The Boys Work Committee, twelve in number, is roughly divided as follows: a general chairman; then vice chairman for baseball and football, scout troop, health and physical development, boxing, registration and personnel equipment, outings and transportation, awards, club programs, budgets, etc. Never less than three of the committee are at every meeting of the boys. The commit-tee welcomes visits from other members of the Rotary Club. You must think quicker and surer than the boys do. Don't let them get away from you in their gatherings and become disorderly. Let them have self-government in their club, but properly controlled. Their boy president, fifteen years o'd, is the same boy whom his teacher a year ago reported to us to be the worst in his class. We have something always ready for them before they have a chance to become disorderly. It is our experience that they really love a strict disciplinarian. The boys have often listened with intense interest to a good speaker, but they are keen in discovering a speaker who is not so good, and unlike their elders in the Rotary Club the boys refuse to be bored. On Hallowe'en night our boys not only own first prize for marching but also a majority of the costumes and other prizes in the big boys' parade which was designed to prevent the usual depredations against property. And we did not have a single fire or arrest that night, although one of our neighbor cities had ten alarms and thirty arrests, mostly juvenile.






