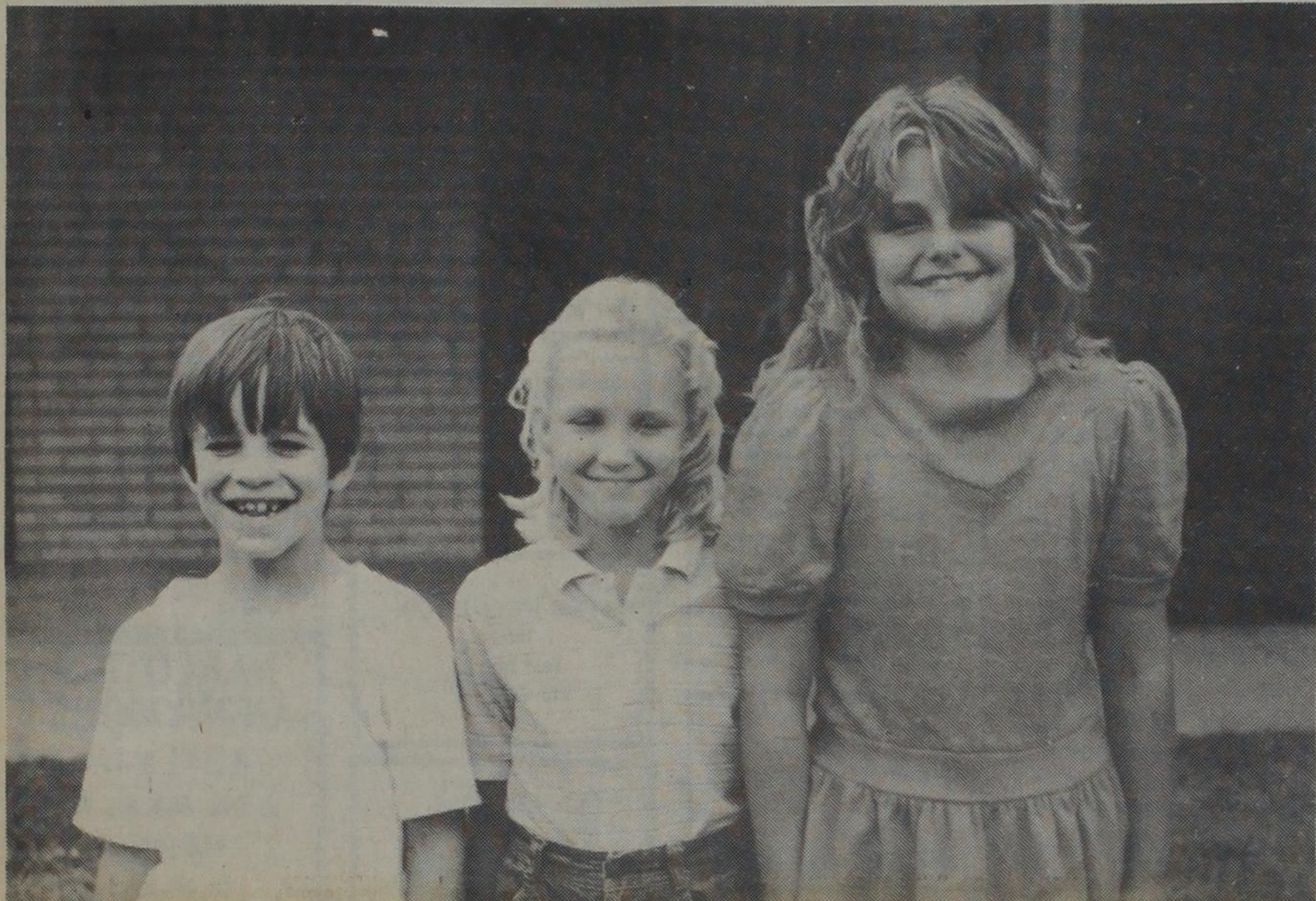

The Chamber asked for participation from the Intermediate School and some very fine work came from the third and fourth grades. Lions Club Hears Of Progress In Watch Making and Diamonds

Progress in watch making and in the manufacture of artificial diamonds to the point of near perfection was reported by Al Anderson, local jewelry store proprietor, in a talk last Wednesday noon at the weekly luncheon of the Cisco Lions Club.

Initially, time was measured by dripping water and sand in hour glasses, Mr. Anderson reported. Next, clocks began ticking as pendulums swung back and forth. To achieve greater accuracy, watch makers had a balance wheel that divided the second by five.

