UPON 10 MORE COUNTY JOBS

\$150,000 to Be Spent on Roads in Precinct Number 4

Treasury warrants for more than half a million dollars worth of WPA work in Eastland county, embracing 10 projects, were issued at Washington Saturday, according to a dispatch from the Associated Press to the Cisco Daily Press. Start of these projects awaits orders of State Administrator H. P. Drought at San Antonio. Drought may select from ne list such as he may wish to

The list includes \$150,000 worth of lateral "farm - to - market" roads in Precinct No. 4. This is in addition to lateral road projects already ordered under way under the direction of County Commissioner Arch Bint. Most of this money will be spent in the construction of roads that serve the Cisco rural trade area, giving the people of these areas better connection with the Cisco markets.

The ten were ncluded in large number of such projects for which treasury warrants were issued at the national capital. This issuance is almost coincident with the administration's final removal of the FERA as a direct relief agency and the substitution of work relief projects.

List of Projects Precinct No. 2 received an appropriation of \$180,450 and Precinct No. 2, \$159,000.

The adjustment must bring the burden of effort back to the people. There must be a turning point somewhere and that corner seems definitely now to be reached. There is much of reform to be accomplished, but reforms are something that come slowly as the demand for them springs from the people. If the country is ready to look to itself and not to the government for salvation and prosperity it has come a long way on the comeback from the depression.

THE majority of sentiment recorded against the New Deal so far in the Literary Digest poll should not be taken to mean that Roosevelt, in the event he is the democratic party's standard bearer in the next campaign as he is practically certain of being, will meet defeat in the general election. No single republican candidate is possible of nomination who can capitalize upon the whole of this anti-New Deal sentiment. No single group of candidates can do it. It must be remembered that in this vote of sentiment, as much of it from the solid South as the doubtful sections of the country, is against the New Deal in various of its phases, and not FOR any particular opposition. Were the choice one of between personalities, with a definite figure opposing Rooseyelt, such a result would be a cause for democratic hopelessness, but because the vote is one of a choice between a definite program which cannot but have occasioned disappointment in many of its various applications, and the nebulous allurements of many hoped-for alternatives, it is not definitive by any means. What would appear to be the truest analysis of the vote so far, is the wish of the electorate that the Roosevelt administration would modify the New Deal program in many of its phases, just what the administration seems preparing to do in the case of its boot-strap lifting pro-

Scanning New Books

By JOHN SELBY

For once there is no puzzle-ment over the book of the week although this is the busy season, presses are stuttering under their load, and at least a hundred books have gone over the desk in seven

The book of the week is the new Columbia Encyclopedia (Columbia University Press). This essays to enclose the essential information now current within one volume, and the effort has produced a heavy but not too unwieldy book. Inside it are nearly 2,000 pages, about five million words, more than 52,000 articles —and not a single paragraph.

In order to save space, paragraphs are eliminated from even the longest articles, which run to 6,000 words. Illustrations were omitted for the same reason. Duplication of material is practically non-existent, but elaborate cross indexing has made it possible to follow out many subjects to the bitter end.

The book contains every incorporated town in the United States with 1,000 or more population. Every Biblical proper name is there, and because the world moves very swiftly, or at least changes nomenclature with the ease of a snake sloughing a skin, these are a lot of articles on subjects not found in previous encyclopedias. Heavy water is one of them. Babe Ruth is another.

Eight years were spent on the book by the compiling staff, guided by the editor, Clarke F. Ansley. It is said to be the first original one-volume encyclopedia made in America, and the first encyclopedia prepared and published at an American university Thumbnail Reviews





To United States Irks Spaniards

VALENCIA, Spain. Nov. 30. (AP) -Smuggling of onion seeds to the United States has been protested by the Valencia Onion Growers association.

Exportation of Spanish onion seed was prohibited by decree a year ago after growers here had protested that American crops grown from these seeds, were causing opion exports to the United States to decline sharply.

Despite the decree there has been a heavy contraband exportation of seeds, the Spanish growers said in their petition for restrictive measures.

Predicts Italy to Get Mandate Over Ethiopia

AUSTIN, Nov. 29. - Italy will ultimately achieve a mandate over Ethiopia, and Germany will start her aggressions within two years -these were predicted by Dr Thad W. Riker, professor of modern European history at the University of Texas, in a recent address before the international relations group of the Austin chapter. American association of university women.

Dr. Riker's analysis of the modern European situation is regarded with respect among academicians, since he is recognized in this country and abroad as an authority in this field.

Last summer he was awarded the honorary degree of doctor of letters by Oxford University, likewise for distinguished research in modern European history. His latest publication is a textbook, "A Short History of Modern Europe."


