introduced himself as a 'retired Captain of Mortars-the first world war'. He went on with: 'You are an American, no? We love the Americans. We love America. America has helped us win our wars, but they never ask anything in return. Not so; with so many of our allies.'

Anyway; about Liege. Situated astride the River Loire; it is a bustling city of various industries, not the least is that of arms manufacture. The principal center of that particular industry is in Herstal, just outside Liege, where the Belgian government turns out superb small arms in the factory of 'Fabrique Nationale d'Armes d'Guerre'. This is the site of orgin of sporting firearms known in the U.S. as 'Brownings'. And in the course of turning out Browning sporting firearms, 'F.N' is engaged, as the name implies, in the manufacture of military hardware for customers all over the globe. Interesting place, Herstal.

But, back to Liege. In addition to its being a busy industrial center; it also is quite an agrarian marketplace. The agricultural production in the area surrounding Liege is divided about equally between sugar beats, small grains (oats, wheat and barley) and vegetables. And the most of the farmers arewould you believe, Spainish?

Interesting city, Liege. About the friendliest people you can imagine. And one of the cleanest cities you'll come across. The walks along the fronts of practically every business house in the city are scrubbed every norning. In the course of an early morning stroll, one proceeds with caution. Scrubwomen are sloshing and swishing with total abandon from dawn 'til sunrise.

On my first visit to Liege, the airline had arranged accomodations at the Hotel Clu d'Or. Translated, it seems that this is simply the 'Eagle Hotel'. And well-named, it is. The hotel is perched on the promontary of a hill which rises steeply from the Loire River, and on a very narrow cobblestone paved street through which a full-sized American auto would proceed but with extreme caution. Across the street from the hotel there is a Franciscan monestary. And from the dining room, which proudly displays its certificte has having been classified as a 'four star' eating place of internaional renown, one can compare each of the twenty nine church steeples with the other twenty eight. The twenty nine which can be seen from the dining room, that is. Probably covers a little more than two-thirds of a total view of the city.

As for the accomodations of the Clu D'Or, they may be described as being quite quaint. The twelve bedrooms are located on the second floor of the building, which is a coerted mansion which was originally built in the fourteenth century as the residence of the lord who owned the farms along the river below. Guests are requested to inform the concierge if they plan to be out past the sunset so that they may be provided with keys in order that they may re-enter the hotel. The heavy oaken front door is locked, y'know. Having made the ascent up the steep hill, and been deposited at the hotel; the hustle and bustle of the city below somehow suddenly becomes another world....and another time.

The bar...no self-respecting dining room in Belgium would be without facilities for the thirsty...is just to the right of the dining room. So situated as to avoid obstructing the view of the city. And, sitting in a strategic position somewhat between the bar and the dining room, relaxing and perhaps comparing the church steeples, I became aware that a customer had entered the bar and was faced with something of a dif-

ficulty. He was the only customer in the bar, and was obviously of American extraction. And his problem was the one which makes one wonder why Americans have for so long been so loved by so many people in so many countries...the language barrier. Although he was by no means being obstreperous, he just couldn't get across to the bartender that he wanted a touch of bourbon whiskey of a particular brand, with water on the side. The bartender was being very patient, as was the customer. But one spoke only French, and the other...in this particular instance...had managed to reach Liege and the Clu d'Or via the railway from Brussels with no means of communication other than the English language.

In the interest of international relations (and the man did appear to be suffering from a consuming thirst) I offered my assistance. The customer was most grateful, as was the barman. Quite simple, actually. Only took a few words of each of the two divergent languages. As an expression of his grattitude, the American asked if I would join him. I did. And we began a conversation. Hesitantly, on his part, I could add. It went something like...

"You speak very good English". The customer, addressing

me. "Thank You, Sir". Me to him.

"Where did you learn English?" Customer to me. "In Texas, where I was born and raised". Was my reply. I

thought the man would swallow his glass.

Turned out that he was from Wisconsin. Was in Liege for the purpose of closing a deal with the people in Herstal for a distributorship of ammunition in the U.S. I can't help but wonder how he made out. A very pleasant sort of chap, he was. And do not for a moment feel that he was in his cups. He was simply thirsty, and for a bourbon and water. Apparently the first for the day. And it was late afternoon.