In 1960, Bulova came out with the Actatron watch with a vibrating fork that divided the second 360 times. Actatron watches varied no more than four or five seconds a day or a minute per month — a revolutionary achievement.

The electronic quartz crystal vacuum tube came along to further divide the second 32,000 times, Mr. Anderson said. The quartz watch, he said, costs com-

paratively little to manufacture and Bulova can no longer sell Actatrons and has stopped their manufacture. A quartz watch can be so accurate that it will vary no more than one to three minutes per year, Mr. Anderson said.

While the quartz watch has an outstanding accuracy record, it usually must be serviced in two to five years, the jewelry said. Batteries must be replaced from time to time.

Few people can distinguish between zircons and diamonds, Mr. Anderson said. The newer cubic zirconium imitation diamond, he added, requires a machine to be recognized. Lion Jay Richardson served as program chairman and introduced Mr. Anderson.

Fall is the most important time to fertilize established trees, shrubs and vines. Nutrient-starved plants should be fertilized to correct deficiencies before frost...

Before fertilizing cultivate shallowly around plants. Some people prefer organic fertilizers such as milorgamite, animal manure, dried blood, cottonseed meal, etc., and these are acceptable for routine feeding.

Such organic fertilizers can be used at five to 10 lbs. per 100 sq. ft. of area or one to two cups per established, older plants.

In case of deficiency or to give plants a boost before cold weather use an inorganic or commercial fertilizer. Use five oz. of slow release fertilizer per 100 sq.

ft. or one tablespoon per plant. Water after fertilizing if rain is delayed.

To correct a micronutrient deficiency like iron apply a liquid or dry chelated product according to label directions and water it in.

Newly planted container-grown plants should be lightly fertilized at planting and after frost.

After frost but before freezing weather is a good time to fertilize trees and shrubs.

Pruning from mid-August to killing frost is discouraged. Some species such as crape myrtle might be stimulated to grow and the tender stems could be damaged by low temperatures.

However, dead, diseased, or insect-infested plant parts should be removed anytime they are noticed. Haul all infested debris away. Many insects and diseases overwinter in dead plant parts.

Exhibitors should bring a cloth or bed sheet and cover their exhibit display when it is left unattended. (Exception is that house plants do not need to be covered).

