WAR OF MATERIALS.

People usually think of war in terms of men and weapons, but materials are no less important. Indeed, they might be put first in modern war-

The aggressors in this war started with a great quantity of trained man-power and weapons. But they were short of raw materials, and this deficiency has increased with the spread of their operations. They have naturally conquered some materials as they proceeded, but not enough to keep them going at the rate required in modern warfare. The Germans are now engaged in a frenzied drive to the southeast for oil, steel and other resources of the Black Sea and Caspian region, because that is the only way to keep their vast war machine

Meanwhile the democracies, thanks to their foresight during the period of world expansion and settlement which occurred mainly in the last century, are well supplied with materials. This group, tied together neatly as the "A-B-C-D" powers, includes America, Britain, China and the Dutch Indies.

The essential materials in their control include oil, tin, lumber, iron, chrome, manganese, copper, hemp, tung-sten, jute, cotton and other products. And it is such materials, along with the quali-ties of the people owning them, that are counted on to save the world for human freedom and enlightenment in this darkest age that the modern world has experienced.

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




