Some of the people in the vicinity requested the Cisco American to call attention of Cisco people to the plight of this youth in the hope that someone would take the lead and give the boy a hand.

The young man has made no complaint and puts himself above charity. He is a typical brave American youth and asks nothing of life except health and an opportunity to earn his livelihood by his own efforts. He is making a manful struggle to attain success despite great difficulties, and in only hoping that his physical condition will improve and enable him to get out on the farm and win success from the soll.