7. The Bazaar will be held

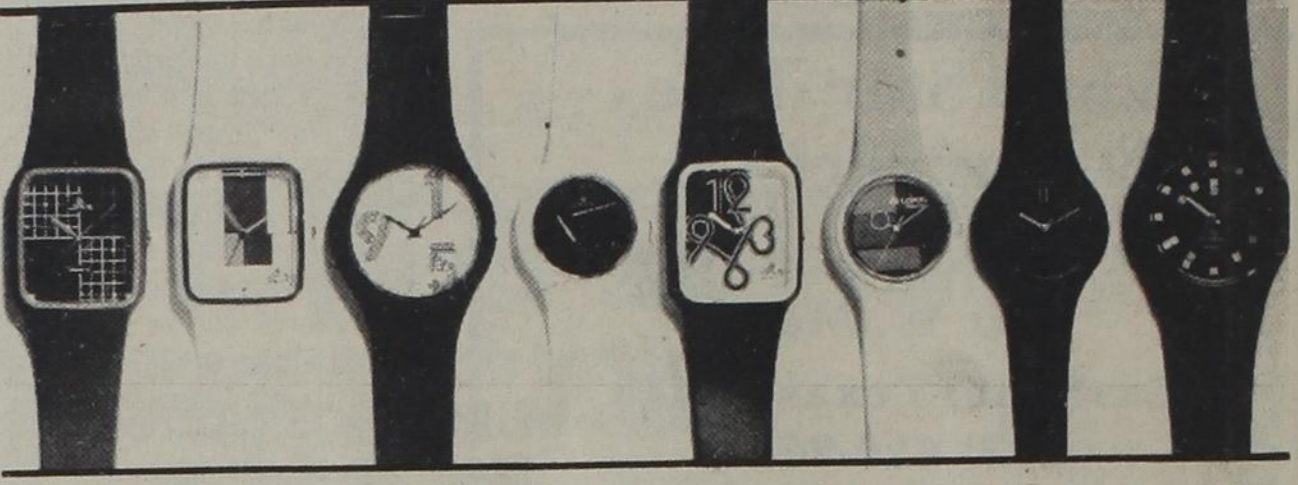

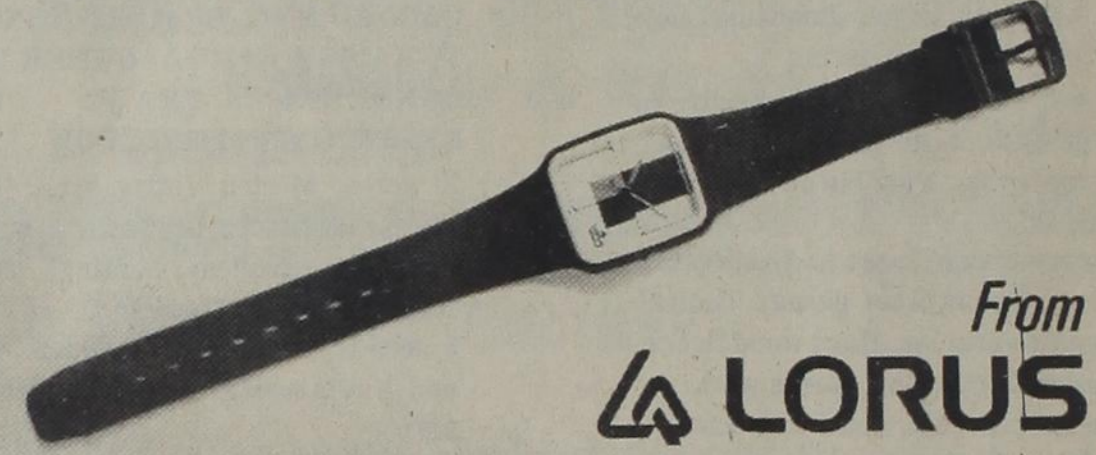

The safe way to connect battery jumper cables: Make sure the final connection is to "ground" away from the battery. This avoids the likelihood of a battery explosion in case of a spark.

Vacuum hoses may deteriorate in the heat and contamination around an auto engine. If hissing sound does not give away a leaking vacuum hose, a vacuum gauge will spot it.

In emergencies, it's often better to steer around a problem, rather than brake. Take your foot off the accelerator and swerve into the next lane, if you can.

Engine sluggishness and poor mileage may be signs of a dirty air filter. To check, remove the filter and hold it up to a light. If the light doesn't shine through, replace.

Guest Slot

DON GRIFFIN of Coats Furniture doesn't plan to be the next man in space - but he does have a space problem. He's got truck loads of new merchandise already on the road to his store and his showroom and warehouse are full, so-o-o-o-o he's staging what might be the close-out special of the decade, and has taken the mark-down pencil to a lot of items on display. Beginning Monday you're likely to find exactly the things you've been working for, and fine 'em at drastically reduced priced - some even below Don's cost. But you'll need to be early - these won't last long.

LET'S YOU and I make a vow: for a change, let's plan to vote in the Nov. 5 Constitutional Amendment election. So many don't, so our votes may carry more weight in this election than in any other that we might ever vote in.

There are no local contests, so there's not going to be any big surge of local interest, but we need to remember that WE ARE ALL going to be affected by the outcome of the Nov. 5 voting. If you ever want your vote to count, this is the ONE.

We're all convinced that the future of water needs in Texas (and that's all of us) hinge on the passage of Amendments One and Two. If such state-wide decisions could be made in July and August when the water demand is so high and the need for more water so great, then there'd be doubt as to the outcome of the election. But we're human and in the fall, with the lakes full, we kinda take water for granted. We need to remember how it is when there's drought, high temperature and shortage of water.

There's a dozen things that Eastland County towns could be doing right now if the pro-

visions of these amendments were in place and operational right now.

They're not - but we can help get them into existence by making sure we vote Nov. 5 and vote FOR ONE AND TWO.

Passage could make it possible to secure money to be paid back on revenue bonds which could be replaced, upgrade, expand and enhance present water supply systems in each of our towns; increase the water treatment and delivery facilities of our various plants; install and improve waste-water treatment facilities; and any number of other steps which cost LOTS

OF MONEY, but which can under these plans be affordable for all of us.

There are any number of projects already in place which have been made possible (on a smaller scale) by the same type of plans. Eastland's modern wastewater system came into being through revenue bond money which means it is paid for as we use it by the users without additional tax money for anyone. There are other examples.

This is a water opportunity. The alternatives don't exist.

ANOTHER AMENDMENT which is of concern to many is No. 13 which if passed would "...provide for the reappointment of the judicial districts of the state by the Judicial Districts

Board or by the Legislative Redistricting Board, and providing for the administration and jurisdiction of constitutional courts."

