### CAMPBELL BROS. SHOW.

There was a large crowd in town last Friday to see the Campbell Bros. Show. Possibly two thousand people from the country were in town that day. They were here from Clyde, Putnam, Atwell, Admiral, Cottonwood, Cross Plains, Caddo Peak, Belle Plaine Oplin, Tecumseh, Eagle Cove, Dudley, Eula, in fact about every neighborhood in the county was represented. The show is very good, much better than some expected and much better than usually come here. The menagera contained lions, tigers, leopards, monkeys, yaks, zebras, camels, elephants grizzly bears and many other species of animals were well worth the price of admission. In the arena some fine trapez acts were put on. Two little white children and two little Jap children, all splendid trapez performers, attracted considerable attention. One of the most exciting feats was the trick riding of five Cossacks from Russia. These people are said to be the most fearless and expert riders known. They were mounted on fine horses and made a fine showing. They have a saddle that is fearfully and wonderfully made from a Texas cow boy's view. The saddles seemed to be about a foot thick in the seat and peculiarly constructed. A cow boy would not know what it was if he met one in the road, but these wild riders of the Czar of Russia had no trouble in staying on them. They wear the Cossack dress and fez, and were armed with short swords, which with a short carbine constitute the arms of the Russian cavalry. Every body seemed to enjoy themselves. No drunkenness or rowdyism to mar the

pleasure of the occasion. It is a good clean show and all hope it will come again. One of the fine show horses, a fine dappled gray mare, died while the show was going on, but few knew it.

The Dallas State Fair opened last Saturday with very flattering prospects.

The almighty dollar seems to have more worshipers in this country than the Almighty himself. "True, 'tis pity. Pity 'tis true."

It seems that the Waters-Pierce Oil Co. officials lied to get a permit to do business in Texas. A small thing like that does not bother the average corporation.

President Roosevelt made his trip to New Orleans allright, but his boat was wrecked in a collision on the river on his way to the cruiser that was to take him north. None of the presidential party were injured and made connection on time.

A man in South Haven, Kan., has a grievance against an editor and consulted a lawyer to find out the best way to "break up the paper." The lawyer told him the surest way would be to buy the paper and "run it himself" a few months.—Ex.

Good advice, but we are left in the dark as to what the would be paper smasher did about it.

Gov. Hogg's recent illness proves that the people of Texas still have a warm place in their hearts for the big ex-Governor, and the whole state rejoices that he is recovering and all hope he may be spared many years. Texas cannot afford to lose such men as Gov. Hogg, though some of us did not always agree with him on political measures. He is honest, big of body, heart and soul and THE STAR hopes he will live to be a hundred.

John D. Rockefeller's Sunday School class seems to have gone into politics heels over head. Last week the pastor of his church addressed the class on good government, and while no names were mentioned, the class understood that the pastor was for Jerome for district attorney and the cheers for Jerome rang through the church just like an ordinary political ward meeting. This may be all right but we do not believe such things will help the church or the cause of religion.

Lester Power, editor of the Carney Pioneer, Haskell, County, and Jake McKinney are charged with shooting Robert Martin at Carney on Oct. 20th. Martin was carried to Haskell for treatment where he died Saturday. The Anson Reporter says "there is conflicting reports as to the cause that led up to the shooting, but there seems to be a woman in the case, and possibly considerable whiskey. There were about one hundred shots fired." Lester Power is a young newspaper man, and a son of W. J. Power, who formerly lived at Belle Plaine, and later at Baird years ago. THE STAR regrets to learn of the trouble of the young man.

Poor bleeding section 120 may be avenged yet, and the parties responsible for "the deep damnation of its taking off" may get their due. There is talk of a called session of the legislature sometime early in the new year.

No tax is an honest or fair tax except an advalorem tax, and every occupation tax in Texas should be abolished, and let the people know exactly what they pay. The people have to foot the bills any way and why not honestly write it in their tax receipts.

The political pot in this county shows signs of agitation, and a number of prospective candidates are quietly feeling the public pulse. Running for office is a slippery business and one cannot tell until too late whether he or the other fellow will slip into office.

