

## CJC Wranglers Accept Kansas Bowl Bid Dec. 7

Cisco Junior College has accepted an invitation to play Coffeyville, Kansas, Junior College in the annual Jay Hawk Bowl there on Saturday, Dec. 7, according to an announcement by CJC officials Monday.

The Wranglers of CJC completed their 1985 schedule in a game Saturday night with Eastern Oklahoma A&M College. The Oklahoma team won the contest, 60-to-9, which was played at Joplin, Mo., due to the Miami, Okla., home field of EOC being under water. The Wranglers were scheduled to hold regular workouts this week on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday. Next week, they will work out Monday and Tuesday and be dismissed the

balance of the week for Thanksgiving. The week of Dec. 2 will be a full work-out week with the team leaving Friday for Coffeyville. Travel plans will be announced later.

At Joplin, the Wranglers had an "off" night and a lot of bad luck to frustrate most of their efforts. They had poor field condition throughout the first half, which ended 46-0 in EOC's favor.

It wasn't until the fourth quarter that Cisco got really started. David Smith, running back, broke for 29 yards and a touchdown. Raymon Hernandez kicked the goal. Later, Sam Dudley, defensive tackle, blocked a punt and David West, defensive end, tackled the punter in the

end zone for a safety. Observers said the teams were much more evenly matched than the lopsided score indicated.

Mike Killian, sophomore linebacker, suffered a knee injury but he was expected to recover in time to play in the Dec. 7th bowl game.

Wrangler coaches and players reported that they

enjoyed playing at Joplin where the game was at the stadium of Southern Missouri College. The field was covered with astroturf.

The Wranglers finished their season with a 5-2-1 record. Tyler beat Kilgore last Saturday to win the conference race with a 5-1 record. Cisco finished second with a 3-2-1 record.

Most Christians know the numbers, 666, are referred to in the Bible as dealing with the anti-christ.



expected to be in February of 1986, with a start-up date for the project around the first of March. It is anticipated the project will be completed by the first of October in 1986.

City Manager Moore reported to the council that the city now has general and automobile liability insurance, as well as physical damage coverage and police professional. However, the city will be paying over \$40,000 a year for the \$1/2 million coverage.

Mr. Moore said this makes for a very difficult situation, and he will be continued to have it monitored. He said he had budgeted an amount for insurance this year which was double the past amount, but the actual cost to the city is twice the amount budgeted. That is a 400 percent increase in insurance cost to the city.

Mr. Moore stressed the insurance problems are not unique to Cisco since new rulings have caused a number of insurance carriers to drop municipal coverage.

Council members instructed Mr. Moore to prepare a resolution dedicating "Fiesta Park", located at the corner of Avenue F and West 15th Street, to the veterans of Cisco. He said he believes the park will honor the Cisco veterans of the Vietnam era, and a group of veterans has expressed an interest in fixing up the park and making it into a nice memorial for veterans of the area.





**PANDORA'S BOX**  
Jealousy and Envy generally are credited with being a couple of the bugs that flew out of Pandora's Box when she opened it. I would have expected Curiosity to have been inside that box, too. How did Pandora fall victim to it?

Of the two, I opt for envy to be worse than Jealousy. I do feel the difference is debatable. I understand about jealousy. But I may be identifying them wrongly, too.

Lately, I read an editorial column that had as its theme an idea that suggested problems with the minorities of the world are based in envy and/or jealousy.

We could name names, point fingers, voice prejudices, color and wire for sound. We can also get along with only a couple of divisions: The Haves and the Have-Nots.

Read your history books. The dust-ups in the world have usually come from the Have-Nots. They decide that several Somebodies, usually the Haves, but it may be other Have-Nots, are in possession of something they want. The Somebodies don't necessarily want to hand over what they have,

whether they earned it or inherited it.

Conflict—lots of conflict. Well, that's the nature of the beast, isn't it? If I want to give you the shirt off my back, that's one thing. If you want to take my shirt, willy-nilly, that's another thing.

Of course, much depends on why you want my shirt. If the only reason you yearn for it is because I have it, that sounds like envy to me. If you start grumbling and grousing and putting me and my shirt down, isn't that jealousy?

How many times can you find historical instances where the Have-Nots became Haves? How much gracious recognition have they received for their efforts, either as groups or as individuals?

Think of the people in your own orbit. There are certain to be some who were originally Have-Nots. Are they fully accepted by the somewhat smug Haves? Surface level, maybe.