That could be dynamite for Eastland County. Attorneys met Friday afternoon to discuss the possible ramifications of such a measure, should it pass, and will be issuing a statement this coming week.

The possible loss of the 91st District Court is not a thought that we folks like to entertain, so we must be kept abreast of the situation. The wording of the proposal and its accompanying arguments for and against indicate that decisions (some of which we might not like) could one day be made in Austin if the measure passes.

We promise to advise further before election day. You promise to vote!

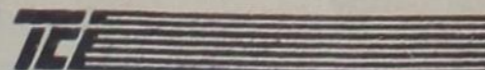

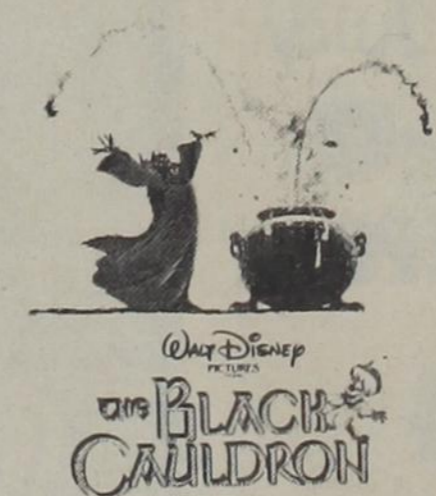

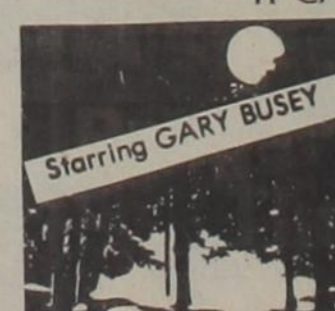

**County To
Lose Ballard**

The Eastland County Extension staff and the Eastland County Commissioners Court have been notified that one Extension Agent position has been eliminated in Eastland County. The position of county extension agent-home economics now staff by Faith Ballard will not be refilled. Ballard will be transferred to another position with the Extension Service before August 31, 1986.

The Extension Agent position being cut was established on April 1, 1936. Twenty nine women have served in this position during the 50 years working with 4-H youth and adults. Many of them have gone on to serve as County Home Economic program leaders and administrators in the Extension Service.

Faced with a \$4.5 million budget shortfall for the next two years, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service is reducing its statewide staff while continuing to pursue top quality programming.

The shortfall resulted from a \$3.2 million reduction in general revenue appropriations coupled with unfunded salary increases and estimated increases in such operating expenses as utilities and postage.

"With a budget shortfall of this magnitude, we basically had two choices," said Dr. Zerle L. Carpenter, director of the state educational agency that is responsible for agriculture, home economics, community development and 4-H programs.

"We could maintain our present level of staffing and drastically reduce program-

ming, or we could reduce our staff and direct funds from these positions into high quality educational programs for clientele.

"We chose the latter because we felt the citizens of Texas should not be deprived of quality educational programs," Carpenter emphasized. "Our goal, as always, will continue to be to address the needs of the state's citizenry within the resources allocated."

To continue top quality programs within the constraints of a drastically reduced budget, the Extension Service initiated a Reduction in Force effort on Sept. 1.

"A substantial number of specialist and county agent positions will be eliminated in the near term, with some additional positions to be eliminated by Sept. 1, 1986," Carpenter said.

"Additionally, a number of administrative and support positions will be eliminated over the next two years from our staff, about a 10 percent reduction.

"To accomplish this obviously painful task of staff reduction, we began with a careful study of state,

regional and county situations," Carpenter noted. "We looked at a number of factors, such as number of farms, cash receipts, complexity of program needs in various counties and regions, plus special clientele needs."

Regarding clientele needs, Carpenter pointed out that a number of regional conferences had been completed that involved some 250 key leaders over the state. These conferences were aimed at identifying critical issues facing Texans—issues which are within the scope of the Extension Service's mission.

Based on findings from these conferences and the detailed studies noted above, a statewide staffing plan was developed, Carpenter said.

"Be assured that it is the goal of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service to provide high quality educational programs to address the needs of the state's citizens," Carpenter said. "Furthermore, it is our intent to meet this goal within the framework of prudent and wise management of resources made available by federal, state and local governments."

In discussing the matter of high blood pressure we should be able to know what to do to help prevent the disease, or at least to control it.