New York is in the midst of a red hot municipal contest (they don't have any other kind up there it seems) Geo. B. McClellan is the democratic nominee for mayor to succeed himself, W. R. Hearst is independent candidate. The republicans also have a ticket except for district attorney, District Attorney Jerome, elected as a democrat, is a candidate for re-election running as an independent. Things are badly mixed with the chances in favor of McClellan and Jerome. Many think Hearst has cooked his political goose by opposing the regular democratic nominee in this contest. A man is not much of a democrat who will not stay with his party simply because he cannot always have his own way.

The Dallas Fair management with the usual haste and magnanimity appointed the first day of the Fair as "Press Day" with the result that very few newspaper men were present. Newspaper men, unlike some other people, are unwilling to put up with a half baked show. Opening days of big fairs usually finds everything in chaotic state and little to be seen of interest except the parade and palaver of opening. People who visit the fair for instruction and amusement mostly shun opening days, but the newspaper men were wanted early to boost the Fair, which is good for the Fair, but not so pleasant for the newspaper men. A few days later would have been much more agreeable to the newspaper men; when more of them doubtless would have attended to meet and greet each other as well as see the sights at the Fair. We hope the management next year will put off "Press day" until the Fair is under full swing, when the pencil pushers will have an opportunity to see the Fair at its best. This might not be worth so much immediately to the Fair, but would in the long run be worth more to the Fair and the public, as more editors would attend than on opening days.

John Castles received a message Monday morning that his brother-in-law, J. D. (Buff) McGaughey, and several others had been poisoned on Mr. McGaughey's ranch near Double Mountain, and that his sister, Mrs. McGaughey, was seriously ill at the home of her parents at Anson. Mr. Castles left at once for Anson. Mr. McGaughey died Monday morning at his ranch and the remains were brought to Anson for interment. The parties were supposed to have been poisoned by eating meat that had been salted down in a zinc tub. The balance of the party, some seven or eight, were made very sick, but it is thought that they will all recover. Mr. Castles returned yesterday, and from him we got the account of the sad affair. Mrs. McGaughey is well known in Baird, where she has many friends who deeply sympathize with her in her great sorrow.

GOT THEM LOCATED.

"Mum" is the word. The antis are advising their candidates to keep mum. Ah! boys it won't work. We have already got you located and you might as well talk and smile, "altho' your hearts are breaking."—New Era.

This shows which way the wind is blowing, the pros will try to elect all the county, district and state officers next year and the New Era gives the snap away. We have got you located means that if you are not a pro you will get no support from the New Era crowd. So far as the antis are concerned we believe we are in a position to know as much about what they are doing and what they intend to do as the New Era, and we do not know of any such advice as mentioned by the New Era, nor do we know of any one authorized to give any such advice, as there is practically no anti organization in the State. To show that there is no such advice being observed in this county we could name a number of leading antis in the county, who are outspoken advocates of a leading pro for governor, and for congress and will continue to support them unless the pros themselves draw the line. If there is any pro and anti fight over county and state officers in this county next year the antis will not, in our opinion, be responsible for it.

An anti who is prominent in the democratic party in this county, but has never taken any part in the local option contests in the county except to vote, said to us the other day. "I was beginning to think pretty well of the New Era, but the last issue contained some hard bitter things." We do not know to what paragraph he had reference, but here is one that very properly comes under the head of bitter thrusts. "When a church member, who is an anti, passes a crowd nowadays he attracts almost as much attention as an elephant, and some wag is almost sure to ask, Is it boodle or booze." This is a sly way the New Era has of saying that no church member is anti unless he is paid for it or is a lover of booze. To put it plainer and what the New Era doubtless means is that no church member is an anti unless he is either a bribe taker or a drunkard.

He informed us that he had been with the show several months and his duty being to print the official programs of the show. He has a printing outfit in the car that goes with the show. Dr. Rubottom will be remembered by the old settlers at Buffalo Gap where he published a paper several years. He was a Mexican War Veteran, having served in an Indiana regiment we believe. His regiment with the First Mississippi regiment commanded by Jeff Davis saved the day at Beauna Vista, we believe it was, by successfully beating back the desperate assaults of the Mexicans. This was when Old Zack Taylor congratulated Jeff Davis, to whom he had not spoken since his marriage with Gen. Taylor's daughter, and gave him credit for saving the American Army from defeat. WE WANT YOUR TRADE.