Are the Have-Nots proud of them for making it up into a more comfortable world? Or is an unenthusiastic, "Yeah, but..." about the extent of appreciation from their recent Have-Not peers?

What makes "the crowd"

jeer at a group or individual trying and succeeding at a difficult objective? The crowd doesn't really mind failure of another's efforts makes the detractor more worthwhile—in his own eyes, anyway.

Does success shame and Have-Not-ers? It may. Why doesn't it always serve as an affirmative inspiration of only occasionally? Progress can be so slow. Destruction can be so swift.

But jealousy and envy are negative qualities, and this is one instance where two negatives a positive do not make!

Even if there were no concrete negatives, neither quality is constructive. It takes time and effort to concentrate on jealousy or envy. While busy about either, or both, it's a cinch no building up of any positive charge about anything in the life of an individual or of a nation can take place.

There probably is a social significance about jealousy and/or envy that escapes me. Maybe. Maybe they have their places as do gnats, and flies and rattlesnakes.

Maybe. I really do wish Pandora had baked a batch of cookies instead of opening that box.

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# Roaring Ranger Bowl Go-Ahead

The 3rd Annual Roaring Ranger Bowl picture cleared a little today when the Bowl Committee announced that Dixie College of St. George, Utah has been extended and has accepted a bid to play in the National Junior College Athletic Association-sanctioned bowl.

Dixie's Rebels will be making their second bowl appearance in three years in the game scheduled for 1 p.m. Saturday, December 7th, at the newly-refurbished Bulldog Stadium in Ranger. Dixie defeated Phoenix College in the Valley of the Sun Bowl in 1983 when they

finished second in the nation. Dixie (7-4) has had the reputation over the years as being an outstanding defensive team and boasts the MVP in the Western States Football League in defensive end Teddy Newman. Newman (6-2,235, soph. from Las Vegas, Nev.) set an NJCAA record for sacks, racking up 28 for the season although he missed the last two games with an injury. He will be back in action for the Roaring Ranger Bowl.

Bowl Chairman Ron Butler expressed his pleasure in having Dixie in this year's contest. "We've had our eye on Dixie for

three years now and we're proud to finally get together with them. They are always one of the top teams in the West and we think we have the potential of offering the fans a truly great national game this year."

Dixie's opponent will be selected this weekend after several other teams complete their schedule. Still in the running are Cisco (6-2-1) who faces nationally-ranked Northeastern Oklahoma in Miami Saturday, Jones County Miss. (7-3) who won last year's Bowl, Ranger (7-3), Dodge City, Kans. (6-4), Kilgore (6-3) and Tyler (7-2). Kilgore and Tyler will

play Saturday for the right to represent the Texas Conference in the Texas Juco Bowl. Butler said that several factors are involved but that the Bowl will be trying to put the "best possible team" in the game.

The Rebels are coached by Greg Crowsaw (28-14) who has won the league championship and kept Dixie in the national rankings during this tenure. This year's club started strong but was decimated by injuries late in the season when they lost to three bowl bound teams, Snow, Phoenix and Ricks. Over the season, the Rebels have held their opponents to

39 yards rushing, 136 yards passing and 12 points per game. Their players are widely recruited nationwide and especially in the Big Eight, WAC, and Pac 10 conferences. One Big eight coach quipped that he was recruiting Dixie's "entire defensive backfield."

Dixie is a state supported community college with 2300 students located in the extreme Southwest corner of Utah in an area that is called the "Dixie of Utah" because of the warm climate and cotton farming that goes on in that area. St. George is closer to Las Vegas, Nevada than any large Utah city and a large number of players hail from the Las Vegas area.

will produce for your pleasure. They are one of the mainstays of Grandmother's Garden, and this is one of the reasons why.

Pansies like full sun except where the temperature exceeds 90 degrees. They can also grow in semi-shade so they are very versatile as to both color and growing conditions. A mass display of pansies is very effective landscaping.

There are two ways to start pansies. One way is from seed and the other way is to buy bedding plants. Local nurseries all have good stocks of pansies on hand now. Remember when selecting plants to pick vigorous looking ones, as you get what you pay for in most instances.

Pansies from seed should be planted around here from August to November, and you can enjoy their blooms from November to May. If you mass plant and stagger your planting dates, you will receive a greater abundance of color for a longer period of time.

Pansies like rich sandy loam with an abundance of humus. Pansies like a

regular well-balanced diet with a water soluble fertilizer. Remember that pansies will reward you with larger and more abundant blooms if they are fed on a regular schedule, and the spent blooms are picked off. Pansies are one of the plants that love fireplace ashes, especially oak ashes. The further north you go, the later the beginning blooming date.

