terraced if he goes about it in the proper manner. Every farm has a certain soil building allowance that can be earned in the AAA program. This can be earned by building good terraces and the payment is 75 cents per 100 feet. This will pay for the construction of terraces 25 feet wide or wider. Arrangements can be made to have the owner of the equipment building the terraces paid at the time the terraces are complete. Any farmer can learn how much money he can earn by terracing if he will contact the AAA office at Eastland. Sorry Seed Cost the Most. One of the most expensive

things a farmer can do is to plant poor seed. The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station has been doing in developing improved strains of tilizer than the crop will get. Some of these are Texas Milo, Blackhull Kafir, Hegari, Feterita, Red Top Sorghum, Texas Hybrid corn, Yellow Surcropper corn, New Nortex cats and Wintex barley. The Texas Hybrid corn is now available for the first time. It produces an average of about 20 per cent more corn than the best of the other varieties, but the seed are still scarce and a little high in price. Farmers who want any of the hybrid seed should get in touch with the county agent at once. Information on where to get the other seed mentioned can be had from the county agent or any other agricultural

Nearly all farmers will admit that a feed crop failure is worse than a cash crop failure because a farmer cannot farm without feed, especially if he has any livestock of any kind. Fertilizer tests on feed crops, corn included, in Eastland county prove that the yield can be doubled or quadrupled by the proper use of fertilizer. The poorer the land, the greater the response to fertilizer A good fertilizer for feed is 4-12 4, at least 100 pounds per acre. I peas were grown on the land the year before, the fertilizer money should be invested in superphos phate as the peas left nitrogen in the land for the next crop, but the only way to add phosphate is from a sack. It does not pay to use fertilizer and then let the weeds grow some outstanding work for years as they will get more of the fer-
