### JURY TRIALS IN CONTEMPT CASES

Labor has won a notable victory in the recent decision of the United States Supreme Court holding that courts cannot refuse jury trials in contempt cases arising from labor disputes. The decision upholds a controverted clause of the Clayton Act, by declaring that the requirement of a jury trial in certain specified instances is con- LOST-The party who picked up

This makes a breach in the wall formerly separating criminal contempt from other criminal cases. It is, in a way, an answer to the contention of labor leaders that judges have wielded oppressive power, especially in cases connected with strikes and injunctions, unjustly depriving citizens of their liberty. This class of cases has been one of the strongest factors in arraying so many labor leaders against the judiciary. When a citizen accused of violating an injunction is allowed a trial by a jury of his peers, as he would be if accused of any other crime, with the presumption of his innocence until he is proven guilty, he can no longer raise the cry of "judicial tyranny."

The decision, therefore, while curbing to some extent the power of judges, may really benefit the judiciary by allaying public criticism of its procedure. Thus what was originally intended by many as a radical blow at the courts, upheld now by the highest court, may help to re-

duce radicalism in a marked degree.

THE SEAPLANE OF MERCY

At the northern end of Lake Winnipeg there is an important post of the Hudson Bay Company. An Indian school is also located there. The little American Indians who attend that school have seen the white men who come there on business, and members of the forest protection service, but few other whites.

Recently an outbreak of diphtheria has threatened the school, and civilization's answer to the danger hanging over those children was the dispatch of a seaplane from the city of Winnipeg with enough material for 100 anti-toxin treatments. The seaplane was the quickest available means of getting help to the stricken school children. It is not at all improbable that it was the first seaplane they had ever seen, as undoubtedly it was the first anti-toxin ever administered to them.

The airplane, in its various forms, is regarded by military authorities as the most important war weapon of the present and the future. There has even been horrible talk of the possibility of spreading death-bearing disease germs among a whole population by means of the air-


