HOUSE STARTS USING ECONOMY AX Drunken Brothers Arrested After Crazy Holdup Series

TAXI DRIVERS VICTIMIZED BY

DALLAS, Jan. 18.-Two drunken brothers were arrested today after staging a crazy series of robberies that carried them to all parts of Dallas and netted loot of \$16 in cash, a watch and an overcoat.

The youths gave their names as Clyde Thomas Ray, 22, and Guy Raymond Ray, 20. Their five vic-tims were taxi-cab drivers.

Shortly before midnight the brothers summoned a taxi into east Dallas. Climbing into M. J. Nelson's cab with a large jar of "chock" beer, they ordered Nelson to "drive around a while."

After the meter had registered 66 miles Nelson begged to be excused One of the youths pressed a pistol against his ribs and ordered him to on. After that they visited six filling stations, one of the youths entering each one and emerging with the report 'No luck.'

Nelson was then ordered to drive to a remote outlying spot where he was robbed of \$1, his wrist watch and overcoat and commanded to drive his captors back to town. There one of the boys alighted and called another cab.

The driver of the second cab was told to drive to the same spot where Nelson was robbed. The other brother followed in the first cab. This driver was robbed of \$4 and both drivers were ordered to return to town, one of the bandits occupy_ ing each cab.

This process was repeated until three more drivers had been victim-ized. The youths finally forced four victims into one cab and fled in the fifth cab with the driver at the wheel