My neighbor and I both bought pansies one year and planted for a mass effect. He could never understand why mine were so much bigger, but it is really very simple as I told him. I bought a quality plant and gave it the care it needed; he bought a Saturday Special and did not fertilize to any extent. Just remember, pansies will produce for you if you produce for them.

### THE BEAUTIFUL LITTLE PANSY

The pansy is known botanically as the Viola Tricolor Hortensis and Viola

Cornuta. The pansy is one of the most popular plants because of the variety and combination of colors.

You can find colors of pur-

ple, white, blue, rose, and dark red and yellow. Many people describe these combinations as smiling happy faces. The pansy comes to us from Europe and is one of the most hybridized plants.

A pansy always have five overlapping petals. Most pansies have blooms of two to three inches, but we have the Rogue Giants and the California Giants which are a hybrid type and can have blooms of up to four and one half inches.

Pansies are technically a perennial but they tend to deteriorate very fast in this climate after the first year and, therefore, we must treat them as annuals or even bi-annuals where the temperature is warm or hot such as we have in the Southwest and Gulf Coastal areas.

Pansies normally grow to a height of about eight inches and are considered to be a low-growing plant which makes them excellent for borders. They are also good as an edging as well as in window boxes and used as pot plants.

They have a delightful fresh fragrant aroma. Remember that the more often you pick your pansies during their blooming stage, the more blooms that they

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

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# AART Survey Shows That Millions Are Wasted In Medicare And Medicaid Programs

Right now while the national Congress is looking for ways to cut expenses, there's one area where they not only could help cut costs - but at the same time, respond favorably to an effort that's gaining nationwide attention.

The effort is asking that restrictions be removed so that patients who are medically able to be removed from hospital care, but who require respiratory care, could be cared for in their homes, and still be covered by insurance protection.

The matter was brought to our attention by Former Eastland County Resident Mrs. Ruby (Hudgins) Ballard who's son Joe was left a quadriplegic from injuries sustained in an automobile accident when he was a 16-year old, on June 12, 1983.

He was an A student - but he's been confined to the Women and Children Hospital in Odessa since Aug. 20, 1984. He could be cared for with respiratory equipment at home, his mother writes, if the regulations would permit it.

We are asking Cong. Charles Stenholm to join his colleagues in helping revise regulations which would not only save money, but patients such as Joe to be cared for at home.

**SURVEY SHOWS MILLIONS WASTED**  
"Medicare and Medicaid costs can be readily cut by millions of dollars a year - just by allowing certain patients to receive reimbursable home care instead of costly hospitalization," says Julie S. Ely, President of the American Association for Respiratory Therapy (AART).

"Our 20-state hospital survey shows that hundreds of patients are confined to hospital beds - at a cost to Medicare/Medicaid of more than \$250,000 per person per year - when they could be living at home at a cost of \$21,000 each," Ely says.

"They are hospitalized for no other reason than that Medicare and Medicaid rules provide full reimbursement for hospital care and no reimbursement for far less expensive and more socially desirable home care," Ely says. "It's time the rules were changed."

The AART survey found 258 chronic ventilator dependent persons in hospitals who are "medically able" to go home. "The annual cost savings for this group alone," says Ely, "would total \$64.4 million, and that's only a fraction of the total

number of patients and dollars involved." (A "chronic ventilator dependent patient" requires some ventilator support within a 24-hour period, for at least 30 consecutive days.)

By way of example, the AART survey provides this set of data on children age 17 or younger. Of the 1,992 chronic ventilator dependent patients identified in 20 states, 15.6 percent (or 310) are in the 17 or under age group. Of those, 91.6 percent (or 284) are hospitalized. And of those, 16.8 (or 48) are medically able to be discharged from the hospital and appropriately cared for at home. "These children belong at home," says Ely, "not just because of the roughly \$12 million per year that would be saved (48x\$249,638 average savings), but because of the obviously superior value of the home environment."

The AART decided to undertake the survey when national attention focused on Katie Beckett, a chronic ventilator dependent child who was allowed to leave the hospital and receive home care reimbursements only after President Reagan arranged for a waiver of Medicaid rules. In addition to improving Katie's quality of life, the waiver has saved Medicaid hundred of

thousands of dollars on this one case alone.