One of the things we should do is to get your blood pressure checked at least once a year, more often if it is elevated.

Watch your weight. If you are overweight, you are more susceptible to high blood pressure and heart disease.

Watch you salt intake. Too much salt (Sodium) can raise blood pressure in some people.

If you have high blood pressure see your doctor regularly, take your medicine and follow your diet as prescribed, and stick with it!

Finally, if you would attend your senior citizen center each Monday, Wednesday and Friday you could have your blood pressure checked.

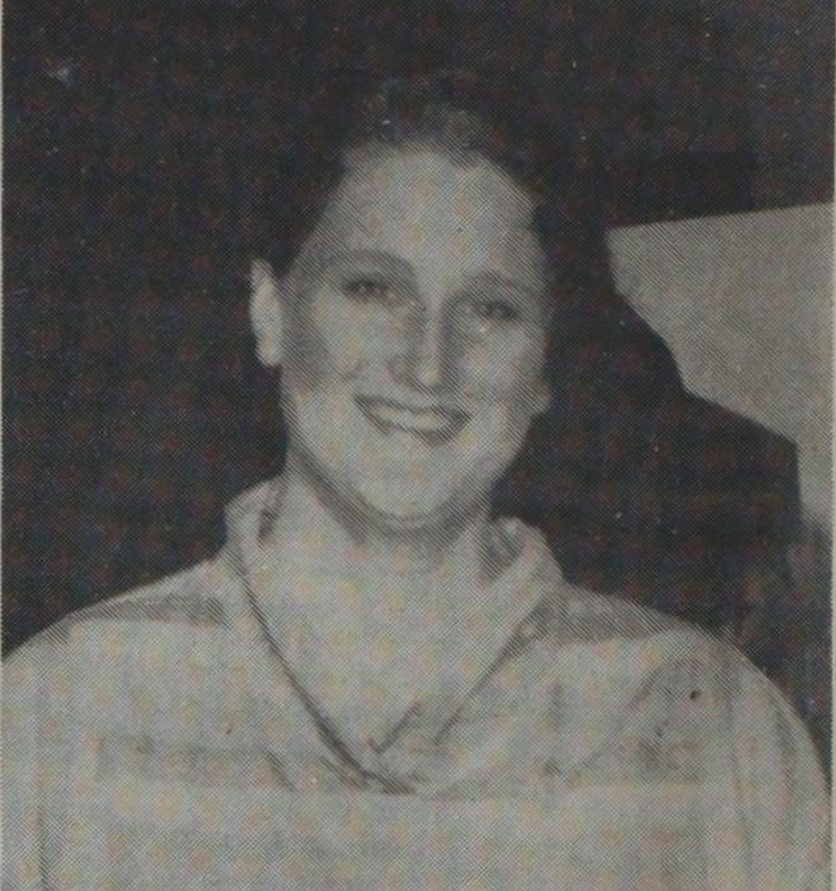
Cross Plains Art Show Set

Paper clippings in 1941 concern the weddings of Nadeene Huestis and Blake Stephens and Betty Lou Powell and Jack Lauderdale. A 1942 story reports the resignation of the late Rev. P.D. O'Brien from First Baptist Church. And another 1942 clipping reports the marriage of Dorothy Hampton to Marshall Jones in Corpus Christi. The late Olin O. A 1941 clipping shows that Bob Latson was King Lobo VIII and his queen was Ruby Kent, his wife. School officials pictured were R.N. Cluck, superintendent; O.L. Stamey, high school principal, and H.R. Garrett, vice president of the college. J.T. Berry was pictured as our town's mayor. Pictured as men about town were F.E. Harrell, Neil Lane, F.B. Altman, Charles Sandler, Edward Lee and Nick Miller. Miss Jean Fox was Miss Cisco that year.

There's a clipping about Bill Latch, whose son was

recently killed in Bangkok, who was in Pearl Harbor when the Jap bombers struck on Dec. 7, 1941. A story tells about 1941 CHS students making "Who's Who" and the list included Kathryn Langston, Billy Huffman, Brenda Warwick, Jack Chambliss and Ruby Kent.

A 1948 newspaper clipping carries a Lela Latch byline and tells about the CHS biology class visiting the fish hatchery... There's a copy of the Claremore, Okla., Daily Progress that tells about the Will Rogers and Wiley Post airplane crash in Alaska.

There are numerous clippings about death, tragic accidents, births and events that mirror the history of our community. Thanks to Mrs. Howell for sharing the scrapbook with us.