Because we said Ballinger and San Angelo, two wet towns, were each building more houses last May than Brownwood, Cisco and Abilene combined, the Brownwood Banner-Bulletin says opposition to local option has effected our optical nerves. Not at all. Last May Ballinger had in course of construction eight stone business houses. Brownwood had none. Ballinger had a number of residences in course of construction. Brownwood had one. San Angelo appeared to be doing equally as well as Ballinger, if not better in the way of building. Mayor Powell is our authority for the number of business houses building in Ballinger. The Frisco had the foundation in for a small brick depot at Brownwood and that with the residence Tom Yantis was building is all we saw building in Brownwood. The reference to building in the towns named was not made to boost or disparage any of them, because they had or had not adopted prohibition, but to disprove the New Era's statement that prohibition was building up certain town while Baird was not building because it was wet. The fact is, Baird is building some all the time, but a reader of the New Era would never learn it from that paper, as it never mentions any improvement in Baird, but can see new buildings in Brownwood sixty miles away that do not exist. It can see only good in other towns and only evil in its own town and takes special pleasure in publishing what people say derogatory to its own town—that drummer statement in last issue for instances. Now if we have not given a correct statement of the building going on in Brownwood while the Press Association was in session there in May just give us a list of them and we will publish it. Tell us how many business houses and kind building at that time and where. We may have overlooked some residences going up but we are pretty sure no business houses were building at that time in Brownwood.

**IN HORRIBLE AGONY.**

**W. G. Wilt Swallowed a Large Dose of Carbolic Acid and Dies.**

Fort Worth, Oct. 28.—Brooding over family troubles, W. G. Wilt killed himself on the front porch of his wife's home on West Belknap street. He swallowed a large dose of carbolic acid and died in horrible agony. Several days ago District Judge Smith granted an injunction restraining Wilt from molesting his wife. This citation was found in a pocket of the dead man. He had attempted to kill himself several times. Last spring he shot off his left arm in an effort to take his life. He was a member of the Woodmen and Redmen.

**HULEN HONORED.**

**Member of Executive Committee Interstate National Guard Association.**

Austin, Oct. 25.—Adjutant General Hulen received a telegram from General Dick, United States senator from Ohio and author of the "Dick bill," advising him that he (General Hulen) was on the executive committee of the Interstate National Guard association. This is considered quite an honor.

District Attorney Moore filed suit in the Twenty-sixth district court in the name of the state against the Texas company, one of the big oil companies at Beaumont, for taxes and penalties under the Kennedy bill, aggregating \$30,000. The suit was filed without consent or authority of the attorney general.

The Southwestern Telegraph and Telephone company paid its taxes to the comptroller under the Kennedy bill. The total tax for the quarter ending Sept. 30 was \$9560, but the company only paid in money \$5881, having been allowed credit on former law. Gross receipts for the quarter were \$588,573. The company did not protest.

**SENSATIONAL CHARGES.**

**Smith County Official Resigns and Makes Serious Allegations.**

Tyler, Tex., Oct. 25.—County Attorney Hanson of Smith county has tendered to the county commissioners his resignation, filing a sensational document with the county clerk. He says he does not feel he can afford to run with certain officials in the enforcement of law. He charges that one certain official is "only for himself and not for the enforcement of law;" is willing to do anything for his own political interests. Alleges that the party in question disregards the rights of citizens in enforcement of law. He further alleges he cannot maintain his honor by carrying out his oath of office and enforcing the laws under said official.

**MIRACULOUS ESCAPE.**

**Nergo Grabs Telephone Wire Higher Up and Loses Own Life.**

Tyler, Tex., Oct. 25.—A white man unknown came in contact with a telephone wire that had fallen across an electric light one. The telephone wire became charged with 1050 volts of electricity. The white man's shouts brought Ed James, a negro, to him. The latter touched the wire further up and thus took the majority of the charge, releasing the white man, who ran away. Aneb Beall, another white man, grabbed James by the foot as the latter fell dead and was knocked down but not seriously hurt.

**HORRIBLE DEATH.**

**Boy Could Neither Eat Nor Drink and Had Terrible Convulsions.**

Paris, Tex., Oct. 25.—A boy by the name of McCleskey died Wednesday morning of hydrophobia. He was bitten by a mad dog eight months ago. Just before his death he could neither eat nor drink, had terrible convulsions and one side of his body became totally numb.

Los Angeles, Cal., Oct. 31.—Walter Scott, the Death Valley miner, who a few weeks ago attracted wide notice by a record run in a special train over the Santa Fe railroad from here to Chicago, was seriously, if not fatally, injured in an automobile accident here.
