The Cruel Net Spread by Gossip.

There never was a time, since Sheridan wrote his immortal "School for Scandal," when gossip was more the order of the social day than at the present day.

Those quiet women are always the worst. Depend upon it, we don't know ali," whispers Mrs. Archer to a friend at a tea party. The very superiority and flawlessness of that particular quiet woman adds to the offense her neignbor finds in her.

Presently she finds herself caught in the cruel net of woman gossip. And for the very reason that there is no foundation for the stories told of her, deniel and explanations are the more diffcult.

But is it only women who talk gossip, spread scandles and take up old tales of "very suspicious circumstances, my dear," etc.?

Men are a good deal to blame in this direction. At least they have become so since men and women mixed together so incessently as they do to-day.

Men's lives used to be led more as things apart from feminine existence Then they used to "let the women fight out their scandals and gossip among themsslves.

Nowadays the social lives of both sexes are so intimate that the men find themselves drawn into the maelstorm of malice, whose chief force, it must be confessed, is furnished by woman. First they despise the smallness and spitefullness of it all then they endure and finally embrace them, slowly, but surely, degenerate into that meanest among the products of civilization—the man gossip.

But it is the woman gossip who first inoculates man with the virus of scandal. Once the germ of gossip temperament, whether masculine or feminine, like an ill-weed it grows apace. And the habit of disparaging our neighbor and his wife-especially his wife-once acquired, is as hard to overcome as is the drink craze or the craving for morphia.

In the Middle Ages, those who were suspected of being possessed of the devil were subjected to flagellation, fasting and prayer to exorcise the demon within. The woman gossip might undertake a similar regime on her own account. For the possession of a tongue addicted to slander is the worst form of demoniac

Few among us have the courage to avoid the professional scandal monger as one would fly from a maddog. Yet the one is just as harmful to the community as the other, though there are, of course, varying degress of the disease.

Rumors, like snowballs, gather as they roll. And there is no truth whatever-so far as scandal is concerned-in the axiom that there is no smoke without fire. For some types of woman-gossip are so imbued with the incendiary spirit of scandal that they can raise a mighty flare with the aid of only the wook work of fiction.

The worst type of woman-gossip is she who does her evil work deliberately, and whose utteran es as to her neighbor are dictated by a bad to spoil She love and to act as a kill-joy. The worst gassips are women presumably happily married, and usually mothers

The women-gossip actuated by badheartedness is a curious study. There must be some sort of morbid fungus growth on the retina of her eye, for she sees evil where no evil exists.