"The AART decided to find out how many Katie Beckett's there are," says Ely. "We wanted to know how many patients are medically able to leave the hospital, but are unable to do so because Medicare and Medicaid will not pay their home health care costs," she says. "We also wanted to see what cost savings are possible."

The AART notes that President Reagan personally intervened in two other cases in addition to the Beckett case, acknowledging that a reimbursement problem exists. "while these three individuals have been lucky, this sort of case-by-case decision making is inadequate and unfair. Our survey shows there are literally hundreds of young people - young and old - around the nation who are needlessly confined to their hospital beds by current reimbursement policy," says Ely.

At today's press conference, Fredrico Broom, father of 3-year-old Don Broom of Gaithersburg, MD, explained the terrible difficulty he and his wife have experienced in trying to maintain home care coverage for their son.

Young Don was born with severe respiratory and other major medical problems. After bringing Don home from Children's Hospital at age 2-and-a-half, Mr. Broom learned that his insurance carrier was going to cut off home health care coverage. Mr. Broom's appeal to President Reagan led to the granting of two coverage extensions, which are now set to expire March 31. Broom is an engineer at the National Institute of Health.

Home care for Don is costing only one-third as much as hospitalization. If insurance coverage is withdrawn, young Don would have to be institutionalized where government agencies would pay the cost. Neither Medicare nor Medicaid will reimburse for Don's home care.

"The Congress has to recognize that there are respiratory dependent patients who can and should be cared for at home," says Broom. "The Medicare/Medicaid system would save money and the patients themselves would be better off. No institution can match the care Don and patients like him receive at home. The rules just have to be changed."

AART President Ely says, "The AART believes that a legislative changes is needed in both the Medicare and Medicaid statutes to provide care in the most cost effective and humane setting possible and to save taxpayers millions of dollars. At a time when Congress is exploring ways to reduce the national deficit, it has an obligation to carefully consider our data."

**Tips For Mailing Gifts**

**This Christmas**

With a little bit of care, holiday cards and packages can arrive on time and in good shape, says Postmaster Venita.

In addition to mailing early, postal customers are urged to properly address cards and packages with the name, house number and street (or post office box) number, and the city, state and ZIP Code reserved for the last line. Use of apartment numbers is encouraged.

"It is also a good idea to put a slip of paper with the recipient's name and address and your return address inside parcels, and be sure the addressing on the outside of the parcel includes your return address and ZIP Code," Postmaster Roach says.

Customers are also reminded to check the size of their envelopes before mailing Christmas and other holiday cards. Letter size standards require that envelopes

be at least 3½ inches high and 5 inches long to be accepted for mailing.

Parcels will arrive at their intended destination in good shape if you follow a few simple suggestions:

**CUSHION:** Make sure contents are well-cushioned and there is no empty space in the box. Use crumpled newspaper around the item

including all sides, top and bottom. Commercially available foam shells or air-pocket padding also are good cushioning materials. Padded mailing bags are a good way to mail small items.

**DON'T OVERWRAP:** Just use your carton. Brown paper and twine cords are not necessary. Paper can rip, and twine can become entangled in mail processing equipment.

**SEAL PROPERLY:** Close your parcel with one of the three recommended types of tape: pressure sensitive, nylon-reinforced kraft paper, or glass-reinforced pressure sensitive. Don't use cellophane tape or masking tape - they aren't sturdy enough. It's a good idea to put a slip with the address and return address inside the parcel.

**AVOID SMUDGES:** Use smudge-proof ink for your addressing.

**POSITION ADDRESSES PROPERLY:** Put the recipient's address in the lower right portion of the package. Put your return address in

the upper left corner only one side of the package. Remove all other labels.

**USE ZIP CODES:** Be sure to include the Zip Code in both the recipient's address and your address. Remember, wrong ZIP Codes can delay the mail.

**APARTMENT NUMBERS:** Using apartment numbers or suite numbers, when you know them, helps the Postal Service deliver the mail in large buildings.

**TIME IT RIGHT:** Mail early in the month and early in the day.

**USE THE RIGHT SERVICE:** Irreplaceable items, such as cash and other

valuables, should be sent by Registered Mail.

**IF YOU RUN OUT OF TIME:** Priority Mail affords First-Class handling for packages weighing over 12 ounces and up to 70 pounds. Priority Mail can be sent from any post office, station or branch or through rural carriers to any address in the U.S. Delivery of Priority Mail is accomplished in two to three days anywhere in the country. Priority Mail can even be used for foreign mailings.

The service is available with insurance, return receipt, COD, certificates of mailing and Special Delivery.