Eastland Gets Dual Well Sun Texas Co. completed No. 11 O.H. Delano as a Strawn gas discovery five miles east of Ranger in Eastland County.

It is now a dual well, having been completed in 1977 in the Gailey-Allen (Marble Falls) Field. Location is 2,100 feet from

the south and 2,971 feet from the east lines of O.H. Delano Survey.

From the Strawn it had an absolute, open flow of 980,000 cubic feet of dry gas daily from perforations at 1,578-90 feet. The pay was treated with 750 gallons of acid.

The 41/2-inch casing is set at 3,097 feet. Total depth was 3,800 feet and plugged back to 3,057 feet.

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

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
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

Limits On Cotton Acreage

Washington, D.C.-Senator Lloyd Bentsen on Wednesday warned that any decision by the U.S. Department of Agriculture to tightly restrict cotton acreage in 1981 would deal a severe blow to drought-stricken Texas farmers.

"A strict requirement that farmers plant within their historical Normal Crop Acreage (NCA) which is based on 1977, would cause severe damage," said Bentsen in a letter to Agriculture Secretary Bob Bergland.

The USDA shortly will annnounce its 1981 cotton program containing the limit which farmers must plant within to qualify for government agriculture benefits.

"Texas cotton acreage has expanded dramatically

since 1977, particularly in West Texas. This cotton has been produced in response to market demand, and it has made large contributions to our balance of payments while expanding our export markets as well as supplying domestic markets," Senator Bentsen said.

"These Texas farmers are in a free market which is now telling them, through high prices, that there is a demand for their cotton."



55 MPH - When Will Texas Comply?

By Viola M. Payne Sergeant Jerry Mathews, in charge of the Department of Public Safety for the Eastland-Callahan County district, was disappointed but not particularly surprised at the recent news that Texas drivers had not complied with the 40 per cent rate set on the 55 M.P.H. Federal Speed Law. The latest information from the Office of James B. Adams, Texas State Director for the Department of Public Safety, stated that surveys throughout the year by the Highway Department indicated that the compliance rate was about 36 per cent for the Federal Fiscal year, which ended Sept. 30, 1980.

"The 36 per cent is better than the 30 per cent compliance rate of last year," states Mathews, "But it is still not good enough. 'That means that under Federal Law, sanctions could result in loss to the Texas Highway fund of up to \$8 million in fiscal year 1982. This withholding of the Highway Funds has never been done yet - but it can be done. Especially if the State shows the disposition to fall behind next year, when the mandated compliance rate will be up to 50 per cent.

'My own observations around Eastland County had indicated that only about 37 per cent of drivers in this area were in compliance slightly above the State-wide

'This figured with the increased amount of speed violation tickets the Troopers from this area were writing, and other signs of the disregard of the 55 M.P.H. Law by the public."

Sergeant Mathews adds that many of the violators apprehended in Eastland County are not local people

Sergeant Mathews explains that the rate of compliance on this law is arrived at not by the amount of arrests made, but by surveys by the State Highway Department. Unmarked cars park beside roadways and clock traffic, with no attempt made to stop the offenders at that time.

In Eastland County, as a number of citizens have noticed, the Troopers are vigorously working at speed enforcement. In the period from Jan. to Oct. in 1979 there were 2,855 arrests for violations, and from Jan. to Oct. 1980 there were 3,766 arrests. That was an increase in speed arrests of 30 per

"Non-compliance of the speed law by the motoring public," says Mathews, "Has caused us to spend so much time and effort on speed enforcement that we have not had the time necessary to effectively handle our D.W.I. problem. When you combine these two

factors you will find that, although there is a total reduction in the number of accidents, our serious accidents and deaths are doubled for the year to date." He went on to cite other

"I'm afraid we have just as many D.W.I.'s on the road around here this year," states Mathews, "But we're just not catching them. It is known that alcohol-related accidents cause 50 per cent of the fatalities nationally as well as state-wide and locally. When you mix speed with a drinking driver, you almost always have a lethal combination.


