Governor Says Not te Expect Immediate Cotton Price Rise

In ernor Sterling told his hecently Govhar Sterling told his hearers帾 he did not expect any "startling results" on the market from cotton legislation. He further said that he considered "downright silly" the idea that was advanced that the whole cotton world has been hanging breathlessly on what was done by him and the Texas Legislature in this matter.
"The principle outcome will be to encourage the farmer in a diversification of crops," said the governor, who boasts that he has governor, who boasts that he has along many a weary row.
"Modern machinery doing the work of many men in shorter time is a fine thing, butit has re-
sulted in over-production. The sulted in ever-production. The
only remedy I see for that is a only remedy I see for that is a
shorter work week and a shorter shorter work week and a shorter
work day. There is so much to be done and so many to do it. If men are not furnished work, they still have to eat, and somebody must feed them.
"Everybody seems to want the government to take care of them. Whe is going to take care of the government?"
"Suppose westop cotton planting altogether. The farmers are going to have to plant something else. When they do that they inerease the supbly of other things. If the crops they produce are fed to the hogs, we are going to have 4 cent/bacon, and then the hog growers will be hurt.
"Thls thing will work out all right,' he ended cheerfully, think the legislature will finish its work during the week, and that other cotton states will follow. If all do, there will likcly be some improvement, but do not look for any startling jump in cotton prices. They said if I would only call a special session of the Texas Legislature prices would go up. I called it, and they went down
