The use of poison to guard sheep, goats or other valuable livestock from coyotes and canine night raiders of the Dr. Jeykel and Mr. Hyde character, is certainly to be de-

But it is difficult to understand why poison should be used in a stealthy manner against pets which are kept carefully at home and which do nobody any

"Lady," Spitz-Collie of Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Armstrong, died by poisoning yesterday. So far as I know Lady did nobody any harm. She was for years a devoted pet of the Armstrong family, a constant companion of Mr. Armstrong and a member of the family whose affectionate disposition certainly should not have made her any enemies.

I do not believe that the fatal weel which took Lady's life was placed by design to do that thing. But what happened in this instance simply proves how often it is that attempts to do by stealth what should be openly done go awry with results often

Mrs. Mann died Thanksgiving day at the home of a daughter Mrs. E. B. Whisenant, of Harpers ville, 12 miles north of Cisco.

She was born June 24, 1867, a Peoria, Ill. She was converted when 12 years of age and joined the Methodist church.

Mrs. Mann was twice married December 24, 1882, she became the wife of John Henry Caton, who preceded her in death Decembe 9, 1882. To this union two children were born, Sarah Elizabeth now Mrs. Finley Knox, of Abi lene, and Henry Ettie, now Mrs E. B. Whisenatn, of Harpersville

She was married to J. D. Mann December 2, 1886, and the family moved to Texas in 1889, and to Stephens county in 1903. Previous to their removal to Stephen county she became affiliated with the Concord Cumberland Presby terian church, and later joined the Harpersville Cumberland church by affiliation, where her member hip remained until her death.

Her husband, J. D. Mann, and the two daughters named above, are the immediate survivors.



SOME of the statements appearing in the professedly "state" papers which we have read are statements to be repented of. It would be well for the writers at both ends of that thirty-mile front to realize that the great majority of supporters of TCU, SMU, Baylor and other denominational schools are not supporters because these schools happen to be located in Fort Worth, Dallas, Waco or whatever they may be in, but for reasons entirely disassociated with town pride. Such support is prejudicial, if legitimate.
